Influence of St Columba continues to cascade - Bishop of Derry and Raphoe

The Bishop of Derry and Raphoe told people gathered at a sunny St Columba's Abbey in Gartan, on Pentecost Sunday, that the influence of St Columba continued to



cascade down through the centuries into the lives of people like them and him.

The Bishop was preaching at Gartan's first 'Service of Thanksgiving for the life and ministry of St Columba' in three years. The annual event last took place in the summer before Covid arrived.

Sunday's service was hosted by the parishioners of Gartan on the idyllic Abbey site, overlooking Gartan's lakes, about half a mile from where the saint was reputedly born. The service was led by the Rev Canon Judi McGaffin, who was assisted by Rev Canon Katie McAteer, Rev David Houlton and Rev Heather Houlton. Music was provided by the Britannia Band.



Welcoming the congregation, Bishop Andrew said, "What a super day, what a glorious setting and what great company." He thanked the Rector for organising the service; local parishioners for their huge input; and the Britannia Band for returning, again this year, to provide music for worshippers.

In his sermon, the Bishop said Columba wasn't "just our saint". He was the saint of this island, of Iona, of Scotland and of Britain. "He's someone whom we share," Bishop Andrew said, "and we share in him because we share in Jesus Christ."

"We know the DNA of the followers of Jesus Christ through the gift of his spirit on the Day of Pentecost, that we remember this Pentecost Sunday. And I would so love it if we, in our Diocese of Derry and Raphoe and beyond, that we became so much part of the story of Columba and the



legacy of Columba that it would become our DNA, that we would be people in mission with the Good News of Christ: sharing his story, blessing his world, and – because of what we can do through the gift of the Spirit and the Good News of Jesus – make the world that we live in a better place."

After the service, Bishop Andrew and his fellow clergy joined the Gartan parishioners and friends from other parishes for refreshments on-site.

Popular priest Fr Power celebrates the golden jubilee of his ordination

The chief celebrant was Bishop of Ferns, Most Rev. Dr. Gerard Nash, who said it was his first golden jubilee of the priesthood since he became bishop of the diocese.

In his homily, the bishop recalled first meeting Fr Power a few months ago and found him to be "a man full of joy, with a smile on his face, feeling that the world is a good place".

Noting Fr Power's many appointments since his ordination in 1972, Bishop Nash said his gifts, talents, insights and wisdom would be of value to all as they went forward.

A large number of diocesan priests, including 96-year-old, Very Rev. Canon Seamus de Vál, were in attendance and seated on special seats behind the altar.

Members of Fr Joe's family, including his sister, Rev. Sr. Regina, from Convent of Mercy, Carrick-on-Suir, Co Tipperary, and his brothers, Tom and William, were seated in other reserved sections facing the altar.

Before the mass, PJ Arthur, master of ceremonies and retired principal of Ballyroebuck National School, welcomed Bishop Nash, members of the diocesan clergy including Rev Trevor Sargent and Rev David Bayne, from the Church of Ireland, and members of the wider Church of Ireland community along with parishoners from Kilrush and Askamore.

Man with a mission in his wheelchair from Dublin to Belfast

10 years ago this month (9th June 2012 to be exact) LCpl Bryan Phillips was the victim of an IED explosion in Helmand Province, Afghanistan.

The IED attack resulted in Bryan losing his legs above the knee.

This was an extremely difficult time for Bryan and his family however 10 years on and Bryan has achieved many things by way of setting himself goals which have been achieved



time after time, he completed a cycle on his hand bike from Mizen Head to Malin Head in Donegal, he also created poppy100 where he participated in wreath laying ceremonies to commemorate the ending of WW1, he placed wreaths in N Ireland and in the Republic of Ireland.

His latest challenge which coincides with him losing his legs in that dreadful IED attack 10 years ago is to push himself in his wheelchair from Belfast to Dublin starting at first light on Saturday 11th June in the Santry area of Dublin, from there



he will make his way eventually to Belfast (Shaw's Bridge) with only a few scheduled stops along the way.

Supporting him from stop to finish will be Franko G McCracken, Alan Aiken, Lt Col John Mateer MBE and David McKibbin. Bryan has decided to raise funds for the Irish Guards Benevolent Fund, he is however acutely aware that times are hard for everyone, however if you feel you could make a donation it will be greatly appreciated, the link is as follows:-

UK missiles help to chase fleet

Ukraine has pushed the Russian navy 60 miles back from the Black Sea coast with the help of anti-ship missiles supplied by Britain. It came as ex-German chancellor Angela Merkel defended her policy towards Moscow while in office, saying she had "nothing to apologise for" even as the Ukraine war casts a pall on her legacy.


