Archbishop Martin for World Youth Day with 300 young Dublin Pilgrims

Over 300 young Dublin Pilgrims left Dublin Airport yesterday to attend the biggest Catholic Youth Festival in the world with Pope Francis. World Youth Day begins in Krakow in Poland tomorrow. Despite the name, it is a week-long

event with hundreds of different aspects involving prayer, reflection, gathering and entertainment. Pope Francis will attend on Thursday and the high point of the week is a huge open air Mass with the Pope on Sunday next.

It will be the largest largest meeting of people in Polish history with up to 2 million pilgrims due to take part – 1600 will travel from Catholic Dioceses from all over Ireland.

Archbishop Diarmuid Martin is leading the Dublin group and is one of 10 Irish Bishops traveling to World Youth Day (WYD). The young Dublin pilgrims have been nominated to take part from over 70 different parishes and secondary schools from around the Archdiocese of Dublin. Each of them has participated in a programme of preparation, involving prayer, spiritual reflection and practical training, including safeguarding, over the past year.

The Dublin group is staying in the parish of Kazimierza in Krakow. On Wednesday evening all Irish pilgrims will join the young people from Dublin and their Polish hosts in a special evening of prayer, music and reflection. Archbishop Martin, Bishop Donal Mc Keown (Derry) Bishop

Brendan Leahy (Limerick) are among a group of Bishops from around the world who have been invited to lead Catechesis (teaching sessions) with international pilgrims during WYD.

Pope Francis will arrive at World Youth Day events in Krakow on Thursday via an environmentally friendly city tram! In what is likely to be one of the most poignant events of his visit to Poland, he will meet 10 Holocaust survivors at Auschwitz on Friday (July 29). He is also due to visit a shrine to St. John Paul II built on site where JP2 had worked in the Solvay chemical factory. It was Saint John Paul II who initiated World Youth Day in the Church – it is now in its 31st year.

In a message to all those taking part for 2016, Pope Francis said, "I am very anxious to meet you and to offer the world a new sign of harmony, a mosaic of different faces, from many races, languages, peoples and cultures, but all united in the name of Jesus, who is the Face of Mercy."

One of the highlights of the Pilgrimage takes place on the Saturday evening before the final Mass with Pope Francis on Sunday. Through the night, pilgrims will sleep under the stars with over

a million others at Campus Misericordiae. They will worship in prayer, dance, and song, and artists known in Poland and around the world will participate.

Poles arrest man with explosives before Word Youth Day

Law enforcement officials in central Poland said Monday that a 48-year-old Iraqi man has been arrested on charges of possessing explosives.

The arrest on Sunday in Lodz took place just days before Pope Francis comes to Poland to meet with hundreds of thousands of young people from around the globe for celebrations of the World Youth Day. Poland's Interior Minister Mariusz Blaszczak says the gatherings will be safe.

Beata Marczak, spokesman for prosecutors in Lodz said that "small amounts of explosives, not sufficient to make an explosion" were found on the man. He could face up to eight years in prison if convicted on charges of illegal possession of explosives.

The man was questioned in English and put under two months' arrest, but there were "no grounds for allegations of terrorism," Marczak said.

The investigation is supervised by the Internal Security Agency, she said.

The disused church – All Saint's Church of Ireland – was dotted with candles, Swedish lanterns and fairy lights which provided a tranquil backdrop for storytelling through song and quality community arts.

As part of their 'Growth & Decay' project, Sliabh Beagh Arts have been sprinkling colour through the fields, with their latest on going graffiti bales project. One of the North's leading graffiti artists Kev Largey is currently transforming hay bales into works of art throughout the countryside. The hay bales have been decorated with colourful cartoons animations. The hay bales have become a bit of an attraction with many motorists stopping to take pictures of some of the bales on the main A4 outside Fivemiletown.

The aim of the 'Growth and Decay' project is an attempt to enthuse, inspire and bring art into the everyday lives of rural communities. This project will to run into next year so people in the rural

communities should look forward to seeing a lot more colourful bales throughout the countryside.

"Sliabh Beagh Arts are passionate about developing rural arts at a grassroots level, ensuring the organisation develops programmes which are relevant and meaningful to those in the area. We aim to create access to the arts for all, allowing local people to engage and participate. Belfast minister gives thanks after church fires

Fires were set alight inside Saintfield Road Presbyterian Church and hall in South Belfast, during the early hours of Friday morning (22nd July) and again early on Sunday morning (24th July). The buildings suffered "considerable damage", the lasting effect of which is still being assessed.

The minister of the congregation Rev. Alistair Bill, who led a short service of prayer and reflection outside the church on Sunday afternoon,

expressed his appreciation for the support the congregation has received, "the church family greatly appreciates the prayers and messages of support that have come from far and wide, and from all sections of the community. We also want to thank the emergency services that acted so promptly at the time of the incident and continue to provide assistance. Appreciation is also due to the kindness and generosity of our neighbouring churches, and to Breda Academy who at very short notice are providing space for the Newtownbreda children's mission (CSSM) which is taking in the area this week."

In a previous statement, clerk of session of Saintfield Road, Dr Alistair McCracken, said, "although we are sad that someone has carried out these acts, we are a forgiving people and will pray for them. As a Christian community we have experienced the forgiveness of God and while these events are difficult to understand we forgive those who did this."

At the beginning of July the Scottish Episcopal Institute (SEI) was delighted to receive official notification that it had been successful in its bid to join the Common Awards scheme. From September, Durham University will be the academic validator of the ministerial training which candidates for ordination and Lay Readership receive in the Scottish Episcopal Church. This good news is the happy outcome of a lengthy period of review, re-organisation of the curriculum and preparation of extensive validation paperwork.

The 2015-16 academic year has just come to a close with a week-long Summer School on the theme of '*Taking care*' held at Glenalmond

College. Throughout the first part of the week candidates looked at ministry with the elderly, the maintenance of buildings for missional purposes, the need for good policies for – and a solid theology of – safeguarding, and the spiritual imperative to build sustaining and healthy practices for personal wellbeing. The week culminated in a superb Retreat conducted by Canon Brian Hardy. Thirteen students graduated at a joyful Valedictory Service in Glenalmond Chapel led by the Rt Rev Dr Gregor Duncan, Bishop of Glasgow & Galloway followed by a celebratory buffet lunch attended by friends and family of the Leavers.

SEI has also just published two Handbooks for Curates and Lay Readers in their first three years of public representative ministry, detailing the procedures and protocols for personal development, supervision and review during those formative years.
