Presbyterian matchplay

Presbyterian minister sets up Shinty versus Hurling match in West Belfast



In the long tradition of Gaelic games in these islands, four teams will come together in August for two unique matches at Corrigan Park in West Belfast, when Shinty teams from Scotland will go head-to-head with Select Antrim Hurling and Camogie teams using composite rules, to celebrate 140th anniversary of Antrim GAA.

Launching 'Between the Sticks' when Select Antrim Hurling and Camogie teams will meet two Scottish Shinty teams on



2 August in a composite rules match at Antrim GAA's current ground, Corrigan Park in West Belfast.

Part of Antrim's 140th anniversary celebrations and Féile an Phobail, the Shinty teams, from Stirling and the Isle of Skye, are being brought to Belfast by the Presbyterian Church in Ireland's minister in West Belfast, Rev David Moore.

Pictured at the launch, which took place at Corrigan Park are (LtoR) Antrim's County Chairman, Séamus McMullan and Rev David Moore.

Rev David Moore of PCI's special ministry in the west of the city known as An Tionólan / The Gathering, said that he was really looking forward to the match. Speaking at the launch, which took place at Corrigan Park, he said, "It'll be a great afternoon's craic, something different, and I am really looking forward to it. I'm also grateful to Collie Donnelly,



Antrim GAA and St John's GAC for getting behind this, running with it and making it happen.

With the men's Shinty team coming from Stirling, and the women's team from the Isle of Skye, both sets of players are being brought to Belfast by the Presbyterian Church in Ireland's (PCI) minister, Rev David Moore. The match, which is free to attend, will take place at Corrigan Park, the home of Antrim GAA, on Saturday, 2 August, as part of Féile an Phobail.

"We have called it, 'Between the Sticks' or 'Idir Camánaibh', as it paints a picture of the two Gaelic games coming together, and is also symbolic of much more. I know the players from Scotland are really looking forward to the match as well, and if I am honest, it will be really interesting

to see. While it is free for everyone, we will have a voluntary collection for the 'Friends of the Cancer Centre'."

Playing Shinty-Hurling-Camogie composite rules, with 14 players aside, aspects of each sport are involved, which means that each side is equally disadvantaged. Each half of will last for 35 minutes, with teams using their own sticks, with one half played with a sliotar, the other with a shinty ball. Like the scoring, the goal to be used is the goal used for hurling.

Current Antrim Hurlers and Camogie players, as well as current County Chair, Séamus McMullan, attended the launch. Collie Donnelly, the former Antrim hurler and former County Chairperson, who is helping to organise the match, said he was also looking forward to the games on 2 August at Corrigan Park, the home of St John's GAA and Antrim's current home ground. "Corrigan Park itself has a great tradition of hosting Gaelic games since the 1920s and with its recent upgrade has a capacity close on 4000 spectators. Like all Antrim Gaels, we are hopeful of a positive decision soon on Casement Park.

"On the day we hope to create a carnival atmosphere with a 'Photo Booth' opportunity with some of our County Hurlers for the children, which is being provided by our County sponsor, Fibrus. Our half pace hurlers will also be showing their skills and pace during the half-time interval entertainment for all the family."

Mr Donnelly continued, "As part of our 140th year of celebration, we are delighted to be involved in this cross-community Shinty Challenge, as it gives us an opportunity to

show what sport can do to share all our cultures in a positive way.”

The first Shinty-Hurling match between Irish and Scottish Gaelic teams took place in 1896 in London. Annual international fixtures have taken place in both countries over the years with 2024’s international between Ireland and Scotland resulting in a victory for Ireland.

Mr Moore concluded by saying. “There has been a friendship between Ireland and Scotland that has existed for centuries, sharing similar language, culture and sport. None is restricted to one tradition, nor does it need to exclude anyone, which is what we are trying to do through An Tionólann, as PCI seeks to reconnect and engage with the west of the city.

