Welcomefest of World Music to fill St Anne"s Cathedral, Belfast

St Anne's Cathedral, Belfast, will host a special concert on Thursday June 23 organised by the Red Cross, Belfast Friendship Club and NI Council for Refugees and Asylum Seekers (NICRAS) to mark Refugee Week (20–26 June).

The free musical event, #WelcomeFest, is set to feature a diverse line-up of local artists including Fiona O'Kane and Frances Mitchell, together with Ugandan drummer Donna Namusake, Sri Lankan beatboxer 'Julius,' Mauricio Velezsierra and Heidi Heidelberg, with a number of other musicians and singers from the local refugee and asylum seeker community.

Organisers hope to showcase and celebrate Northern Ireland's growing musical and cultural diversity, which they say has been enriched by new refugee arrivals from more than 50 different countries.

The Dean of Belfast, the Very Rev John Mann, said: "WelcomeFest is a great title for what the evening is all about – celebrating talent, experiencing diversity, promoting the richness of the wide range of Northern Ireland's society today.

"Things are not always easy, individuals and families may be isolated, integration takes time and effort, but may this night open our eyes and ears to fresh sights and sounds, help us make new friends and bring a smile and raise spirits all round. Do come. You will be very welcome."

WelcomeFest will take place on Thursday 23 June at 7pm in St Anne's Cathedral. It is free, family–friendly event with activities and entertainment for all ages and is open to all.

Drogheda Mass for the Festival of Saint Oliver Plunkett

The Festival Day of Saint Oliver Plunkett is celebrated in Saint Peter's Church, Drogheda, this Sunday 3 July. This year the organisers are pleased to welcome as homilist Father Sean Henry PP Trim, Diocese of Meath.

The 2016 procession, culminating in the celebration of the Festival Mass, will commemorate the 96th anniversary of the beatification of Saint Oliver Plunkett by Pope Benedict XV on 23 May 1920, as well as the 41st anniversary of his canonisation as a martyr by Blessed Pope Paul VI on 12 October 1975.

One of the features of the Festival Day on Sunday is the colourful 'Procession of the Relics' of Saint Oliver Plunkett. Starting at 3.00pm at the Holy Family Church, Ballsgrove, pilgrims will process to Saint Peter's Church (The Memorial Church of Saint Oliver), Drogheda, where the Festival Mass will be celebrated at 4.00pm by Cardinal Seán Brady, Archbishop Emeritus of Armagh.

Pilgrims will have the opportunity to enter through the Holy Door of Mercy of Saint Peter's, which is a designated Jubilee Church during this Holy Year of Mercy. Music will be provided by Saint Peter's Male Voice Choir directed by Mr Edward Holly.

Whitehead's new Methodist church hall is a 'truly local enterprise'

The development of a new hall at Whitehead Methodist Church was a "truly local enterprise", a local minister has said.

The keys to the building were officially handed over at the Balmoral Avenue premises last week.

It follows four years of intensive fundraising efforts by church members and the local community, ranging from soup lunches to sponsored abseils. The annual Victorian Fair in the town also generated thousands towards the project.

To be known as the Dobson-Girvan Hall, the extension pays tribute to two of its main benefactors, Peggy Dobson and Vera Girvan.

"A truly local enterprise, the architect was Whitehead native Martin Walkington, whose elegant design almost seamlessly blends the exciting new hall complex with the Arts and Crafts style original church building, completed in 1900," said Rev Gary Millar of Whitehead Methodist.

"Comprising a main hall, state-of-the-art kitchen, several meeting rooms and the requisite facilities for a 21st century congregation, the hall will be an asset to our work for generations to come.

New LGBTI congregation in Lichfield Diocese

A new congregation to provide an opportunity for worship, mutual support and encouragement for Christians in the LGBTI community is being launched this summer.

"There has been a need for something like this for some while" says Revd Monica Arnold.

"While debate rages on, passionately, at the highest levels of the Church of England, LGBT people continue to live with the realities of their daily life and the mixed reception many receive in parishes. An opportunity to worship and enjoy fellowship without hiding or denying a fundamental aspect of their identity is so important to all aspects of healthy life.

"Our intention with True North is to supplement and support LGBTI Christians to go out and serve the Lord in their own parishes and communities, knowing they are loved by God. We do not see this as a stand-alone event but one that is truly part of the body of Christ within Lichfield Diocese."

The events will be held monthly, initially at St Matthew's Walsall, where most of the church leaders oppose gay marriage.

"It is absolutely right that we recognise and welcome this community. While I and many of the leadership of St Matthews hold a traditional view on human sexuality, LGBT Christians are first and foremost children of God and made in his image." says the vicar of St Matthew's, Revd Jim Trood.

C of E sponsors play highlighting plight of Calais refugee

A play highlighting the plight of a refugee in the Calais 'Jungle' is heading to the Edinburgh Festival Fringe this summer, sponsored by the Church of England.

