God has 'accompanied' Poland often in its history, says Pope Francis

God chose to manifest his power not by amazing feats of greatness but rather through small acts of humility, choosing to enter the world as a child born of a woman, Pope Francis has said.



The Lord's "humble love" is reflected throughout Poland's history, particularly through "meek and powerful heralds of mercy," such as St John Paul II and St Faustina Kowalska, the Pope said at a Mass yesterday outside the Marian shrine of Jasna Gora in Czestochowa.

"Through these 'channels' of his love, the Lord has granted priceless gifts to the whole Church and to all mankind," the Pope said.

The Mass marked the 1,050th anniversary of the baptism of Poland, which celebrates the Christianisation of the country following the baptism of Mieszko I, the first ruler of the Polish state.

Prior to leaving Krakow for Czestochowa, the Pope visited the convent of the Sisters of the Presentation and stopped at a nearby hospital to visit Cardinal Franciszek Macharski, retired Archbishop of Krakow.

The 89-year-old cardinal, who is in "serious condition", succeeded St John Paul II as Archbishop of Krakow following his election as pope in 1978.

With thick clouds gathered over the Jasna Gora Shrine of Our Lady of Czestochowa, Pope Francis arrived by car rather than helicopter, as planned. Jesuit Fr Federico Lombardi, Vatican spokesman, said officials had told the Vatican it might not be safe for the helicopter to land.

In Czestochowa, hundreds of thousands of Poles lined the street leading up to the shrine, which houses the famed icon of the "Black Madonna," traditionally held to have been painted by St Luke the Evangelist.

St John Paul had a special devotion to the famed image. After his election, the Polish pope visited the shrine on June 4, 1979, and entrusted his pontificate to Mary.

Pilgrims waving banners and flags anxiously awaited the arrival of Pope Francis who, like his predecessor and many Poles, shares a deep connection and reverence to Mary.

Child sex abuse enquiry investigating 7,000 submissions on Anglican church

The inquiry into child sex abuse in England and Wales is investigating 7,000 submissions of evidence relating to the Anglican church, according to the counsel to the inquiry.

In a preliminary hearing yesterday at the Royal Courts of Justice, Ben Emmerson QC updated Justice Goddard, who is chairing the inquiry which could last at least another five years. He said that 114 sources of information were being considered, along with case studies relating to church abuse, including in the Chichester Diocese.

The Anglican section of the inquiry is expected to focus to a considerable extent on abuse by the former Bishop of Lewes, Peter Ball, who was jailed last year over crimes committed in the

1980s. A legal representative of Ball was in court today.

Emmerson said that more than 7,000 items of disclosure had been received from the Archbishop's Council, and from police forces and survivors including 'core participants'. So far 188 applicants have been granted core participant status by Goddard. Of these, 36 relate to the Anglican church. See also News links below.

Santiago de Compostela - The Iglesia Española Reformada Episcopal is proposing to build an Anglican Centre at Santiago de Compostela - a site considered by many to be the third holiest pilgrimage destination after Jerusalem and Rome. The new Anglican Centre at the end of the Camino de Santiago – or Way of St James – will cost in the region of \$5 million USD (approximately £3.8 million GBP). A USbased charitable organisation has been established with the help of supporters based at Trinity Church, Wall Street.

Shakespeare's lost years - A play written by the former Archbishop of Canterbury and Wales, Rowan Williams, about the "lost years" of celebrated English playwright Williams Shakespeare has opened in a theatre in Wales. Shakeshafte is set in 1581 and depicts Shakespeare as a Roman Catholic at the time of Elizabeth I's suppression of the "old religion." The play is fictional but draws on a creative interpretation of known events.

+++ Kirk roadshow on the future direction of the Church - Kirk leaders will be visiting 15

different places across the length and breadth of Scotland to hear members' thoughts on the future direction of the Church of Scotland.

Commissioners at the 2016 General Assembly approved the roadshow plan so that as many church members as possible can weigh in on the Church's future. 'On the Road' will visit 15 different places across the length and breadth the country, bringing information about the challenges facing the Church nationally, sharing new ideas and stimulating discussion about the future shape of the Church, its ministry and its discipleship.
