

Racism and sectarianism are always wrong - Bishops in Derry

Joint statement by the Bishop of Derry, Most Rev'd Dr Donal McKeown and the Bishop of Derry and Raphoe, Rt Rev'd Andrew Forster on the recent violence in Derry-Londonderry

Like the vast majority of people in our community, we are deeply saddened by the violence we have seen in our city in recent days. There can be no justification for attacks on police officers and property. Any attempt to foment trouble or foster division among us, or to intimidate and terrorise people because of their race or religion, should be resisted and rejected.

Racism and sectarianism are always wrong. Jesus Christ could hardly have been clearer: he calls us to love one another.

The scenes we have witnessed here recently are countercultural. Our city enjoys a reputation for being a friendly, welcoming and neighbourly city. We should cherish that reputation and protect it.

The kind of trouble we have seen this week is described by some as "recreational rioting", but it can have potentially disastrous and life-lasting consequences for the perpetrators, and life-changing consequences for its victims. It is distressing, too, for the youngest and oldest of our neighbours who live in the areas where it has been happening.

We call for calm and restraint at this time. We urge anyone with influence over young people involved in the trouble, and whose futures might be blighted by criminal records, to counsel them wisely: don't get drawn into violence; don't listen to hate mongers; you are better than this; we are better than this.

The Learning Process in Cork, Cloyne and Ross

The Children and Family Ministry Working Group in the United Dioceses of Cork, Cloyne and Ross, in dialogue with the Bishop, the Right Reverend Dr Paul Colton,

have developed a Learning Process to encourage all

parishes in the Diocese to reflect on their outreach, inclusion and engagement of children and families.

The Learning Process was piloted in three parishes: Cobh and Glanmire Union, Fanlobbus Union, and Kinsale Union. They presented their experiences at the CCR Children and Family Ministry Gathering on 1st March, and a summary presentation on plans for the Learning Presentation was given at the clergy day conference on 3rd March.

The Learning Process is now being rolled out across the entire Diocese of Cork, Cloyne and Ross.

Bishop Colton explained: "A renewed focus on children and family ministry was one of the objectives I set for my silver jubilee year as bishop in 2024. I am delighted to have had the partnership in this of both the Children and Family Ministry Group in the Diocese which is convened by the Reverend Abigail Sines, and also the Diocesan Board of Education. A lot of work went into preparing the materials and testing the process in pilot parishes. Now I encourage every parish and chaplaincy to engage with this process".

The upcoming summer offers a great opportunity to engage with families and to gather input for the learning process. This can place in a variety of ways — over a cuppa in the hall, a picnic in the church yard or an informal chat after a Sunday morning service.

All parishes in the Diocese are encouraged to complete their Learning Process portfolio by Friday, 14 November upon which they will receive a basket with family ministry resources and a framed certificate. All parishioners and visitors will be able to see the certificate displayed in the church or church hall once the parish's participation is certified.


The convenor of the Cork, Cloyne and Ross Children and Family Ministry Group, the Reverend Abigail Sines, said:

Cathedral Calls

80 years of Christian Aid's impact celebrated in Belfast Cathedral

Eight decades of generosity, prayer, advocacy and humanitarian response were celebrated on Friday evening (20th June) at Belfast Cathedral at a special service of thanksgiving to mark Christian Aid Ireland turning 80.

The service was held to commemorate World Refugee Day, reflecting Christian Aid's foundation in 1945 to respond to the plight of refugees in Europe at the end of the Second World War.

Guests included the Church of Ireland's Primate, Archbishop John McDowell; the Presbyterian Church in Ireland's Moderator, the Rt Revd Dr Trevor Gribben; the Methodist Church in Ireland's President and Lay Leader, the Revd Alan Wardlow and Mrs Elaine Barnett; Junior Minister in the

Christian Aid's work tackles both the symptoms and root causes of poverty around the world, enabled by its partners, volunteers, staff, member churches, and local congregations and parishes. The service focused on the challenges ahead and recommitted Christian Aid to striving for a world free from the scandal of poverty. Contributions included reflections from Christian Aid's history, and music from Renaissance Choir and Intercultural Worship Ireland.

Bishop Trevor Williams, who was formerly Chair of Christian Aid Ireland, preached on how eternal values enable us to live well together by loving God "with all our heart, soul and mind and our neighbours as ourselves ... and, remember, Jesus showed us in the parable of the Good Samaritan that neighbourliness is caring for those in need."

He added: "How many times have you said: 'When I listen to the news, I feel so helpless, the suffering is so awful and

there is nothing I can do about it?" I have good news for you, this is precisely why Christian Aid exists."

Bishop Williams recalled a visit to Mali, in West Africa, during his time as a Christian Aid trustee, in which he visited a village where a large reservoir had been built by local people to irrigate a market garden and provide a reliable and healthy food supply for the community. However, out of all of the progress made, the villagers concluded that the greatest achievement was peace – the resolution of a tense dispute over leadership in the village, settled with the help of the Christian Aid partner agency; this, in turn, enabled all the other life-changing development work to take place.

