### Archbishop of York's mission to Sheffield

The Diocese of Sheffield has announced that the Archbishop of York, The Most Reverend and Right Honourable Stephen Cottrell, will be visiting from the 16-18 June.

The mission will include a visit to Sheffield Cathedral on the Friday for evensong before having dinner with Bishop Pete and others from the Diocese. On Saturday Archbishop Stephen will meet at Diocesan Church House with Churchwardens and church grafting teams before visiting a War Memorial at All Saints' Church at Laughton En Le Morthen to mark 100 years of the monument being there. Summer Fayres are included on the itinerary for Saturday at Laughton En Le Morthen and St Leonard Dinnington – proof you can't have too many Summer Fayres in one day!

A prayer walk is also scheduled on Saturday before evening teaching with Focal Ministers at St John Kimberworth Park. Archbishop Stephen will preach at Doncaster Minster on Sunday morning before hosting a lunch at St Mary's Sprotbrough, to which all curates and their families have been invited, along with the IME team who support and train the curates in the Diocese of Sheffield.

He will later attend café church at St John's Balby, the same place where he visited with Archbishop Justin Welby to announce triennium funding. Archbishop Stephen will meet

with volunteers and service users in Balby of the multibank in operation there.

Speaking ahead of his visit, Archbishop Stephen said:

'I'm so looking forward to visiting the Diocese of Sheffield in June and fascinated and inspired by your "you are the light of the world" (Lights for Christ) agenda.

'I hope to bring a little bit of light and warmth to the Diocese of Sheffield. I look forward to working alongside Bishop Pete, Bishop Sophie and others in the Diocese, both to see what you are doing but also hopefully to have opportunities to share with others something of the goodness, the peace and the light which we see in Jesus Christ, and because of his death and resurrection – and by his spirit – can be ours too.'

### **Census 2022 religion results**

The results of last year's national census have just been released and there are some interesting trends in the Religion data, Archdeacon David Huss writes on Facebook.

The headline, widely reported in the media, is the ongoing decrease in affiliation to the Roman Catholic church (down from 79% in 2016 to 69% in 2022) and the increase in those ticking the box 'No Religion' (up from 10% to 15%), Archdeacon David Huss wites on Facebook.

The Church of Ireland population of the state is almost exactly the same as six years ago, at 126,658. However,



overall population increase means this is now a smaller percentage of the total - around 2.5% of Ireland's population identify themselves as Church of Ireland/Anglican.

In Donegal, the number of Church of Ireland members continues to decrease, and now stands at 6,370 (down from 6,756 in 2016 and 6,974 in 2011). This equates to 3.8% of the county's people.

There are substantial numbers of other Christians in the county, besides Roman Catholics (127,969) and Presbyterians (5,496) there are:

1,041 Orthodox 837 Christian (not specified) 482 Methodist 204 Apostolic or Pentecostal 160 Baptist 122 Evangelical
