






### **Appointment in Dublin**

# **Answers sought to fifty year mystery of statues 'missing' from Limerick church**

The figures were made especially for Our Lady of the Rosary Church on the Ennis Road, which opened in December 1950. It is known for its architectural quality and ecclesiastical art.

One of many famed artists commissioned was the late Ian Stuart – regarded as the finest Irish sculptor of his generation. His own story is fascinating as he is a grandson of Maud Gonne MacBride and son of author Francis Stuart. Nazi spy Hermann Görtz found shelter in their family home in Wicklow.

# Parliament must stop Bill eroding our right to speak out against poverty, Christian Aid warns

Speaking ahead of the House of Lords debating the Police Crime and Sentencing Bill yesterday [Monday 17 January], Christian Aid has warned Parliament must "stop new restrictions on peaceful protest."

Alongside a coalition of organisations and campaigners, international development agency Christian Aid protested outside the Home Office yesterday [Monday 17 January].

The coalition is supported by almost 800,000 people who have signed petitions against the Bill.

Pete Moorey, Head of Campaigns & UK Advocacy at Christian Aid, said:

"From campaigning for climate justice to calling for action on food poverty in the UK, churches and people of faith are often at the forefront of movements for change.

"To tackle extreme poverty and the injustices that cause it, we must be able to speak truth to power. But this law puts this under threat.

"It is vital that the Government hears voices of protest and demands for justice, but instead it is giving the police wide

ranging powers that restrict our rights to speak out against poverty.

"Parliament still has time to stop new restrictions on peaceful protest that will have serious consequences for faith communities right across the country."

## I'm lazy and conflict-averse,' admits Pope Francis

Pope Francis admits to being "lazy" and conflict averse in a new Netflix docuseries in which the man at the centre of a major effort to reform the Catholic Church claims he doesn't like having to impose his authority.

"If you ask me if I am a fighter, I'll reply: 'No, I'm lazy'. By nature I am more of a lazy person than a fighter. If I can avoid a fight, I avoid it," he said in Stories of a Generation, which is released today.

The 85-year-old said he finds it "very difficult" to mete out justice and hand out punishments, because it is like a "fight" where there are "winners and losers."

"I don't like it, but there is no life without fighting. It is something that we have inside. To survive, we have to fight."

During his nearly nine years in charge of the world's 1.3 billion Catholics, Francis has hardly lacked resolve or shied away from confrontation, usually with the arch-conservative minority resisting his relatively liberal approach.

The Pope wants the Catholic Church to focus on social justice, poverty, migrants and climate change, to be flexible towards those who do not comply with its teachings - notably on abortion, divorce and homosexuality - and to worry less about rules and regulations.

This year, he again antagonised church traditionalists by reintroducing restrictions to the old Latin Mass, which his predecessor Benedict XVI had relaxed in 2007.

In a traditional pre-Christmas speech, delivered on Thursday, Francis doubled down on his enemies, lashing out at cardinals and bishops who "rigidly" hide behind Catholic Church traditions rather than seek out the neediest with humility.

In the Netflix docuseries, which consists of 18 interviews with elderly figures including Martin Scorsese and Dame Dr Jane Goodall DBE, the Pope mused about his passions, including tango and poetry.

"Tango is a melody that evokes nostalgia and hope," he said of the national dance of his native Argentina. He also recalled writing poems as a young man, but, he added, "I would tear them up afterwards because I didn't like them."

In a separate interview with Italian newspapers La Repubblica and La Stampa, Francis said he was doing well after spending more than 10 days in hospital in July for colon surgery, his most serious known health problem since becoming pope in 2013.

"I am not a kid any more, but I'm fine," he said.

# Contrasting images at different levels of society in the UK by Billy Kennedy

### Churches closed, while those in power partied

Many church and faith people in Northern Ireland, and, indeed, in other parts of the United Kingdom, will have been looking aghast this week at the serious breaches of covid pandemic protocol in the higher echelons of government at Westminster when lock-down restrictions prevented them from attending their places of worship.

The May 20, 2020 party in the garden of 10 Downing Street in London attended by Prime Minister Boris Johnson and his senior staff happened at a time when churches across the nation were closed for services and prayerful contemplation.

In retrospect, we should be reminded that from March 18, 2020 the instruction, both from Her Majesty's government in London and the devolved legislatures in Edinburgh, Cardiff and Belfast, was that all congregational organisations and activities connected with churches, including Sunday worship, should cease until further notice.

In June that year, the Northern Ireland Executive said it was looking at easing restrictions, which could lead to the reopening of churches. This meant that Sunday July 5 would be the first Sunday churches could gather in person since they last did on Sunday March 15.

Later, in the light of advice that Northern Ireland church leaders and other faith leaders received from the Northern Ireland chief medical officer Dr Michael McBride and the chief scientific advisor Professor Ian Young, regarding the worsening Coronavirus situation in January 2021, the churches were compelled to advise their flocks that all inperson Sunday gatherings for worship, along with church gatherings, would cease once more. This meant that churches were closed again from Sunday January10 and did not re-open until Easter Sunday of that year.

The church closures in the first period (March-July 2020) came by legislative decree from the Stormont Executive, but the 2021 closures were voluntarily decidied upon by an inter-church forum, set up largely through the influence of former DUP First Minister Arlene Foster, a regular Church of Ireland attendee.

A damning feature of church closures in Northern Ireland due to the pandemic was that one could enter an off-licence to purchase alcohol, but worshippers were not allowed into their buildings for services and prayer sessions.

Churches in England, Scotland and Wales experienced much the same closure fate as denominations in Northern Ireland, but, clearly in the light of deliberate breaches that have now emerged within the corridors of power in London, no empathy or consideration was shown to a highly significant section of the UK population who were denied a most fundamental and engaging aspect of their lives - the right to worship in churches of their choosing.

In information now brought to light, an organised and frivolous "bring your own booze" party in the garden of 10 Downing Street and other social shenanagins that went on under the watch of our culpable and shambolic Prime Minister contrasted sharply with the unprecedented and unedifying spectacle of church doors being locked to worshippers across the nation at the time.

The moral compass (a standard set of values and objectives that guide a person with regard to ethical behaviour and decision) of those responsible for these breaches evidently count for nothing and the central administration which binds our great British nation together has been irresponsibly and unnecessarily placed into disarray.

Government oversight of our cherished institutions most certainly deserves better leadership than what we are getting on the values and objectives that guide our nation. Our Prime Minister must look at his own moral compass and carefully reflect.
