



C of I Bishop highlights God's sovereignty in referendum

Bishop Harold Miller of Down and Dromore posted this comment on his diocese web site -

Many of you, like me, will have spent long hours listening to the arguments on both sides of the Referendum debate. You have tried to weigh

things up, wondered what future is best for the UK, and sought to get behind the 'heat' of many of the debates to find some 'light' in these important matters.

You may also, like me, have found yourself frustrated in the search to find out what is truth and what is myth, and to resist the fearmongering which has gone on on both sides.

On 23 June, all of us are invited to come off the fence and make a judgement in the matter as we cast our vote. There are some things we would do well to remember:

First, we might well offer a prayer of thanksgiving that we live in a democratic society, where our vote really counts, and where we can freely and safely exercise it. A vote is a valuable commodity!

Second, we might well offer a prayer for wisdom, as we make our decision. This is the kind of decision usually delegated to Parliament alone. The referendum gives us a sense of the vital and life—changing decisions with which we entrust our politicians, and on which we often comment from the safe distance of not having to make them ourselves. Now it is our turn.

Third, we might intercede with God that his sovereignty would reign above all other sovereignties in this knife-edge of a vote. A lot hangs on this, and, whatever the outcome, we will have issues to face. May God be the one clearly and finally in control!

Then, as the slogan says, 'Just do it'. Cast your vote according to your God given conscience and accept the outcome with grace.

Prayers in Parliament Square tonight

Hundreds of Christians are expected to pray in Parliament Square on the eve before the EU referendum as an increasingly fractious debate enters the last two days.

Both sides have been accused of stoking division as the campaigns to remain and leave the European Union re-started after a suspension following the death of MP Jo Cox. Rev Patrick Allerton, associate vicar of St Dionis in Fulham, said a gathering outside Parliament on Wednesday evening will pray for the "healing of our land and healing in political terms" hours before the polls open on Thursday morning.

The <u>event</u> from 7-8pm is for Christians of all traditions and is "totally without agenda or political line", Allerton told Christian Today.

"It is a visible statement to the watching world that the church is alive and engaged," he said. "It is about being a city on a hill and a lamp on its stand."

Northern Ireland supporters attend service at Somme

Lurgan Presbyterian cleric Stephen Kennedy conducted a service of remembrance on behalf of several hundred Northern Ireland football supporters at the Somme village of Thiepval in France on Sunday last.

Stephen, assistant minister of Hill Street
Presbyterian Church in Lurgan, is in France with
his father Danny Kennedy, the Ulster Unionist
MLA, and uncles and cousins from Portadown
and Armagh and he was invited by the
Amalgamated of Northern Ireland Supporters'
clubs to officiate at a short service.

Several hundred Northern Ireland fans made the emotional 170-mile pilgrimage to the iconic First

World War battle site where 5,000 Ulstermen died a century ago.

Stephen Kennedy said: "There was a huge amount of blood and much of it was Ulster blood. Soldiers decided that they would lay down their lives for our freedom. They literally numbered their days to secure our future.

"Meeting here today is both an honour and a privilege. One hundred years ago this area would have been completely unrecognisable. There was a huge amount of blood spilled, most of which was Ulster blood. It's so important to remember this sacrifice. But I would want to suggest to you today that there was an even more significant sacrifice than this. Jesus sacrificed Himself so that we might be rescued," said Stephen.

"The Bible and the Gospel calls us to think through these things. The question for us today is what would it profit us if our team did well at the Euros? What would it profit us if we had a great time and party in France but we lost our own soul? Jesus would call us all to trust in Him, because only through Him can true security and fulfilment be found."

The supporters all solemnly joined in the prayerful and dignified ceremony at the impressive stone memorial complete with a piper's lament.

The Ulster Tower near the Somme was built on land gifted by a grateful French government for the ill-fated attack British troops made against overwhelming German defensive lines.

Curator of the Ulster Tower is Teddy Colligan, a Bessbrook, South Armagh man. The Northern Ireland supporters also toured Thiepval Wood, from which Irish troops launched at times abortive attacks.

Church in crisis as attendance plummets, Methodist Conference lay leader

Dr Fergus O'Ferrall, lay leader of the Methodist Conference, noted how attendance and membership figures for all the major denominations in Ireland were plummeting, writes Alf McCreary in Belfast Telegraph

Preaching on Conference Sunday in Thomas Street Methodist Church, Portadown, he said: "This is a time of crisis for Christianity, and in facing this crisis, we in the institutional church need to ask questions.

