The Diocese of Meath World Youth Day pilgrims are taking part in the 'days in the diocese' programme and will spend time in the Diocese of Plock. A priest from that diocese, Father Janusz, is chaplain to the Polish Community in the Diocese of Meath.

Bishop Michael Smith, Bishop of Meath and Father Janusz will join the 49 Diocese of Meath World Youth Day pilgrims in the Diocese of Plock and from there they will travel together to the main World Youth Day events in Krakow via the National Marian Shrine.

Ballymacarrett Somme Flower Festival remembers the fallen

St Patrick's Ballymacarrett marked the Centenary of The Battle of the Somme with a Flower Festival to remember the fallen. The Festival, which ran over the opening weekend of July, was opened by Sir William Hastings, who started his business life across the road from the church.

Details of the National Grandparents' Pilgrimage to Knock Shrine have been announced for 2016. The announcement comes ahead of the Feast of Saint Joachim and Anne, parents of Mary and grandparents of Jesus, which is celebrated on Tuesday 26 July.

The 2016 pilgrimage will take place on Sunday 11 September to the newly refurbished Shrine of Our Lady of Knock. This annual pilgrimage is a special day for grandparents and families, and a wonderful opportunity to acknowledge the great contribution that grandparents make to Church, to family, and to society in teaching and passing on the faith. The pilgrimage was founded by

Catherine Wiley, a native of Co Mayo. From its origins in Ireland, it has spread to several countries around the world.

The pilgrimage begins with the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick at 2.30pm. The Pilgrimage Mass follows at 3.00pm.

Each year ahead of the pilgrimage, children are invited to write a prayer for their grandparents. The children's prayers can be brought to Knock on the day or posted in advance to: The Catholic Grandparents' Association, Castlebar Street, Westport, Co Mayo. All prayers will be blessed during the pilgrimage.

Former banker appointed Secondary Education Grants Administrator

The Chairman, the Rt Revd Dr Paul Colton, Bishop of Cork, and the Board of Directors of the Secondary Education Committee (SEC) have announced the appointment of Mr Johnny Honner to the role of SEC Grants Administrator in succession to Mr David Wynne. Mr Wynne has retired after 12 years of service. Johnny Honner has over 30 years' experience in the banking sector. During his banking career, he held roles as bank official and branch manager, and acquired professional financial and banking qualifications and experience including in financial regulatory compliance, giving financial advice, and budgets. He has also dealt with a number of state agencies. Arising from his financial and administrative skills, Mr Honner is experienced in working alongside people who are trying to cope with financial difficulties.

Bishop Colton commented: 'I am delighted, as are my fellow directors, that Mr Johnny Honner has been appointed as Grants Administrator within the Secondary Education Committee. It is an important position that requires understanding of the involvement of the Church of Ireland, the Methodist Church in Ireland, the Presbyterian Church in Ireland and the Religious Society of Friends in second level education in Ireland. It relies on empathy for applicants and their families, and the capacity to fulfil the many technical and professional aspects associated with running a complex scheme of grant aid. We are confident that Mr Honner will make a valuable contribution to our work and its development in the years ahead.'

The Secretary of the SEC, Dr Ken Fennelly, also greatly welcomed the appointment of Mr Honner and looked forward to working closely with him in the running and managing of the SEC into the future.

The Board of Directors has also decided to appoint Ms Bridie McLaughlin, currently Administrative Assistant with the SEC, to the role of Deputy Administrator in recognition of the key role she holds in the operations of the SEC. Commenting on the decision, Dr Fennelly said: 'I am delighted that Ms McLaughlin had accepted the position of SEC Deputy Administrator as her enhanced role affirms how much the Board of Directors value her work with the SEC. It also recognises the reality of the level of responsibility within the SEC which Ms McLaughlin holds.'

Churches and United Nations concern as South Sudan remains tense

Churches across the world are responding to the situation. Episcopal Relief & Development (ERD) – the international aid agency of the US-based

Episcopal Church – is supporting its South Sudan and Sudan counterpart Sudra (the Sudanese Development and Relief Agency) in caring for 220 families who have taken refuge in the cathedral grounds.

