
## Foyle on the Somme

Intrepid Year 10 adventurers left Foyle College at 00:30 touching down in Brussels via Dublin airport.

The first stop saw them visit the awe-inspiring Tyne Cot Cemetery: almost 12 000 headstones, plus 34000 names of the missing. The chatter on the coach quickly faded when they were faced with the magnitude of what lay before them.

Following a lunchtime pit stop of some baguettes and an abundance of Belgian sunshine, they had







a very different kind of experience as they stopped at the Langemark-Poelkapelle German Cemetery. The stark black-

stone graves of 44000 German soldiers - many of whom student volunteers not much older than our own pupils - brought a hard-hitting lesson about the cost of war. A highlight of the field trip was a visit to the Ulster Memorial Tower.

# Archbishop of Wales retires amid cathedral behaviour failings

The Archbishop of Wales has announced his retirement from the role with immediate effect.

The BBC reports that in a statement issued on Friday evening, Andrew John confirmed he would also be retiring as Bishop of Bangor on 31 August.

His sudden retirement follows a turbulent period for his Bangor diocese, after the publication of the summaries of two reports into failures last month.

The summaries mentioned "a culture in which sexual boundaries seemed blurred" and excessive alcohol consumption as well as governance and safeguarding weaknesses at Bangor Cathedral.

There is no suggestion the archbishop has behaved inappropriately.

# Good Relations grants for ecumenical work by churches

Through the kind support of Benefact Trust, the Irish Council of Churches (ICC) awards Good Relations grants up to the sum of £450 (or equivalent in euro) to churches and organisations who support ecumenical work within their local area.

These grants should enable churches to further the work of peace and reconciliation either through single events or an ongoing project.

Church of Ireland parishes and cathedrals are eligible for this grant as the Church is an ICC member church. The person making the application must be currently living in either jurisdiction on the island of Ireland.


To apply for the grant, you need to:

- demonstrate the need for your proposal within your local area (using evidence);
- demonstrate an outcome that enhances good community relations or improves knowledge and understanding of how to deepen good relations across religious barriers; and
- submit a secure financial proposal with clear costs

Please note the following exclusions. The ICC will not normally fund:

- applications that only operate within a single denomination

- retrospective expenditure



- for-profit enterprises
- costs that are already covered by other sources
- costs not clearly linked to the project
- projects that provide no significant benefit

Applications will stay open for 2025 or until expenditure for the grant is complete.



## Joint Pilgrimage Marks 800th Anniversary of Canonisation of St Laurence O'Toole

From May 8th-10th, 2025, in celebration of the 800th anniversary of St Laurence O'Toole's canonisation, congregation members from Christ Church Cathedral joined pilgrims from the Church of Ireland Dioceses of Dublin and Glendalough and the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Dublin for a memorable weekend of travel to Eu in Normandy, France.

The group was accompanied by Dean Dermot Dunne, Archbishops Michael Jackson and Dermot Farrell, and parish priests Ivan Tonge and John Flaherty.

Born in Castledermot, Co Kildare in 1128, Laurence O'Toole was the son of the King of Hy Murray. At ten years old, he was given as hostage to Dermot McMurrough, King of Leinster. Two years later, he was given into the care of the monastery in Glendalough, an experience that laid the foundation for his dedication to a life of spiritual service and growth. Laurence later became Abbot of Glendalough and then Archbishop of Dublin, a role in which he endeavoured to save Irish lives by working to negotiate peace between the Irish kings and Ireland's Norman invaders. It was on one such diplomatic mission in 1180 that Laurence fell ill and died at a monastery in the town of Eu in Normandy. His tomb can be visited in the crypt of the Collegiate Church of St Laurence. Remnants of his skull are housed within a silver reliquary at the church.



St Laurence O'Toole's death in France, far from the country of his birth, has produced a historic bond between our respective Irish and French communities and particularly among the residents of Castledermot, Glendalough, Dublin, Rouen, and Eu.

