



Primate leads 20km pilgrimage in Rome for peace and reconciliation

The Primate of All Ireland, Archbishop Eamon Martin, has begun a 20km pilgrimage for peace and reconciliation in Rome.

Before departing on Monday, Archbishop Martin explained that the pilgrim walk was about thanking God "for the huge steps that have been taken in Ireland towards peace and reconciliation" one hundred years on from the Rising.

However, with "pervasive crime, gangland killings and the continued threat of paramilitary violence, with poverty and increased homelessness north and south, we recognise that much still needs to be done to create a culture of life and prosperity for all the people of Ireland," he said.

Most of the forty pilgrims on the St Oliver Jubilee Year of Mercy Pilgrimage to Rome are from the Archdiocese of Armagh.

Some are from Meath, which was the diocese of St Oliver's birth, and a number are from Lamspringe in Germany, location of the oldest shrine of St Oliver, where bone relics of the martyred Archbishop of Armagh have been venerated since 1684.

The pilgrimage continues until Thursday 17 June.

Yesterday, Tuesday 14 June, the pilgrims completed the Pilgrim Walk of the Seven Churches in Rome, as referred to by St Oliver Plunkett in his letters. Assembling for Morning Prayer in St Peter's Square, pilgrims will proceed to walk the 20km route, visiting seven basilicas, and entering through the Holy Doors of Mercy at the four major basilicas of St Peter, St John Lateran, St Paul outside the Walls and St Mary Major.

The prayer intention for the pilgrim walk will be 'Peace and Reconciliation through the intercession of St Oliver Plunkett'.

The pilgrims will invoke God's loving mercy for Ireland, for the continent of Europe and for the world.

"At this time the world needs our prayers and we will be conscious on our pilgrim walk of how much the world needs to see the face of God's mercy," Archbishop Martin commented.

He added that the work of mercy is needed today more than ever, "especially in the face of mass hunger, injustice, wars, discrimination and violence in so many parts of the world".

"Remembering my predecessor, St Oliver Plunkett, I will also be praying for Christians who are persecuted around the world today."

Tommy Burns from Drogheda, who is organiser of the pilgrimage and author of a recent

biography of St Oliver Plunkett said, "2016 marks the centenary of the Battle of the Somme and we will also remember the horrific loss of life of the youth of Europe at that time."

"While Europe may seem at peace today, Ukraine tells a different story. I sometimes think that the Continent suffers from a collective loss of memory, as many people seem to have forgotten the important treasures of its Christian heritage."

"We are beset with shocking acts of terrorism, and Europe has difficulty in accepting its humanitarian responsibilities towards the many refugees on its borders. Why can we not welcome the many gifts which migrants can bring to our communities?" Mr Burns asked.

Armagh Diocese Annual Hospice Sunday passes £42,000

The Church of Ireland Diocese of Armagh at its Diocesan Synod in November 2014 agreed that an Annual Hospice Sunday be established and be observed by all Church of Ireland Parishes throughout the Diocese of Armagh.

The Annual Hospice Sunday appeal is coordinated each year by the Reverend Matthew Hagan, rector of Tynan, Aghavilly and Middletown group of parishes in Co. Armagh. Reverend Hagan is the representative for all Hospices throughout Northern Ireland on the UK wide Board of the Association of Hospice and Palliative Care Chaplains.

Hospice Sunday began in 2014 and takes place on the first Sunday in November each year and to date including Gift Aid the money raised in 2014 (£20,000.00) and 2015 (£22,000.00) has reached a total of £42,000.00. The money has now been distributed to the following Hospices: The Southern Area Hospice, Newry; The Northern Ireland Hospice, Belfast (which includes the Northern Ireland Children's Hospice) and The Foyle Hospice, Londonderry. Therefore depending on where the parish or parishes are within the Diocese of Armagh the money raised by each parish throughout the Diocese of Armagh has been given to their local Hospice.

Rev. Hagan commented: "All hospices throughout Northern Ireland depend greatly on the support of the public when it comes to raising much needed funding for their hospice on an annual basis. I am extremely pleased at the magnificent amount of money that has been raised for hospice care in Northern Ireland through the generosity of the parishioners throughout the Diocese of Armagh and I encourage other Dioceses in the Church of Ireland to set up a similar initiative to support the wonderful hospice care afforded to those people <u>churchnewsireland@gmail.com</u> Page 6 in our communities who need this high level of care.

Gay marriage here to stay, says Anglican bishop

An Anglican bishop has pointed out that nothing bad happened in the UK after the introduction of same-sex marriage two years ago and that the Church of England is slowly accepting the concept. Delivering a keynote speech at the 'Queering Paradigms' conference on Sunday evening, the Rt Rev Alan Wilson used the Bible and the teachings of Christ to challenge the discrimination and fears held by many Christians about same-sex unions. He said that with around 1.4 billion people in the world now having access to gay marriage, the "toothpaste wasn't going back in the tube".

Rev. Wilson said it was merely a matter of time before the controversy surrounding gay and

transgender unions would turn to acceptance everywhere, even in his church.

Speaking about the concept of 'queer theory', an academic area challenging traditional concepts of binary genders and other ideas around sexuality, he described it as a daring and rebellious form of thinking about who we are and assumptions about fixed gender.

Although the conference was an academic gathering, Wilson delivered a speech that went to the heart of prejudices surrounding same-sex unions. He challenged the idea that the church has to be against same-sex unions and pointed out that Jesus himself challenged many norms of the time, even the concept of family, which many believe is fundamental to Christianity.

Given the lack of reference in the Bible to samesex relationships and none at all about women, he also suggested that the concept of a patriarchal family had more to do with culture and society than Christianity and maintained that prejudiced viewpoints had nothing to do with God.

Cathedral, choral and musical

In the Queen's Birthday Honours **Brian Hunter, Director of Music at St Molua's Parish Church, Stormont,** has been made MBE for services to music in Northern Ireland. His interest in music was nurtured at school (RBAI) and at Belfast Cathedral where he was a chorister with Captain Charles Brennan. He acted as Director of Music at the cathedral in 2002/2003 during which time HM Queen Elizabeth II and the Duke of Edinburgh visited for a service of thanksgiving marking Her Majesty's Diamond Jubilee. He has previously held posts at Bangor Abbey and Holywood Parish.

Brian has had a long and distinguished musical career. He was director of Canticle, a group which became well known for its television appearances and in the 1990s he formed a new singing group Pavanne. In 1995 he became Director of the acclaimed chamber choir Rennaissance. A versatile musician,he can perform as bass, countertenor, accompanist or conductor. His sensitive musicianship and interpretive flair blend happily and have often resulted in notable performances by himself as a soloist or by choirs under his direction. He currently sings with the Priory Singers, Melisma and Musicus Amicos.

While vowing to hold sacred the heritage and culture of Ireland, they also commit to continue to embrace different cultures and welcome new people.

The service, which was led by the Revd Leonard Ruddock, also included a performance by Blessington No 1 School Choir of a piece they sang in Collins Barracks on Easter Sunday 2016 as part of RTE's live broadcast of *One Hundred Years a Nation.*
