North West to mark St. Colmcille Feast Day

Plans are in place to mark the Feast Day of St. Colmcille with a series of events taking place across the North West on the 9th of June, Katie Gillian writes in Donegal Daily.

The events are being organised in joint partnership with Derry City and Strabane District Council, Donegal County Council and other partners, as part of the final celebration of the Colmcille 1500 programme of activities to celebrate the life of the Saint.

Two special Feast Day Masses will be celebrated on the 9th of June, one in St. Eunan's Cathedral in Letterkenny, celebrated by the Bishop of Raphoe and broadcast on the RTÉ News Channel at 10.30am, and the second one celebrated by the Bishop of Derry from St. Columba's Church, Long Tower, at 7.30pm.

A pageant entitled: 'An Turas- The Journey' will take place after the Mass in Long Tower and the traditional Feast Day Blessing at St. Columb's Well on the 9th of June. Delivered by the North West Carnival initiative, in collaboration with In Your Space and Greater Shantallow Arts, the pageant is commissioned by Derry City and Strabane District Council and funded by the North West Development Fund and will explore Colmcille's life and legacy.

The Alley Theatre in Strabane will host the Battle of Knockavoe Anniversary Exhibition 1522-2022 from the 4th of June to the 22nd of July, commemorating the 500th Anniversary of the battle between the O'Donnells of Donegal and the O'Neills of Tyrone.

A 'Celebration of St. Columba's Life and Ministry' at St. Colmcille's Abbey in Churchtown/Rath Cnó, Gartan, on the 5th of June at 3pm, that will be attended by the Church of Ireland Bishop of Derry and Raphoe, Rt. Rev. Andrew Forster and will include music and children's activities.

St. Augustine's Church is celebrating 150 years since it was consecrated on the 9th of June 1872 with a special Feast Day performance by Opera Hibernia at 7.30pm. Clogher Bishops attend Ecumenical Prayer Service for Pentecost

Since 2000, the Roman Catholic and Church of Ireland bishops of Clogher have come together, along with members of their respective Church communities to mark together the Day of Pentecost or Pentecost Sunday, as it also known.

The Day of Pentecost marks the end of the fifty-day season of Easter. Moreover, it marks the descent of the Holy Spirit in the upper room and the beginning of apostolic preaching, thus marking a defining moment in the origin of the Christian Church. Christian associations with the feast begin with Acts of the Apostles 2: 1-45.

Each year, a site of historic significance in relation to the origins of the Christian church in different parts of the diocese is chosen to host this Ecumenical Service. The venue for this year's outdoor Pentecost service, Donagh Old Graveyard, is settled on a hillside close to Glaslough village, and is considered to be one of the oldest ecclesiastical sites in the country and is on a pilgrimage route associated with St Patrick. Within this protected graveyard there are the ruins of a medieval church which remained in use until 1690, a beautiful stone cross known as the Donagh Cross or the McKenna Cross (described by various experts as being 10th to 12th century), two cross-bases, two 17th century grave-slabs and a cross-shaped headstone dated 1666 as well as numerous examples of headstones with intricate evocative folk art inscribed upon them.

There was a good attendance at this year's Ecumenical Prayer Service for Pentecost held on Sunday, 5th June in

Donagh Old Graveyard, in Donagh Parish, Glaslough, Co. Monaghan.

The afternoon open air service was attended by people from across Fermanagh and Monaghan including parishioners of St Salvator's Parish Church, Glaslough as well as members of the congregation of St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church, Glennan, where everyone parked to get the shuttle bus to the graveyard a short distance away.

The service was attended by the two Bishops of Clogher, the Right Revd Dr. Ian Ellis, who gave the address, and the Most Revd Larry Duffy. The service was conducted by Fr. Hubert Martin, of St. Mary's assisted by Revd Margaret Pringle, who is looking after services in the Church of Ireland Donagh Group of parishes. The opening greeting and prayers were led by Bishop Larry Duffy.

During the service, two young people spoke about their views on Pentecost; Emma McQuaid from Beech Hill College and Sophie Brennan from Monaghan Collegiate.

The praise was led by Donagh Community Choir trained by Mrs Ethne McCord and accompanied by Mr Gerard Toal on the keyboard.

Bishop Ian Ellis, in his address reflected on what difference the Holy Spirit made to people's personal lives and church life.

He focused on three main themes; Change, Clarity and Conviction.