"Thank God for Christian Aid," he remarked in conclusion. "For its 80 years of seeking to be an agency of God's loving concern for the world. For its way of working respecting the dignity, intelligence and integrity of those they work with, and for its commitment to the Churches, to enable us to play our part in being agents of God's loving concern for all of God's creation."

Christian Aid Ireland Chief Executive Rosamond Bennett said that the service was an opportunity to celebrate 80 years of global impact, and to thank the supporters, partners and staff who had made it possible.

She added: "Since 1945, Christian Aid has brought hope to people living in poverty and crisis around the world. Yet our anniversary is also a reminder that our task is incomplete. Conflict, the climate crisis, and inequality for women and girls mean that poverty continues to scar millions of lives. Today, 80 years after we were founded, we recommit

ourselves to continuing our work to create a world in which everyone can have a full life, a life free from poverty, a life before death."

Christian Aid Ireland is sponsored by the Irish Council of Churches and seven church denominations – the Church of Ireland, the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, the Methodist Church in Ireland, the Non-Subscribing Presbyterian Church of Ireland, the Moravian Church in Britain and Ireland, the Salvation Army, and the Society of Friends (Quakers).

Church of Ireland promotes support for refugees

Members of the Church of Ireland share stories on how they welcome and integrate refugees in a new video released today ahead of World Refugee Day on Thursday 20 June.

The film includes interviews with Helen Livingstone and David Maganda from All Nations Ministries in Belfast, and the Revd Abigail Sines and Dr Naomi Masheti from the Carraig Centre and Cork Migrant Centre. It seeks to inspire and encourage local churches to support refugees not only in this year's Refugee Week but at any time throughout the year.

Produced by Pelumi Adewuyi for the Primate's Reference Group on Ethnic Diversity, Inclusion and Racial Justice, the project was funded by the Church of Ireland Priorities Fund. The Primate's Reference Group is an initiative of Archbishop John McDowell, chaired by him with Dr Lucy Michael as the group's secretary.



In a motion proposed by Dr Michael and seconded by Stella Obe at the General Synod's 2023 meeting in Wexford, the General Synod acknowledged 'the impact of anti–refugee and migrant hatred in our communities' and sought suggestions from the Church's dioceses 'regarding ways in which the Church can counter the language of anti–refugee and migrant hatred at the local level and communicate a strong message of Christian welcome to all.'



Accountant accused of cheating church children's charity out of more than £200k

An accountant is accused of swindling a children's charity established mainly by Mothers Union members out of more than £200,000 throughout a period of just over 12 years. He was a member of the board of St Anne's Cathedral, Church of Ireland Trustees, The Northern Ireland Network of Child Contact Centres and The Church of Ireland Retirement Trust.

Robert Moore (72) appeared at Laganside Magistrates Court in Belfast on Tuesday morning to face a total of seven charges.

Moore, of Circular Road, Newtownabbey, Co Antrim, is charged with fraud by abuse of position, four counts of forgery and two counts of false accounting.

According to the indictment it is alleged he defrauded the trustees of Central Belfast Contact Centre out of £206,647.96p by having bogus cheques written out to himself between December 2009 and January 2022.

He is also accused of producing four fake accountant's reports under the names of Peter Cosgrove and Aisling McCrory on dates between January 2018 and February 2022.

Lastly, he is charged with falsely submitting forged accountant's reports to the Charity Commission and Companies House.

bail

Standing in the dock at Laganside Courthouse on Tuesday wearing a dark blue suit, white shirt and gold tie, he acknowledged the charges against him but no pleas were entered.

His solicitor Denis Moloney accepted the defendant had a case to answer and Moore was freed on his own bail of

£500, with the matter sent to the crown court on a date to be fixed.

According to the Charity Commission website, the Central Belfast Contact Centre is "a safe, friendly and neutral place where children of separated families can spend time with one or both parents, and sometimes other family members."

According to Companies House records Moore was a director of the Central Belfast Contact Centre until resigning his position on February 18, 2022.

He was also formerly a director of several other companies, including the board of St Anne's Cathedral, Church of Ireland Trustees, The Northern Ireland Network of Child Contact Centres and The Church of Ireland Retirement Trust.

All these directorships were resigned in 2022.

Moore was also formerly a director of housing association Choice Affordable Housing and its maintenance branch, Choice Services, before resigning those directorships in 2017 and 2018 respectively.

Lastly, he was a director of two now defunct companies in Trinity Developments (Northern Ireland) Ltd, which was dissolved in 2016, and Oaklee Employment Services Limited which was wound up in 2018.

There is no suggestion of any wrongdoing on the part of Central Belfast Contact Centre or any of the other companies.
