

Clogher Ecumenical Service for Pentecost

Clogher Ecumenical Service for Pentecost takes place at Errigal Truagh.

This year's annual ecumenical service on Pentecost Sunday will take place on Sunday, 8 June at 3pm and will be led by both the Church of Ireland and Roman Catholic Bishops of Clogher at Errigal Truagh Old Graveyard in Co. Monaghan.

Errigal Truagh Old Graveyard near Glaslough and Emyvale, is one of the most ancient religious sites in the Province of Ulster and is believed to have been used for worship as far back as early Christian times. The medieval graveyard is renowned for its distinctly carved 18th Century headstones.

The Church of Ireland Bishop of Clogher, the Right Revd Dr. Ian Ellis and the Roman Catholic Bishop of Clogher, the Most Revd Larry Duffy, will participate in the service which begins at 3pm. During the service, a number of young people will give their reflections on Pentecost and the Donagh Community Choir will lead the praise.

Afterwards, refreshments will be provided in The Blackwater Valley Centre at Ballyoisin.

Since 2000, the Roman Catholic and Church or Ireland bishops of Clogher have come together, along with members of their respective Church communities to mark together the Day of Pentecost or Pentecost Sunday, as it also known. The Day of Pentecost marks the end of the fifty-

day season of Easter. Moreover, it marks the descent of the Holy Spirit in the upper room and the beginning of apostolic preaching, thus marking a defining moment in the origin of the Christian Church.

Each year, a site of historic significance in relation to the origins of the Christian church in different parts of the diocese is chosen to host this Ecumenical Service.

Errigal Truagh Old Graveyard and ruined church lie in the townland of Mullinacross which means 'Summit of the cross. The ancient ecclesiastical site is one of great historical and archaeological significance' and contains a remarkable

collection of carved gravestones which are an outstanding example of 18th century folk art influenced by Scottish settlers. There are headstones to the family names of McKennas and Treanors as well as a number of priests. Two local families, the Anketells and the Singletons are buried in separate areas within the ruins of the Old Church.

Directions - The Errigal Truagh old church and graveyard can be located from the following:

Eircode: H18 A6K3. The old church and graveyard are located off the N2 road between Aughnacloy and Emyvale. There is a white sign for Killybrone and Clara and a brown sign for St Mary's RC Church, Clara, Errigal Truagh Church of Ireland, Truagh Heritage Centre and Derrygorry Forest. Errigal Truagh is about one and a half miles from that N2 turnoff. There will be stewards on the day to direct traffic and parking.

Irish Bishops call for prayer and fasting for Gaza

"We call on all Catholics to make 6 June, a day of prayer and fasting for Gaza" – Irish Bishops

Irish Bishops offered prayers for peace in the Holy Land, for Ukraine, Sudan and in other troubled parts of the world at their Standing Committee meeting in Maynooth on 26 May. In particular, bishops discussed the humanitarian catastrophe in Gaza, stating:

"From all over Ireland, parishioners are reporting their horror and helplessness on seeing images of death and communal

destruction in Gaza. Exhausted mothers can no longer nourish their young, children are dying of malnutrition, while aid lorries full of supplies are being refused entry into the territory, or are not safely arriving at their destination.

"We in Ireland must pray for a change of heart. Throughout the month of June – the month of the Sacred Heart of Jesus – we call on everyone to pray for an outpouring of the compassion of God on a heartless world.



"To see the relentless bombardment of civilian areas, the deliberate withholding of food from the starving, as well as the callous holding of hostages, it appears that humanity has lost its heart. In the face of these horrors, we invite everyone to turn to the heart of Jesus throughout the month of June by praying for the renewal of heart that our world so desperately needs. In particular, we call on all Catholics to make 6 June, a day of prayer and fasting in solidarity with our sisters and brothers who are suffering at this time in the Holy Land.

"We echo Pope Leo XIV's recent appeal to allow into Gaza 'the entry of dignified humanitarian aid and to put an end to the hostilities, whose heart-breaking price is paid by the children, elderly, and the sick."

Priests call for safeguarding inquiry into Bangor Cathedral

Two Anglican priests from Bangor Cathedral in north Wales are calling for an independent inquiry after two reports raised safeguarding concerns and highlighted allegations of misconduct at St Deiniol's Cathedral.

The Revd Dr John Prysor-Jones and the Very Revd Professor Gordon McPhate, both serving at Bangor Cathedral, described two recent reports into misconduct as "unsatisfactory" and argued that their conclusions were "based on impressions" rather than facts.

Both have served in a preaching capacity, and have been calling for a report into the Cathedral since 2011, saying any

inquiry should be "assisted by advisers in organisational management, canon law, civil law, and criminal law".

The first report, commissioned by the Bishop of Bangor and Archbishop of Wales Rt Revd Andrew John, described "a culture in which sexual boundaries seemed blurred", as well as instances of inappropriate language and excessive alcohol consumption. A second report considered allegations of financial misconduct under the cathedral's former Sub-Dean, who was placed on leave in March 2024.



The two reports were completed by the end of 2024, but nothing from either was published until May 2025, when a redacted summary of each was made public. The summaries centred mostly around the recommendations, rather than details of what was found out.

A spokesperson for the Church in Wales said: "The matters raised in this correspondence will be carefully considered."

One congregation member has called for Rt Revd Andrew John's resignation as lead bishop for safeguarding due to the concerns, as reported by Newyddion S4C.

The calls come as the Church continues broader discussions about safeguarding standards and accountability.

When the initial report was released, the Cathedral told Premier that it wished to allow time for reflection on its findings before issuing further comment.


28th May.

A shameful anti Israeli step by Trinity College, Dublin - News Letter Editorial

News Letter editorial on Thursday June 5 2025

Trinity College Dublin is to divest from new arrangements with Israeli universities, firms and institutions.

In a capitulation to anti Israeli activists, university – long considered Ireland's best – made the decision to divest from Israeli links yesterday.

For pro-Palestinian activists it is only the beginning – they have called on other Irish universities to follow suit.

Trinity had already capitulated to students who formed an encampment on the campus in protest against a 214,285 euro fine imposed on the students' union over a series of demonstrations about fees and rent, and the university's ties to Israel.

Following engagement with the protesters, the college dropped the fine and said it would complete a divestment from Israeli companies that have activities in the Occupied Palestinian Territory and appear on the UN blacklist.

This pledge from the university led to students dismantling the camp.

June 6, 2025

The university has now provisionally accepted a report from a taskforce set up last October to examine academic and institutional links, including with Israel, recommending that Trinity enter into no Erasmus, collaborative research or supply agreements with Israeli universities, institutions or firms.

This is a shameful decision from the premier university in one of the most anti Israeli nations in western Europe.

Trinity is not high in the listings of global universities so this will not hit Israel in the way it would if the many great American universities followed suit. But what a symbolic victory for those sly supporters of Hamas, of which there are so many in the Republic – protestors who don't in fact openly endorse those Islamic extremist mass murdering barbarians, but who put all their ire on Israel, even after the October 7 massacre of civilians that began the war.

Israel is pro rata to its small population the most stunning academic and technological hyper civilisation on earth.

Trinity should be delighted to have links with Israeli universities.
