On Friday March 3, a wave of prayer will begin at the break of dawn on the International Date Line and conclude at sunset on the date line 24 hours later. Over 180 countries will take part representing all continents. NI Election: 'Offer compromise and build bridges', Archbishop Martin urges Northern Irish politicians

In an open letter to politicians, the Archbishop of Armagh has advised government leaders to work together to maintain the peace in Northern Ireland.

Archbishop Eamon Martin's letter was released after a snap election was called in Northern Ireland on Monday.

The current government collapsed after Sinn Fein formally announced it wouldn't replace Martin McGuinness who resigned as deputy first minister last Monday over concerns about the Democratic Unionist Party leader Arlene Foster's handling of an energy scheme scandal. The pair held a joint office so McGuinness's resignation meant that Foster automatically lost her job.

In the letter, Archbishop Martin, who is Primate of All Ireland, called on politicians to make wise decisions going forward.

He wrote: "Consider carefully your responsibility and noble vocation to work for the common good. The premature collapse of our political institutions so soon after the last election is a serious matter for all of us and cannot be taken lightly.

"The sense I am picking up from people on the ground is that it risks further disillusionment with the political process. We understand that it takes courage and generosity to stand for public office. But it also brings a trusted responsibility for leadership and integrity which can never be taken for granted."

He added that the country needs to be able to trust politicians from all political parties to move forward with the peace process. "We have all learned through bitter experience that wrong is never all on one side – too many families among us still grieve the losses, or nurse the wounds of sectarianism and hatred. We do not want that for our children and grandchildren," the Archbishop wrote.

Archbishop Martin said that the rest of the world sees Northern Ireland as a "sign of hope that peace can be achieved" and that politicians must do all they can to maintain it.

He said: "Continue to work to sustain the painstaking progress which many of you and your predecessors helped to deliver. Help to bring us further along the road to lasting peace, a shared future and prosperity for all.

"Do not resort to predictable, wearisome slogans or denigrating, divisive language. Like many in the community, the churches are available to assist you in any way. We will certainly pray for you in the coming weeks."

Reformation Anniversary: Statement from the archbishops of Canterbury and York

Ahead of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 2017, which started yesterday, January 18, the archbishops of Canterbury and York issued a joint statement on the 500th anniversary of the Reformation.

Archbishop of Canterbury Justin Welby and Archbishop of York John Sentamu said: "This year, churches around the world will be marking the great significance of the 500th anniversary of the beginning of the Reformation in Europe, dated from Martin Luther's 95 Theses protesting against the practice of indulgences, on 31 October 1517 at Wittenberg. The Church of England will be participating in various ways, including sharing in events with Protestant church partners from Continental Europe.

"The Reformation was a process of both renewal and division amongst Christians in Europe. In this Reformation Anniversary year, many Christians will want to give thanks for the great blessings they have received to which the Reformation

directly contributed. Amongst much else these would include clear proclamation of the gospel of grace, the availability of the Bible to all in their own language and the recognition of the calling of lay people to serve God in the world and in the church.

"Many will also remember the lasting damage done five centuries ago to the unity of the Church, in defiance of the clear command of Jesus Christ to unity in love. Those turbulent years saw Christian people pitted against each other, such that many suffered persecution and even death at the hands of others claiming to know the same Lord. A legacy of mistrust and competition would then accompany the astonishing global spread of Christianity in the centuries that followed. All this leaves us much to ponder.

"Remembering the Reformation should bring us back to what the Reformers wanted to put at the centre of every person's life, which is a simple trust in Jesus Christ. This year is a time to renew our faith in Christ and in Him alone. With this confidence we shall then be ready to ask hard questions about those things in our lives and the life of our churches that get in the way of sharing and celebrating faith in Him.

"Remembering the Reformation should also lead us to repent of our part in perpetuating divisions. Such repentance needs to be linked to action aimed at reaching out to other churches and strengthening relationships with them. This anniversary year will provide many opportunities to do just that, beginning with this Week of Prayer for Christian Unity.

"We therefore call on all Christians to seek to be renewed and united in the truth of the gospel of Christ through our participation in the Reformation Anniversary, to repent of divisions, and, held together in Him, to be a blessing to the world in obedience to Jesus Christ."

School Choir of the Year competition at Belfast Cathedral

The St Anne Trust, in conjunction with St Anne's Cathedral, is launching its first ever cross community School Choir of the Year competition to be held in May.

The competition will be open to primary schools in the greater Belfast area with sections for Junior Choirs, Senior Choirs and Special School Choirs.

Mr Joe Watson of The St Anne Trust, said: "St Anne's Cathedral Choir School Project presently works with three schools in north Belfast. This competition will allow us to expand beyond these schools and will give us an opportunity us to reach schools across the whole of Belfast, crossing social, religious and economic divides."

A number of primary schools were represented at an Information Day about the competition organised by The Trust, and since then there have been many expressions of interest.

The junior and senior choirs' competition will take place on Wednesday May 10, with the event for choirs from special schools held the following morning, all in the impressive surroundings of St Anne's Cathedral.

Joe said: "This is the first time we have done this, and we are starting small with the competition open to primary and special schools only, but we hope to expand it to secondary level schools next year and perhaps even open it to adult choirs."

There will be places for 14 junior and senior choirs on May 10. Each choir will be asked to sing two pieces of the choir's own choice and one communal piece which all choirs will sing together on the day.

The primary purpose of the Bill is to address the remaining legislative barriers to Ireland's ratification of the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities.

The Working Group welcomes this Bill as the final hurdle to ratification of the UN Convention and is pleased that the Irish Government is

fulfilling its commitment following the signing of this Convention in 2007.