“We want to celebrate that, and Antrim GAA’s 140th birthday, with two friendly matches played between teams from different countries and cultures sharing a love of sport and the Gaelic language,” he said.

Cathedral Calls

Canterbury Cathedral hosts memorial to migrant deaths

Canterbury Cathedral has hosted a poignant memorial to the more than 500 people known to have lost their lives attempting to cross from Calais and Northern France to the UK.

The official figure of 500 deaths reflects records since 1999, with the true number believed to be much higher due to missing persons and unrecorded cases.

The Cathedral described it as a “tragic milestone” in the refugee crisis.

The project is titled Victims of the Border: a memorial for those who journeyed in hope, and marks International Refugee Week (16th - 22nd June). It listed the names of all identified individuals who died on the journey, with additional

plaques honouring unidentified victims, or those whose families requested privacy.

The Rt Revd Rose Hudson-Wilkin, Bishop of Dover and Bishop in Canterbury, said: “The theme for Refugee Week this year is focused on community. As a woman of faith, I am reminded that God loved the world that he created. I believe in the goodness of all God created and in the humanity which I am part of.”

As part of a collaboration between the Diocese in Europe, the Diocese of Canterbury, and the United Society Partners in the Gospel, Anglican Refugee Support Lead Bradon Muilenburg is based in Calais and will be speaking throughout the week in the Cathedral’s Crypt.

Sharing some of the stories behind the names, he said: “This is an opportunity for us as Christians to come alongside those who mourn. We ask visitors to choose a name from the memorial, think about that person and their hopes and dreams for sanctuary. Pray for them, and their families. Help support safe routes to avoid these tragedies.”

Liverpool’s Metropolitan Cathedral granted Grade I listed status

Liverpool’s Metropolitan Cathedral, renowned for its distinctive ‘wigwam’ shape, has been granted Grade I listed status. Affectionately known as “the Mersey funnel”, the cathedral was completed in 1962.



it is celebrated as a leading example of British mid-century design.

The circular interior was created to encourage togetherness during Mass, while stained glass in the roof casts vibrant purples and blues onto the altar.

The Archbishop of Liverpool, Most Rev John Sherrington, welcomed the upgrade in listing from Grade II to Grade I. “The building has been described as the ‘soul of the city,’” he said. “It is very significant that the cathedral has been recognised during the Jubilee Year, which has the theme ‘pilgrims of hope’.

“I hope the upgraded listed status allows us to welcome even more pilgrims to our striking Mother Church.” He also thanked members of the congregation, past and present,

who have “contributed to the upkeep and repair of the building for over 60 years”.

Catherine Croft, Director of the Twentieth Century Society, said: “Liverpool now rightly has two magnificent Grade I listed cathedrals which together demonstrate just how varied, exciting, and emotionally uplifting twentieth-century architecture can be. A great vessel of post-war glass, sculpture and design, the listing upgrade will help ensure the modernist cathedral’s careful long-term conservation and appreciation by all who visit – to worship or just to marvel.”

Diocese of Clogher will celebrate the ordination of a new deacon this Sunday

On June 29, the feast of Saints Peter and Paul, Stephen Sherry from the Parish of Tullycorbet will be ordained as a deacon.

He is a seminarian at St Patrick's College Maynooth who has completed his studies for the priesthood.

The ordination mass will take place at St Macartan's Cathedral, Monaghan, at 3pm. The Bishop of Clogher, Bishop Larry Duffy, will be the ordaining prelate, joined by priests and deacons from across the diocese and beyond.

After graduating from the University of Limerick in 2018 with a degree in English and History, he embarked on the formation process, spending a preparatory year at the Royal English College in Spain.

In September 2019, he joined the seminary at St Patrick's College, Maynooth.

Mr Sherry said: "As I prepare for my diaconate ordination, I look back fondly on my time of discernment and formation and look forward to my time as a deacon and please God as a priest in the near future in service of the Church in the Diocese of Clogher." The mass on Sunday is open to all.