He said the dramatic events of the first Pentecost changed the disciples for ever. They were utterly changed and transformed.

A correspondent writes - The weather was fabulous for our Platinum Jubilee Party on Friday 3rd June, attended by over 160 people. Over 160 people of all ages enjoyed a meal in the hall before entertainment and dancing led by Joe Lagen as we celebrated 70 years of faithful service from our Queen.

Wilson's Hospital pupil success at Junk Kouture

Junk Kouture is an international youth fashion and sustainability competition where teenagers from six different countries compete to make fashion from recycled materials.

The 5th of May saw the first of six worldwide city finals in Dublin and over 60 young people from across the country competing. Winner of the Western Region heat, and the All Ireland final was Clodagh Ramsey, student at Wilson's Hospital School and member of All Saint's Mullingar.

Clodagh grew her costume over a six month period. Her skirt and headdress are made from dried Pampas grass whilst her bodice is constructed from Cork with Moss growing on the outside of it. The shoulders are made of living Black Grasses which are grown in recycled cat food pouches filled with soil.

Maintaining the garment is some feat; Clodagh has to water the Grasses and the Moss daily, and carried a spray bottle during the Dublin final to prevent it from drying out under the lights!

Clodagh says that the biggest problem is keeping her dress alive as it all needs light and air. The Moss, however, prefers shade whilst the neighbouring grasses need direct sunlight in order to thrive. It has proven quite the challenge to give each part of her design the optimum conditions.

Clodagh was thrilled to be made the All-Ireland winner and will be going to Abu Dhabi in the Autumn to compete in the World finals, hopefully she can keep her kouture alive until then!

At least 50 Christians killed in yet another violent attack in Nigeria

In yet more distressing news from Nigeria, at least 50 Christians have been killed and several more abducted in an attack on a church as it gathered to celebrate Pentecost, Open Doors reports.

At least 50 Christians, including children, have been killed and dozens injured in an attack on a church in south west

Nigeria as it gathered to celebrate Pentecost. Several believers were also kidnapped.

The attackers shot at people outside and inside St Francis Catholic Church in the town of Owo in Ondo State on Sunday (5 June). Explosives were also detonated. The presiding priest is among those abducted.

No one has yet claimed responsibility for the attack, but Adeyemi Olayemi, a lawmaker in Ondo, told The Guardian that the attackers are believed to have been militant Fulani herdsmen in retaliation to the state recently imposing restrictions on grazing following a surge in kidnappings.

“We have enjoyed improved security since herdsmen were driven away from our forests by this administration,” Olayemi said. “This is a reprisal attack to send a diabolical message to the governor.” Open Doors is investigating these claims.

Insurgency spreads to Christian-majority south

This latest attack reflects how the Islamic insurgency typically concentrated in northern Nigeria and the Middle Belt is affecting other parts of the country, including the Christian-majority south where Owo is located.

“The south of Nigeria is known for being peaceful and safe for the church, but now things are changing,” shares Zula, Open Doors country manager for Nigeria. “The violence from the north and Middle Belt is spreading rapidly and this is the result of violence that has gone unpunished.”

Last week, the head of the Methodist Church in Nigeria was abducted along with two other clerics in the south east of the country. They were later released after a ransom was paid.

Nigeria is number seven on the World Watch List, but it would be number one if it were based purely on violence. More Christians were killed there last year for their faith than in all other countries combined.

Please pray as attacks bring trauma, fear and doubt

“We condemn in the strongest terms possible the attack on Christians as they gathered in peace to worship God,” says Jo Newhouse, Open Doors’ spokesperson for sub-Saharan Africa. “We call on the Nigerian government to adequately discharge its legal obligation of duty to protect its citizens, both under international and domestic legal regimes.

“We also call upon the authorities to take a strong stance against all violence, including Fulani militant violence, investigate the perpetrators, hold them accountable to the justice system and break the cycle of violence that is expanding to other areas of the country, as is clearly shown by this incident. The longer these acts go unpunished, the longer they will continue.”

“People are full of trauma,” says Zula, who adds that many Christians are not going to church for fear of attack, or even

stopping travelling on roads to avoid abduction. “Continue to pray for faith to be increased as well, because having seen these things going on it affects the faith of many. They begin to question God – whether God is still alive. Let’s keep praying for the church in southern Nigeria and Nigeria as a whole. Thank you.”
