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C of I bishops take part in installation of Methodist President

Bishop Andrew Forster and Bishop David McClay were among clergy who took part in the historic installation of a new President of the Methodist Church in Ireland this week. Rev Dr Sahr Yambasu became the first national leader of colour in one of the four main Churches in Ireland.

The installation took place during the Methodist Church's

annual conference at the Agape Centre in Belfast. For the second year in a row, the conference was held virtually.

Dr Yambasu was born in Sierra Leone and trained for ministry in Ireland. His wife Clodagh Yambasu (nee McCormack) – who is a daughter of a prominent Methodist family in Longford – is also a Methodist minister. The couple returned to Sierra Leone after their marriage, but came back to Ireland in 1995 owing



to civil war.

Dr Yambasu has chosen as his theme for his year of office 'People First, Under God' – a message of social equality underpinned by Christian love.

Bishop Forster said he was honoured to have been part of such an historic occasion in Irish Church life. "I wish Dr Yambasu every success as he seeks to build God's kingdom during his Presidential year. His election marks an important moment for the Methodist Church in Ireland, but it represents a significant and historic occasion, too, for the whole Christian family in Ireland. I was humbled and honoured to have been part of such an historic occasion,



and I look forward to seeing what God has planned for Sahr during this exciting phase in his ministry."

The C of I bishops' participation in the ceremony was made possible by the covenant relationship which exists between the Methodist Church and the Church of Ireland. This provides for Church of Ireland bishops to take part in the installation of new Methodist Presidents, and for serving and former Methodist leaders to reciprocate at the consecrations of Church of Ireland bishops.

Refugee week at Church of Sanctuary in Carrickmacross

Special services are being held in churches in the Carrickmacross Group this Sunday, 13 June to mark the beginning of Refugee Week.

Earlier this year St Finbarr's was signed up as a Church of Sanctuary making the following pledge: 'We the Select Vestry of St Finbarr's Church of Ireland, Carrickmacross wish to affirm our support for the Places of Sanctuary movement and our desire to work towards achieving 'Church of Sanctuary' designation. We will seek to develop and embed in our Parish a culture of welcome and hospitality towards asylum seekers and refugees in our own community and across our island. While we recognise that this will be a process of growth and learning within our particular situation, we state our commitment to the following general principles:

• Offering a positive vision of a culture of welcome and hospitality to all;

• Creating opportunities for relationships of friendship and solidarity between local people and those seeking sanctuary;

• Recognising and encouraging partnership and network development across localities;

 Identifying opportunities for working on common cause issues within and across communities;

• Celebrating and promoting the welcome and contribution of people seeking sanctuary;

• Engaging people seeking sanctuary in decision making processes at all levels and in all activities:

• Promoting understanding of asylum and refugee issues, especially by enabling refugee voices to be heard directly.

Revd McConaghie explained that prior to the closure of churches due to the pandemic the local Church of Ireland churches in the area had begun to make connections with local asylum seekers and refugees with a number of those who had recently arrived in Ireland attending the churches in both Carrickmacross and Magheracloone.

'The churches hope to make those connections once more as restrictions ease as part of their mission to create a church where all are truly welcomed regardless of class, race, colour of skin, sexual orientation or gender.'

Rev Colin McConaghie explained how the church members have a real passion for serving our local community and all who live here.

"A key message of the Gospel is that of welcome and hospitality. Jesus often went against popular thinking to reach out beyond ethnic background or standing in society. As a group of churches we feel called to serve our community and to be a church were all are openly welcomed in God's love. It is important to know that those people who have moved to this are wherever they are from are welcomed and they can become a part of our community," he said.

The special services for sanctuary Sunday take place on Sunday in St Finbarr's at 10.30am (also live on their Facebook Page), St Molua's, Magheracloone at 12noon and St Patrick's Ardragh at 1.15pm. Covid-19 guidelines and restrictions continue to be in place.

Anglican bishops to meet in small groups online in preparation for Lambeth Conference

Bishop from across the Anglican Communion are preparing to participate in a series of online conversations with each other in preparation for gathering in 2022 for the Lambeth Conference.

The conversations, in groups of 20, will be held on Zoom for all active bishops in the Anglican Communion's 41 provinces. They will be held each month from July to December and will focus on the theme "God's Church for God's World."

As a preview of the conversations, the Anglican Communion has released a series of videos about what the bishops hope to accomplish, both online this year and in person next year.

"Nothing will replace eyeball-to-eyeball meeting," South Africa Archbishop Thabo Makgoba says in one of the videos. "In spite of all of our many challenges and differences, here is an opportunity to walk together under the guidance of scripture. ... I encourage you to really take an opportunity of these walks of witness and these conversations as we share each other's burdens and as we learn from one another."

The Lambeth Conference is a gathering of all Anglican bishops that is called by the archbishop of Canterbury about every 10 years. It had been scheduled for 2020 but was delayed two years because of the COVID-19 pandemic. It has been rescheduled for July 27-Aug. 8, 2022, in Canterbury, England.

Celebrations marking the Feast Day of St Columba ended in style at St Augustine's Church in Londonderry on

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Wednesday evening as three of the city's leading cultural lights entertained an audience in 'the Wee Church' with a narrated production of 'Columba: a Triptych', scripted by Mary Murphy.



The three-part drama recounted the stories of Columba's mother's dream, the battle the saint's kinsmen started on his behalf, and his eventual remorse. Ms Murphy was joined by fellow performers Anita Robinson and Mairead Mullan. They were accompanied by a soundtrack from the original production, 'Columba - Then and Now', which 10 years earlier depicted significant events in the Saint's life, particularly his repentance and desire for reconciliation.



Speaking to the Soul

The council of the Jews called the apostles back in and commanded them never again to speak or teach in the name of Jesus. But Peter and John replied, "Do you think God wants us to obey you rather than him? We cannot stop telling about everything we have seen and heard."

Acts 4:18-20 NLT

The miraculous healing of the lame man attracted great attention and so Peter found himself with a further opportunity to speak to the crowd. He explained that the healing had been done in the name of Jesus pointing out that they had "killed the author of life but God raised him from the dead". This was too much for the Jewish authorities who were desperate to find a way to shut him up.

Peter responded by making it clear that if it was a choice between obeying the Jewish council or God, he would choose God. Nothing would be able to stop him from witnessing about his faith in Jesus. It is worth stopping for a moment and reminding ourselves that this bold, confident speaker is the Peter who only a few weeks before had denied ever knowing Jesus. He is clearly a changed man and his pathetic denials are a thing of the past.

In Romans 13 Paul teaches that we should all submit to the governing authorities which derive their authority from God. However, when rulers abuse their power and stand in the way of God, our duty is to obey God. In many countries today, to obey God is to stand in opposition to the government. Open Doors is an organisation that seeks to ensure that persecuted Christians are remembered and supported. At the moment they identify the top five countries where persecution is most prevalent as North Korea, Afghanistan, Somalia, Libya and Pakistan. Let us keep praying for them, asking God to give them the courage to stand up for him however intense the opposition. We may not face such flagrant opposition ourselves, but we still need to ensure that every day we are taking our orders from God and not from anyone else.