"It is devastating to hear that the fragile stability in South Sudan is once again threatened by factional violence," ERD's senior programme officer for disaster response and risk reduction, Nagulan Nesiah, said. "We are praying for our church partners there as they respond to offer shelter and aid, even as some of their staff are also displaced. We strongly hope that the clashes will end peacefully and that people will be able to resume the long work of rebuilding their lives and nation."

"The area around the Cathedral was one of the hot spots over the weekend, but the Cathedral itself is able to provide some security to about 1,000 people who are sheltering there. We are keeping the Church and Sudra in our thoughts and stand ready to offer additional assistance as needed."

The United Nations said Tuesday that the situation around South Sudan remains tense. Speaking in New York, a spokesperson for the UN peace-keeping mission Unmiss (United Nations Mission in South Sudan) told journalists that the agency had received "deeply disturbing" reports of sexual violence, including rape, being carried out by soldiers in uniform against a number of civilians around UN House in the capital, Juba. The spokesperson said that such actions may constitute a war crime.

"Unmiss calls on all parties to uphold their responsibilities to protect civilians and

underscores that those perpetrating these entirely unacceptable attacks will be held accountable," he said.

The spokesperson also said that Unmiss was "encountering harassment of its personnel and increased levels of obstruction of its operations, including denial of flight clearances."

Its sister-agency, the UN High Commission for Refugees (UNHCR), reported Tuesday that more than 5,000 people have fled from South Sudan to neighbouring Uganda since the latest violence in the country erupted on 7 July.

The Anglican Alliance is helping to co-ordinating the response from Anglican churches and agencies around the world to the ongoing violence in South Sudan. A few days ago, they convened a conference call for partners across the Communion to hear from and speak with the leadership of the Episcopal Church of South Sudan and Sudan (ECSSS) and its relief and development arm Sudra (the Sudanese Development and Relief Agency).

During the call, Sudra outlined its initial need for support for the 200 families seeking shelter in the All Saints' Cathedral Compound. Episcopal Relief & Development of the US-based Episcopal Church confirmed it would provide the necessary assistance.

On Tuesday, Sudra issued a second proposal to address the food needs of some 14,400 internally displaced people (IDP), as they assess the emerging needs. The proposal focuses on highly vulnerable children, women and elderly people in Juba, Kajokeji, Yei, Lainya, and Rajaf.

Cathedral and choral: Royal College of Music commissions new organ

The Royal College of Music has commissioned a new organ for the Amaryllis Fleming Concert Hall from Flentrop Orgelbouw. The new instrument is due to be completed in January 2018 and will replace the current organ, which is more than 100 years old.

Built in Amsterdam and London, the instrument will be encased in solid oak and will consist of 34 stops over three manuals and pedals.

The pipes will be sand-casted and the keyboard will have suspended mechanical action. The windsupply will be provided by two large V-fold bellows and the voicing will be based on relatively low windpressure in order to achieve a 'warm, elegant and prominent sound'.

RCM director Professor Colin Lawson said he was 'delighted' that RCM students would 'benefit from the wealth of experience and fine craftsmanship of Flentrop Orgelbouw'.

RCM organ students currently have access to the conservatoire's collection of mechanical action instruments, including a 34-stop three-manual organ by JW Walker, and also have the opportunity to perform and have lessons on organs outside the RCM.

The new organ will be named after Johnny Huang, the inaugural founding patron of the

RCM's 'More Music' project (which aims to increase access to the RCM's South Kensington campus and strengthen its facilities).

If a parish is awarded a grant, it will be allocated from either the Marshal Beresford Fund or the Church Fabric Fund and not from both funds. Grants are usually not allocated towards a project until the half-year after the proposed completion date for the works relevant to the grant application. Reports that a Syrian family taken in by the UK are living in an empty cottage in the grounds of Lambeth Palace, the Archbishop of Canterbury has said (see above). Archbishop Justin said it was an "enormous privilege" to house the family, as he helped launch a Home Office scheme to encourage community groups to sponsor refugee families coming to the country. The UK has said it will take in 20,000 vulnerable refugees from Syria by 2020. Launched by the new Home Secretary Amber Rudd, the scheme is designed to make it easier for churches, charities, faith groups and businesses to help support refugees attempting to restart their lives in the UK.
