MP's tribute to Church's annual remembrance of UDR

"I had the honour of attending the Service of Thanksgiving for the UDR, and all those who served and gave their lives to defend NI from the scourge of terrorism over the 23 years of the life of the regiment", writes Sammy Wilson MP.

Mr Wilson commented - Since I became MP for East Antrim, it has been my honour to attend this service held in St Saviours Church in Connor each year.

The most poignant part of the service is when they read out the names of those who were murdered because they dared to serve in the UDR.

Last night I met the widow of one such soldier who was murdered at his own home, leaving his wife and three children. UDR soldiers were targets for terrorists 24 hours a day, not just when they were on patrol.

Over the lifetime of the regiment 40,000 men and women served in the UDR; 198 were murdered during their service but even after they had retired they were still targets. A further 62 were murdered even though they were no longer members.

Hundreds were left maimed as a result of injuries sustained because of terrorist murder attempts.

It is important we remember the sacrifices made, and it was great to see so many veterans at the service proudly wearing their medals and remembering their fallen comrades.

As The Troubles fade from memory, it is sad to see that there is a generation growing up who don't even know what the letters UDR stand for let alone the important work they did in securing peace in NI.

I thank Rev Ian Magowan and the local UDR ex members for their commitment to keeping alive this the memory of those who served our country so well in dark times.

We must never forget.

Remembrance of WW2 plane crash on Binevenagh Mountain

Nine RAF airmen who lost their lives in a plane crash on Binevenagh Mountain 81 years ago were remembered at a service in Aghanloo Parish Church this week where a plinth was unveiled in their honour.

Their Consolidated Liberator Aircraft from RAF Ballykelly had been on anti-submarine duty when it crashed into the cliff face during bad weather on 24th June 1944.



A granite stone bearing the names of the fallen crew members was unveiled by a member of Limavady Royal Air Force Association. The plinth was dedicated by the Bishop of Derry, Rt Rev Andrew Forster, during a service led by the Rector of the Aghanloo, Balteagh, Carrick and Tamlaghtard Group of Parishes, Rev Rhys Jones.

Among those in attendance was John Fraser Gordon Leonard – a nephew of one of the lost crewmen – who had travelled from Edinburgh for today's unveiling.

Bishop Andrew said it was a privilege to be part of the service. "I had two great-uncles who both served in the RAF in the Second World War," he said, "and when [Rev](#) Rhys told me about the whole endeavour of having this memorial placed here in memory of the men who died on that Liberator, I didn't want to be anywhere else today but here – acknowledging their service and thinking back to members of my own family who served in the RAF." Local political representatives, including Alan Robinson MLA, joined members of the Royal Air Force Association from both Limavady and Coleraine, and representatives of Limavady Branch of The Royal British Legion for the Service of Dedication and Commemoration. His Majesty's Deputy Lord Lieutenant Lady Karen Girvan MBE laid one of several wreaths which were left by the plinth.

25 people killed in church in Damascus on Corpus Christi

On Sunday, June 22, the solemnity of Corpus Christi, at least 25 people were killed after two armed men stormed the Greek Orthodox Church of St. Elias in Douailah, on the outskirts of Damascus, Syria.

Bishop of London urges peers to oppose assisted dying bill

The Bishop of London has spoken of her concerns for the most vulnerable, as the Terminally III Adults (End of Life) Bill passed its third reading in the House of Commons by a narrow margin on Friday.

In a statement on the Church of England's website, **Rt Rev Dame Sarah Mullaly** who is a former Chief Nursing Officer
and now the Church of England's lead bishop for health and
social care, said there was "mounting evidence" that the bill





















"is unworkable and unsafe and poses a risk to the most vulnerable people in our society."

Bishop Sarah went on to urge peers to oppose the assisted dying bill when it goes to the House of Lords for scrutiny:

"If enacted, this legislation would come into force amid serious shortfalls in adult social care, a post code lottery in palliative care and well documented pressures on the NHS, multiplying the potential risks to the most vulnerable. It does not prevent terminally ill people who perceive themselves to be a burden to their families and friends from choosing 'assisted dying. And it would mean that we became a society where the state fully funds a service for terminally ill people to end their own lives but shockingly only funds around one third of palliative care.

"Every person is of immeasurable and irreducible value, and should be able to access the care and support that they need – a principle that I know is shared by those all faiths and none.

"We must oppose a law that puts the vulnerable at risk and instead work to improve funding and access to desperately needed palliative care services."

The bill, which would allow terminally ill adults with six months or less to live to get medical assistance to end their own lives, passed by just 23 votes. 314 MPs voted for the bill with 291 against.

Many MPs who had previously voted for the bill in November changed their mind, meaning the bill's margin of

support halved. Over the last few months, organisations including The Royal College of Psychiatrists, Royal College of Physicians, Association for Palliative Medicine and Disability Rights UK raised the alarm over what they said was a lack of safeguards and scrutiny around the bill which was proposed by the MP Kim Leadbeater.

The bill will now pass through the House of Lords, before being passed back to MPs who will look at any changes suggested by peers. The bill would then become law unless it's blocked by peers or runs out of Parliamentary time.


communities. Pictured at the exhibition are Dean Dermot Dunne and Dee Huddleston, Christian Aid Ireland's Church and Community Officer.





'We Believe': new reflections mark 1700 years of the Nicene Creed

The Church of England has published a new booklet of biblical reflections and prayers to mark the 1700th anniversary of the Council of Nicaea.

The Nicene Creed, which is one of the foundational statements of Christian belief, was agreed at the Council in AD 325. It was attended by bishops from around the world and convened by the Emperor Constantine.

The Council sought to resolve disputes about the identity of Jesus Christ and affirmed that he is "of one being with the Father". The Creed was expanded in its present form at the First Council of Constantinople in AD 381. It sets out the Church's faith in the Trinity - Father, Son and Holy Spirit - and has been recited in Christian worship down the centuries as a shared declaration of belief, unity and hope. It is now shared across all the main Christian traditions.



The new booklet is a 24 day devotional and is called 'We Believe'. Published by Church House Publishing, it explores the theological depth and contemporary relevance of the Nicene Creed – one of the most enduring and universal expressions of Christian faith. It invites readers to engage prayerfully with each phrase of the Creed. Through daily Scripture passages, commentary, prayers and prompts for reflection, the booklet encourages individuals and communities to explore what it means to say "we believe" in the context of today's world.

Dr Michael Ipgrave, Bishop of Lichfield and Chair of the Liturgical Commission, said:

"The Nicene Creed has been a cornerstone of Christian belief for 1700 years – a statement of faith that connects us not only to one another, but also to generations before us as well as to Christians across the world today. We Believe is a timely and beautifully written resource that will help churches explore this historic creed afresh, inviting reflection, deepening discipleship, and opening space for theological discovery. I warmly commend it to parishes, groups and individuals across the Church."

Printed copies are available as single booklets or in packs of ten for use in parishes. The reflections are also available via the Church of England's Everyday Faith app.