"Is our mission being failed by the potency of false ideas outside the Church or is it being failed by the potency of false ideas inside the Church?" He asked if there are too many summer or sunshine Christians shrinking from the cost of Christian service.

"Are we failing to develop a critical mass of disciples with warm hearts, tough hands, wet feet and renewed minds focused on God's mission every day?"

Dr O'Ferrall quoted from a newspaper article outlining that membership of the Presbyterian Church has dropped by 40% since the 1970s, and that the Church of Ireland's average attendance for Sunday worship is only 15% of the Church's nominal membership.

He said that about 34% of Irish Catholics attend weekly Mass, and the membership of the Methodist Church shows "a steady decline to 50,000, in an island of six million people".

"No religion is by far the single largest identification among the population in Britain where membership of institutional Christianity has fallen rapidly.

"We dare not underestimate the crisis facing Churches in the western world in this post-Christendom 21st century, and we need to analyse carefully our context for mission," he added.

Dr O'Ferrall said reconciliation was paramount: "It is about relationships, with God and each other. It involves people, communities and nations learning to live together with deeply-held differences, in a spirit of love and respect. It is to work for justice and to seek truth in the light of God's mercy and peace."

Lisburn cathedral warden treks 192 fund raising miles

Nonie Scott, a churchwarden at Lisburn Cathedral, Diocese of Connor, has completed a 192 mile trek across England to raise funds for local charity Abaana!

Nonie, who is a keen walker, followed the famous Wainwright's Coast to Coast route, from St Bees on the Cumbrian coast across England to Robin Hood Bay on the Northumberland coast.

En route she crossed the mountains of the Lake District and the Pennines and traversed the Yorkshire Dales and the North York Moors! In total the trek climbed some 8,800 metres – the height of Mount Everest!



Nonie (pictured above) said: "The weather for most of the walk was very hot but temperatures dropped for the last couple of days and this made walking easier. I met a lot of lovely people and passed through some very interesting places, such as Kirkby Stephen where the annual Appleby Horse Fair was in full swing and Richmond, a large medieval town.

"It was amazing to finally arrive at Robin Hood Bay on the North Sea coast after 15 days 'on the road."

Nonie said she wanted want to thank all those who so generously sponsored her. All the money raised is going to Abaana, a charity based in Bangor, Co Down, which has been working to help children living in poverty in Africa, principally in Uganda, for the last 18 years.

Abaana has built 13 primary schools, currently provides sponsorship for some 1,350 children to receive an education and works with children living rough on the streets of Kampala in Uganda. (To find out more, go to www.abaana.org).

A spokesperson for Abaana said: "We are so grateful to Nonie for undertaking such an amazing challenge in aid of the work of Abaana. C of E to ordain 950 men and women

The Church of England is on course to ordain around 950 men and women this year to minister in churches across the country.

This summer marks the start of a wave of ordinations of deacons and priests from a wide

range of ages and professions including a former lorry driver, an award-winning performance poet, a former member of the British Army, teachers and a former midwife.

The Bishop of Sheffield, Steven Croft, Chair of the Church of England's Ministry Council, said the ordination of the new priests and deacons was a joyous occasion and a sign of a hopeful future for the Church of England.

"The ordination of so many men and women is an occasion of joy, not only for these priests and deacons and their friends and families but for the communities they will serve and for the Church of England as a whole," he said.

"I thank God that so many different men and women have answered God's call to ordained ministry, for their witness to the good news of the gospel and for the life of service to all that they are embarking upon. They are a sign of a hopeful future for the Church of England."

Those being ordained include Lucy Savage, 26, who will be made a deacon at Wakefield Cathedral on July 2.

Her journey to ordained ministry was first inspired aged just nine years old by her mother

Jenny's ordination in 1999 at Bradford Cathedral.

"I remember having an overwhelming feeling at my mother's ordination service that this was going to be me one day - I had a great sense of peace and a curiosity about God," she said.

"Over the years I have been inspired by her example of love and service and her great hospitality to all."

Also being ordained as a deacon is Catherine Okoronkwo, a former teacher, who will be ordained on June 26 in Lichfield Cathedral.

The daughter of a former United Nations diplomat, and born in Nigeria, Catherine was brought up in an Anglican family, has lived in the Middle East and was educated in Israel, the US and the UK.

