Pope asks for local events coinciding with World Meeting of Families 2022

Pope Francis has asked dioceses around the world to make it possible for every family to participate in the World Meeting of Families by holding local celebrations during the gathering in Rome June 22-26, 2022.

"After being postponed for a year due to the pandemic, the desire to meet again is great," the pope said in a video message July 2.

In the past, he said, the World Meeting of Families "was perceived as being something remote, at most followed on television," but "unknown to the majority of families."

With questions still present about how the coronavirus pandemic will impact global travel and large international meetings next year, Pope Francis said there is "an opportunity provided by providence to create a worldwide event that can involve all the families that would like to feel part of the ecclesial community."

The theme of the 2022 gathering is: "Family love: A vocation and a path to holiness."

Rome will be the main venue, the pope said, and bishops' conferences and international Catholic organizations will be invited to send delegates involved in family ministry to Rome



for "the Festival of Families, the pastoral congress" and the concluding Mass.

At the same time, the pope said, "each diocese can be the focal point for a local meeting for its families and communities. In this way, everyone will be able to participate, even those who cannot come to Rome."

Pope Francis asked dioceses to be "dynamic, active and creative in organizing this with the families in harmony with what will be taking place in Rome. This is a wonderful opportunity to devote ourselves with enthusiasm to family ministry with spouses, families and pastors together."

Cardinal Kevin J. Farrell, prefect of the Dicastery for Laity, the Family and Life, said the World Meeting of Families continues to grow and attract more families from around the world, "bringing enrichment with their languages, cultures and experiences."

The gatherings, he said, "have been an eloquent sign of the beauty of the family for the church and for all humanity. We need to continue on this path, seeking to involve more and more families in this beautiful initiative."

Cork, Cloyne and Ross blog on target for 1 million views

In September 2011, nearly ten years ago, Dr Paul Colton, Bishop of Cork, Cloyne and Ross, on impulse, 'mainly to explore the available technology', he says, set up a blog on WordPress.

It has since become a place to tell the stories of what goes on in Cork, Cloyne and Ross and it's on target to reach one million 'views' this year. The NewsBlog, as he calls, it was named 'churchofirelandcork'.

Now that NewsBlog, heading for its tenth birthday, and as Bishop Colton hands it over today to the new Diocesan Media and Information Technology Officer, Denise Brueckl, is heading for a significant milestone of one million 'views'. 'Views' are different from 'visitors'. A 'view' is counted by WordPress when a visitor loads or reloads a page. A 'visitor' is counted when WordPress sees a user or browser for the first time in a selected time frame, such as a day or a month or a year.

The banner chosen by Bishop Colton for the NewsBlog was the wise maidens at the west door

The NewsBlog started very tentatively in September 2011 with just 23 'views' that month, and then 30 'views' the following month. In the third month

it went to 1200 'views' and now, depending on the month it could be anything between 9,000 and 21,000 'views' per month. In all there have been 918,363 'views' and 320,294 different 'visitors' since 2011. 'Actually' said Bishop Paul 'in the first two months there was an average of just one view per day – probably me myself! Now it can be anything between 250 and 700 a day.' On one day in 2019 there were 8,521 'views'.

The most popular day is Friday – 19% of all 'views' are on that day. The most popular time of the day for a 'view' is 11.00 a.m. (8% of 'views'). The NewsBlog connects also

with Linkedin, Facebook, Twitter, Whatsapp and Email, so that people can, themselves, share the news.

Visitors to the NewsBlog, while mainly from Ireland (about two-thirds) come from almost every part of the world, as seen in this map (the areas in pink show where visitors have come from):

People also find their way to the NewsBlog through referrers such as Facebook, search engines and Twitter, along with dozens of others. It is possible to visit the NewsBlog and, at the bottom left, to put in your email address so that each post is emailed to you.

'I have always been interested in harnessing new technologies for the work of the Church' says Bishop Colton:

I remember well, in the early 1990s, about two years after I first started using email, a senior clergyman in Dublin Diocese saying to me "I suppose you've one of those email things; it won't really take off, you know, because everyone will have to have one."

The late Dean Jack Shearer was one of the pioneers in all this and he bought me my first computer in 1987 when I was his curate. In those days you had to insert and remove floppy disks when you wanted to do simple things like change text to italics or bold. He was a man ahead of his time in so many ways.

With a parishioner in the early 1990s – Craig McCauley, now an Archdeacon – we also set up what must have been one of the first, if not the first parish website in Ireland. And churchnewsireland@gmail.org

so, as the journey rapidly unfolded I found myself – self-taught with the support of like-minded people – on a technological journey that, in the early part of this century, led to Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, Youtube, as well as this NewsBlog.

