## 342,000+ teenagers started Duke of Edinburgh's Award last month

More than 342,000 teenagers have started a Duke of Edinburgh's Award (DofE) in the past 12 months, the highest number in the charity's 68-year history.

The charity said the rising number of teenagers doing their bronze, silver or gold award is a sign of the enthusiasm among many school leaders and parents for children to spend less time on their screens and more time outdoors.

Founded by Prince Philip in 1956, the award is considered one of his greatest legacies, inspired by his belief that "if you can get a young person to succeed in any one activity, then that feeling of success will spread over into many others".



After Philip's death in 2021, his youngest son, Prince Edward, took over as patron.


The Rt Rev Andrew Swift, Bishop of Brechin described the day as "a wonderful occasion."