One of the turning points in her journey to ordination was being asked by the Archbishop of York Dr John Sentamu if she had thought about ordination - after meeting him following a service in St Christopher's Church, Sparkhill, Birmingham.

"Something had always kept calling me back to think about what my faith would mean in terms of lived experience and how I might do something practical that reflects my passion and commitment to follow Jesus," she said.

"This chance meeting with the Archbishop was a key moment in helping me to take this calling seriously."

Rev Sharon Lord, a former midwife, was ordained a priest at All Saints Church, Burton-on-Trent on Sunday. (June 19)

She said: "In 2012 God sent me a 'curve ball' in the form of a calling to be ordained. It would not go away and kept on coming back.

"I had a really successful career and I loved it - and at the time, being ordained was not in my plan at all.

"I loved my job in the health service and I loved being a midwife with a passion but I don't miss it, I'm having a fabulous time and I think that it is a sign that this new vocation has come from God."

Rev Phil Maries, a former scaffolder and lorry driver for 32 years, will be ordained as priest on June 25 in his parish of Normanton All Saints, a former mining village in the Diocese of West Yorkshire and the Dales.

His journey to faith and eventual ordination was influenced by a CB broadcast he heard by a vicar in the early part of his career while working as driver on the road to Glasgow.

He said: "The vicar who spoke on the CB radio broadcast would not have known if he had reached anybody - but that was his calling, and it was a life-changing moment for me. Looking back, my life could have gone two ways - the way that it has done, or I

could have ended up in prison or an alcoholic and in a very low place.

"The faithfulness of that vicar has had an enormous impact on my life and I want to pay that back and do the same for somebody else."

Rev Sunny George, a former teacher in an engineering college, who settled in the UK from India in 2006, will be ordained a priest on July 2 in Leicester Cathedral.

Rev Sunny, who ministers in All Saints Church, Leicester, said of his ordination as a priest: "It is a blessed occasion for me - I can see that God has been preparing me for this day."

As part of the ordination service, the new priests and deacons are addressed by a Bishop of the diocese in which they will serve who will say: "They are to proclaim the gospel in word and deed, as agents of God's purposes of love. They are to serve the community in which they are set, bringing to the Church the needs and hopes of all the people.

"They are to work with their fellow members in searching out the poor and weak, the sick and lonely and those who are oppressed and powerless, reaching into the forgotten corners of the world, that the love of God may be made visible."

English martyrs' relics to tour America

A nationwide tour of relics of St Thomas More and St John Fisher, two 16th-century martyrs who exemplified courage and conviction in the face of persecution, is part of the US Catholic Church's Fortnight for Freedom observance this year.

Both men were executed by King Henry VIII for their Catholic beliefs.

The "Strength of the Saints" relic tour will go to Miami, Baltimore, Pittsburgh, Philadelphia, Minnesota, Denver, Phoenix, Los Angeles and Washington.

The tour is sponsored in part by the Knights of Columbus and organised by the US Conference of Catholic Bishops along with Jesuit-run Stonyhurst College in Clitheroe, England.

"Witnesses to Freedom" is the theme of this year's June 21-July 4 fortnight observance.

The relics will travel with Jan Graffius, curator of collections at Stonyhurst, where they are kept.

"Relics are reminders of people we love," Graffius told The Visitor, newspaper of the Diocese of St Cloud, one of the stops on the tour.

"Parents keep baby shoes, locks of hair (and) birthday cards as reminders of those who are important to us. A physical object such as the More relic reminds us that he was a human being, and by viewing it, we find ourselves closer to him as a person.

"It is a prompt for reflection, examination and inquiry," she said. "And, hopefully, that experience can bring us closer to Thomas More and John Fisher as human beings and encourage us to learn more about them."

GAFCON 3 to take place in Jerusalem

The Chairman and Primates of the council of the Anglican splinter GAFCON have announced that the third GAFCON conference will be held in Jerusalem in 2018.

Their statement - "Jerusalem has a special place in the hearts of the GAFCON movement as it was the location of the first conference in 2008. Moreover, Jerusalem stands as a constant reminder of the birth of the Gospel and the movement's determination to remain true to the teachings of our Lord and his Holy Word.



"GAFCON was greatly blessed by both the initial conference and the second meeting in Nairobi in 2013. When Anglicans from across the Communion come together in unity it is a tremendous blessing, and we are excited to see the Church built up in the land where it was given its foundation." Dates and further details will be announced in due course.