I see it all, ultimately, as one element supporting the first of the 'Five Marks of Mission': 'To proclaim the good news of the Kingdom'.

The NewsBlog supports that by showing what Christians are doing and responding to where they are. It is a modern way of creating a sense of shared purpose, identity and belonging and also serves a purpose when we have to respond to tragedies or sad news in our midst also.

Now I am delighted to be handing it all over to the new and capable hands of Denise Brueckl who is our new Diocesan Media and Information Technology Officer. I wish her well today as she starts this new post and as I pass on all those 'logins' and 'passwords' to her.

I wanted to be a Christian Brother, reveals comedian Tim McGarry

Belfast comedian Tim McGarry has told how he once thought about becoming a Christian Brother, Claire Williamson writes in the Belfast Telegraph.

The star of the Blame Game — who is known also for playing Da in Give My Head Peace — was speaking to

former Adoration Sisters turned pilgrim guides Martina Purdy and Elaine Kelly on the St Patrick's Podcast.

Ms Purdy asked him about his faith and how it was that he ended up being an atheist, and patron of NI Humanists, having been raised a Catholic.

"I became an atheist when I was about 14, just around the time of confirmation," he said. "I am a natural sceptic...I think the chances of there being a God are virtually zero...I just don't buy it. I'm sorry. I don't buy any religion." He did however admit that as a young person he was once "quite devout."

"You know at one stage I was going to become a Christian Brother because I was taught by the Christian brothers, Park Lodge. And there was a Christian brother, Brother Holian, who was a lovely, lovely man and my mother was very religious and I genuinely thought about becoming a Christian brother at a very early stage." During the podcast, Mr McGarry challenged Ms Purdy to prove that God existed and she told him jokingly: "Open your eyes to beauty."

Ms Purdy said she was too tired for a debate on causality but would ask him just one question on the subject: "Do you believe in love?"

And when he replied, "Yes," she answered, "Well, God is love! So thank you very much Tim, we have to move on!" Ms Kelly said she found McGarry to be so kind and decent, he was one of the best non-practising Catholics she had ever met. McGarry did share that his mother Betty had great faith and when asked in her old age how she felt about death, she replied: "I can't wait!"

During the podcast McGarry shared his own experience of the Troubles, his life as a comedian and the benefits of laughter. He has made a career out of poking fun at politicians and paramilitaries and this year celebrated 25 years as a comedian, having spent eight years as a solicitor. McGarry spoke about launching St Patrick's Way by the Coast, a six-mile ancient pilgrimage route from Ballyhornan to Ardglass that takes in St Patrick's Well, Sheepland.

He said he didn't know what to expect from the walk and "had an absolute ball".

"You know I like a wee dander now and again. But the weather was superb the company was great. There was about a dozen of us on it, a very gentle walk with a break in the middle."

Lorna is a West Cork girl and runs her own health and fitness business in Clonakilty.


She focuses a lot on teenagers and children and has been kept busy over the past few months with schools and clubs.


Pointers for prayer

Speaking to the Soul

God blesses those who are merciful, for they will be shown mercy.

Matthew 5:7 NLT

Jesus told many stories that make us sit up. One of the most powerful was the story of the king who was owed millions of pounds by one of his servants. (Matthew 18.21-35) The man couldn't possibly pay his debt. The servant fell on his knees and begged the king to be patient. The king took pity on him and cancelled the debt. If you have ever been deeply in debt you will know what an amazing experience that was for the servant. The relief must have been incredible. The servant then went out and met a friend who owed him a fiver. It was a trivial amount but the servant demanded that he be paid back in full, and threw him into prison until he recovered all his money. When the king heard this, he was incensed and ordered that the servant, who had been let off the most enormous debt, be thrown into prison and tortured until he paid back every last penny. Ouch. Jesus concluded by saying that that was

exactly how his heavenly Father would treat anyone who failed to show forgiveness to others.

God wants to show us his mercy and forgiveness but we are then under an obligation to pass it on. It isn't a choice and it isn't easy. Forgiveness is a gift and there is no way in which we could ever deserve to be forgiven by God. Justice would demand that our sins be judged severely. The debt is well beyond anything we could ever repay. But God in his mercy and love has chosen to let us go free, and to give us complete forgiveness. We need to constantly remind ourselves of how incredible it is that God should ever have forgiven us. And then we must never forget that we are commissioned to pass on forgiveness to those who deliberately wrong us; to those who are unkind to us; to those who make our lives a misery. They don't deserve forgiveness any more than we did, but we are charged with passing on the forgiveness that God has generously given to us.