Spearheaded by Rachel Partington, Artistic Director of Theatre for Justice and a student at

the Bristol Old Vic Theatre School, Still Here will be performed in the grounds of St Mary's Cathedral in Edinburgh. It is the first time the Church of England has sponsored a performance at the Fringe.

The play is based on the experiences of an Eritrean refugee who Rachel spent time with when she visited the Calais 'Jungle' refugee camp in December 2015. It tells the story of his journey from Eritrea to Calais, fleeing persecution for his Christian faith, as well as Rachel's journey to Calais and meeting with him. The production draws on the talent of both cast and creatives from the Bristol Old Vic Theatre School.

The play explains how the man Rachel met walked for nine days to leave his country, how the churches in his country were shut down, how worshipping Jesus was declared illegal and his mother and sister were imprisoned for their faith, and how even in his darkest hours he says that God had never left his side.

Speaking about her hopes for the play, Rachel said "After my visit to Calais I was determined that this man's story must be heard and that these people must not be forgotten. Our vision for the show is to take to places where it could

have real influence and we believe that Edinburgh is one of them.

"We hope that the Fringe will open doors to take the piece beyond, where it has the potential to move the hearts of those in power to further action."

Rev Arun Arora, Director of Communications for the Church of England, said "It can be difficult to imagine the plight of those who find themselves persecuted for their faith and fleeing from their homes.

"As Christians we have a responsibility to speak up for the poor and the marginalised - this play is a powerful and creative away of doing just that, and we are privileged to sponsor it."

The play previews on August 3 and August 4 and starts its full run on August 5, showing until August 24 at the Edinburgh Festival Fringe at ZOO @ St Mary's South Lawn.

Vatican marks 'Laudato Si' anniversary with new website

Marking the first anniversary of Pope Francis' encyclical on the environment, the Pontifical Council for Justice and Peace launched a new website dedicated to the document and efforts around the world to put its teaching into practice.

The site — www.laudatosi.va — "witnesses not only to the impact of the encyclical, but also the creativity and generosity of the people of God everywhere in the world," said Cardinal Peter Turkson, council president.

The council celebrated the first anniversary of the document, 'Laudato Si' on June 20 with a small conference at Rome's Basilica of St. Mary in Montesanto.

Christiana Figueres, executive secretary of the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change, in a video message, said that as scientists, governments, economists and concerned citizens were pushing for an international agreement to combat climate change, Pope Francis's encyclical provided the "moral imperative to take bold action."

Published six months before the Paris summit on climate change, she said, the Pope's document raised the issue in "the hearts and minds of hundreds of millions of people who may not otherwise have considered climate in their daily lives."

The science and economics of change to protect the environment are essential, Figueres said, but "the guidance of our moral compass" is what will made a difference.

Archimandrite Athenagoras Fasiolo, an Orthodox pastor in Treviso, presented the Italian edition of the book, "Cosmic Grace, Humble Prayer: The Ecological Vision of the Green Patriarch Bartholomew I."

Pope Francis's encyclical and the collected environmental reflections of Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew of Constantinople, he said, show that "the Holy Spirit does not cease to work without interruption in his Church," inspiring leaders to teach care for "all the work of God."

Jesuit Father Michael Czerny, an official at the justice and peace council, told Catholic News Service, Laudato Si' does not tell people what to think, but guides them through the complexities

of the issue of climate change and care for creation, and calls them to reflect on their response.

"The variety and intensity of debate" within and outside the Church, he said, "is a very healthy response" because the Pope wrote the encyclical to contribute to the debate and dialogue.

That "something completely new" was the European project, what became the European Communities and in turn the European Union with their new institutions and their institutional architecture that has forged the new pathway of peace, the consolidation of peace, economic development, workers' rights and the enhancement of standards of safety, security and well-being in our countries over the past six decades and more."

+++ New Roscommon school - As announced last September, Scoil Mhuire NS and Abbey NS

are to amalgamate following a recommendation made by the two school boards to Bishop Kevin Doran, and with the support of the vast majority of parents. Today, Bishop Doran has announced that the **New Primary School that will be formed in Roscommon Town** following the amalgamation of Scoil Mhuire NS and the Abbey NS in September 2017 will be called Saint Coman's Wood Primary School.

The announcement follows consultation with all the stakeholders involved by the Amalgamation Steering Committee which was put in place by the Diocese of Elphin last year to oversee the development on the two existing school sites in Roscommon Town of the new co-educational primary school.

Saint Coman mac Faelchon studied with Saint Finnian at the monastic school of Clonard in County Meath. Around 550, after completing his education, he founded a monastery on the bank of the River Suck, at a wood (Ross) which was called after him – Ros Comain. It is from Coman's monastery that the current town and county take their name. Coman was linked with other foundations in Ireland and the rule for monks attributed to him influenced many religious houses throughout the region.

St Coman's Wood Primary school will be, in the tradition of its patron, Saint Coman, a welcoming centre of learning where every student will be cared for as they develop physically, spiritually and intellectually during the early years of life.

The new co-educational school, under the patronage of the Diocese of Elphin, will open its doors on 1st September 2017.
