Church of Ireland Gazette calls for blessings for same-sex marriages

The Church of Ireland Gazette has issued a controversial proposal that the denomination

creates a new affirmation ceremony for couples in civil same-sex marriages.

The Belfast News Letter reports - The radical proposal comes after the worldwide Anglican church agreed earlier this month to sanction its US branch over its "fundamental departure" from the faith by endorsing gay marriage.

Editorially independent of the denomination, this week's Gazette argues for an innovative affirmation ceremony for civil same-sex marriage – based on the precedent of the Church blessing the remarriage of divorcees when that was contrary to Church teaching.

Some traditionalists would contend that both actions by the Church would contravene scripture but the Gazette argues that since the Church has long affirmed the former, it now has no excuse but to support the latter also.

A particular question arises, the Gazette editorial said, as to how the Church should approach committed members of the Church of Ireland who have entered into "civil same-sex marriages". Only civil partnerships are available to date in its northern jurisdiction, while gay marriage is now lawful in the south. "The teaching of the Church is clear that marriage is both heterosexual and lifelong in its purpose (Canon 31)," the editorial said.

However, the Church has already made provision for the remarriage in church of divorced persons, subject to special pastoral requirements in each case.

Therefore, the editorial suggests, "it is now for the Church to consider, as a matter of some urgency, what its pastoral approach is to be in relation to churchgoing couples who are in civil same-sex marriages".

For heterosexual couples, the Church at first refused remarriage of divorcees, later moving to bless civil remarriages, and finally to the current position where remarriage of divorcees in formal church services is frequent.

For some people, the blessing of civil remarriages at the time was "hypocritical", the Gazette said, because "it was seen as blessing something of which the Church did not approve".

It added: "Yet, the service was an expression of the Church's acceptance of individuals' right to differ from the Church in terms of how they lived their lives in this regard.

"It was not hypocrisy; it was about the Church accepting that it is not, actually, infallible and that individual Christian people have a right, to some extent at least, to disagree with the Church while remaining fully in communion with it.

"While it remains a matter of debate that the rationale behind the remarriage of divorced persons in church gives grounds for the marriage of same-sex couples also in church, as things stand it is quite possible for the Church to recognise, through a specific pastoral ministry, that couples in civil same-sex marriages have entered into that relationship in a wholly conscientious manner.

"Such couples must be given their place in the Church, even though their decision runs counter to Church teaching."

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New petition launched to support Ashers Baking



The Christian Institute has launched a petition to support Ashers Baking Company ahead of the Christian-run bakery's appeal hearing next week.

The petition, which can be signed at <u>christian.org.uk/supportashers</u>, states: "I support Ashers Baking Co and the McArthur family in their stand for freedom of speech and freedom of conscience."

The McArthur family own and run Ashers, and face legal action after being taken to court by the Equality Commission for Northern Ireland.

Ashers declined to decorate a cake with the words "Support Gay Marriage" in May 2014 because of the McArthur family's Christian belief that marriage can only be between one man and one woman.

The Equality Commission took Ashers to court and in May last year a District Judge ruled that the bakery had breached political and sexual orientation discrimination regulations.

The Court of Appeal in Belfast will hear the legal arguments on Wednesday 3 February.

Earlier this month, it was revealed that a top legal expert had joined the team defending Ashers.

Professor Christopher McCrudden of Queen's University Belfast studied law at Yale and Oxford and specialises in human rights law. He joins a team led by David Scoffield QC.

Speaking about Professor McCrudden, The Christian Institute's spokesman Simon Calvert said: "We are delighted to have such a formidable legal expert join an already strong team."

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North West Schools in major new project 'Jointly Remembering the Centenary 2016'

A major new project has been launched in the North West which brings pupils from a dozen schools together to study two significant historical events which happened a century ago.

'Journey Together – North West Schools Jointly Remembering the Centenary 2016' is a regional church initiative which involves pupils from across the community, and from both sides of the border, in collaborative exploration of the Battle of the Somme and the Easter Rising, whose centenaries are being commemorated this year.

The project began on Wednesday with a workshop delivered by the Nerve Centre, under its Creative Centenaries programme. The 'Journey Together' project has been embraced by 12 second level schools in the North West and involves 60 students.

The young people will take part in joint visits to the Somme Centre and Dublin, and in a series of workshops and other events which will explore this complex period in our history sensitively and

imaginatively. A major event is planned for Derry–Londonderry Guildhall in May 2016, to mark the completion of this phase of the project.

'Journey Together' is being coordinated by The Churches' Trust, an interdenominational organisation founded 30 years ago by local church leaders in response to the level of deprivation in the area and the necessity to work together to provide essential services to those in need. Central to the ethos of the Churches' Trust is promotion of a more united, shared and cohesive society, working in collaboration with churches, schools and a diverse range of community groups. The leaders of the four main churches locally say they believe 'Journey Together' will have a positive impact on education and community relations in the North West. "We are grateful to participating schools for their support and enthusiasm, and to the various organisations which have joined us in providing financial support. We trust that the pupils involved will find this a rewarding learning experience and we hope that the social and educational benefits from 'Journey Together' will extend well beyond May."

Belfast launch of C of I's Human Sexuality guide online and on RTE

Bishop Christine of Newcastle takes her seat in House of Lords

Bishop of Newcastle Christine Hardman on Jan. 26 become the second female bishop in the Church of England to take her seat in the U.K.'s House of Lords – the upper house of the U.K. Parliament. The ceremony took place the day after her neighboring bishop secured a Lords' victory over the government on child poverty reporting.

Bishops have played a part in Britain's legislature since before the era of democracy; and today some 26 bishops have seats in the upper chamber. The archbishops of Canterbury and York and the bishops of London, Durham and Winchester are automatically members of the House of Lords. The remaining 21 places are taken by the most senior diocesan bishop by length of service. However, under transitional arrangements, for the next nine years the most senior female diocesan bishop will jump the queue and leapfrog their male counterparts. At the start of business in the House of Lords this afternoon, Hardman was led into the Lords' Chamber by Bishop of Southwark Christopher Chessun and was followed by Archbishop of York John Sentamu.

Immediately prior to becoming a bishop, Hardman served the Diocese of Southwark as an archdeacon. Her new diocese, Newcastle, is in the Church of England's Province of York.

Her Writ of Summons – the Queen's instruction to sit as a bishop – was presented to a House of Lords official who read it out loud. Hardman swore the parliamentary Oath of Allegiance. She was then taken to her place on the bishops' benches, shaking the hands of the Lords' Speaker and the Leader of the House of Lords on the way.

"Joining the House of Lords is a great privilege and responsibility," Hardman said before the ceremony. "God cares about the world as a whole – not just about the Church. I look forward to engaging and working with the other bishops and with key partners for all that leads to the flourishing of communities.

"I will make the most of this opportunity to speak on behalf of those whose voices are not always heard, and particularly alongside the Bishop of Durham to speak up for the North East."