The cathedral plans further celebration of the anniversary of St Laurence O'Toole's canonisation on his 14 November Feast Day.

## Religious Studies teachers Professional Learning Award for RE

During the 2024-25 academic year a group of postprimary Religious Studies teachers from Northern Ireland participated in a Professional Learning Award for RE funded by the Farmington Institute in Oxford.

Over five evening sessions the eight teachers explored a variety of themes led by members of the group. These included diversity in religious education; technology and

social media in the classroom; developing challenging learning in RE; and re-imagining the KS3 curriculum.

They also had several short specialist inputs from external contributors which acted as conversation starters for our professional dialogue during an evening meal after each of the sessions. Participants had a range of experience from Heads of Department and those with several decades of teaching Religious Studies to a couple of recent RS graduates of Stranmillis and Queen's. The group all contributed to all of the conversations and everyone benefitted from learning from one another and sharing professional practice.

The professional learning sessions were hosted by Dr James Nelson (Queen's University Belfast) and Dr Anita Gracie (Stranmillis University College).

## Many congratulations to Ven Gregor McCamley on the 60th anniversary of his ordination.


Gregor preached in Down Cathedral this Sunday at 11.30am as he and his wife Rosemary as well as family and friends celebrated this significant occasion.

### Giant's Causeway and Bushmills railway

This adventure took us along the rugged north coast of Northern Ireland, where legends walk the land and steam trains still puff proudly along the tracks.

Our destination? The magical Giant's Causeway, but with a twist! We got there the old-fashioned way... by train!

Our First Stop the Bushmills Railway:

Nestled just outside the historic town of Bushmills, you will find the tiny station. Here the train begins its gentle 2-mile journey to the Causeway coast. Taking 20 minutes the track

winds through green fields and over bridges, with sweeping views of the sea and don't forget to wave to the Golfers.

Next up: The Giant's Causeway!

Stepping off the train, we followed the path towards the Causeway. We decided to use the shuttle bus at the top, as we only had an hour for the train back. This is only £1 each way (per person over 5). They run every 5 minutes so not much of a que and much easier on little legs.

Off the bus and you will find over 40,000 hexagonal stones spilling out into the sea like a giant's staircase. According to legend, they were built by the mighty Finn McCool to cross to Scotland and honestly, it does feel like the work of giants.

### Top Wee Tips:

Trains run seasonally, so check ahead before you go.

You can walk one way and ride the train the other, great for mixing things up!

Whether you're chasing myths or just fancy a family-friendly rail adventure with epic views, the Bushmills Railway and Giant's Causeway make the perfect wee day out.

## Showcasing Cockle Row Cottages in Groomsport

This past Saturday, the Ulster Scots Agency showcased Ulster-Scots musical talent in the form of Piper Grahame Harris and Drummer Lee Lawson at Cockle Row Cottages in Groomsport.

Part of the summer festivities in the beautiful seaside village, the duo played between 2-4pm, when the Ulster Scots Agency also had a stand with various literature, resources and 'pruck.'

This was the first of three sessions the Ulster-Scots agency has arranged with Ards and North Down Borough Council at Cockle Row this summer, with two more planned for Saturday 26th July and Saturday 30th August (keep an eye on the US social media pages for further information).

As you may know, Groomsport is a village steeped in Ulster-Scots history. On 9th September 1636, 'Eagle Wing' set sail from the village, carrying more than 100 Ulster-Scots Presbyterians who were fleeing religious persecution. It was the first emigrant ship to leave Ulster for America, and while torrential weather forced it to abandon its voyage in the mid-Atlantic, it started the trend that ultimately resulted in the tremendous Ulster-Scots impact on the New World. Many would go on to become patriots, pioneers and even presidents in their new home.

Groomsport is also where the Duke of Schomberg landed at the head of King William III Prince of Orange's advance party, moving on to capture Carrickfergus Castle before uniting with the main body of the Williamite forces. Huge numbers of Ulster-Scots rallied to William's cause across Ulster, seeking to secure civil and religious liberty for all as part of The Glorious Revolution.
