St Patrick's Day Civic Service restored at St Fin Barre's Cathedral



After two years of absence, representatives of Cork City Council gather in the cathedral grounds before the Civic Service.

The annual Festival and Civic Service for St Patrick's Day was held at St Fin Barre's Cathedral, Cork. After two years of not being able to host this celebration, Bishop Paul Colton invited the Lord Mayor of Cork and Cork City Council politicians, as well as representatives of State agencies, NGOs and Voluntary Groups to finally celebrate St Patrick's Day together and in person again.

For the first time since Christmas 2019, the full Cathedral Choir was singing at the service. There were forty singers, including girl and boy choristers, Junior Lay Vicars and Adult Lay Vicars Choral.

For over twenty years, the Bishop and his wife Susan would host their annual Saint Patrick's Day reception at the Bishop's Palace in Cork, which was also not possible for the past two years. This year, still conscious of the ongoing pandemic, the Bishop arranged for Cortado Coffee to serve hot beverages and cake from their van outside the cathedral after the service.

We can't solve poverty without solving war - Sentamu

Eliminating war is key to eliminating poverty, the former Archbishop of York, Dr John Sentamu, has said.

Speaking at the launch of Christian Aid's new report into poverty, "Reimagining paths to human flourishing", Dr Sentamu said that the war in Ukraine was a case in point.

"You cannot eliminate poverty without eliminating war," he said.

"In fact, war throws more people into poverty. At the moment, Ukraine is quite a clear example.

"No matter how wonderful that country was, war begins and it drives a lot of people into poverty."

Dr Sentamu, who is Christian Aid's Chair of Trustees, said that Christians must be the peacemakers who work to prevent war.

"We need to be people who love our neighbours and do our best to make sure that war does not actually happen because it kills more people, kills more of our neighbours, and we need to make friends with a number of people who are very different from us," he said.

Dr Sentamu said the reality of poverty "breaks the heart of God" and that eradicating it was "really a spiritual question". But he also said that Christians need to see Jesus among the poor.

"Those who have the love of God in their hearts don't see Jesus often among people living in poverty, they're looking somewhere else," he said.

"When I look at the poor, it is Jesus looking back at me. And if it's Jesus looking back at me, that gives me great hope that transforming our world from the world of deep poverty is a possibility.

"Being part of the church, I should be an instrument of transformation where I see everybody as my brother, where when I see people in poverty, it's Jesus looking at me."

He added that the only thing that can destroy Isaiah's vision of a world of peace "is the presence of war and the abuse of power and people being silent when others are being slaughtered".

Christian Aid's report was launched on Tuesday and is the culmination of a two-year project examining the cause and effect of poverty, and how it can be eradicated.

The report says that Ukraine and widespread famine in the Horn of Africa are evidence that too many promises have been "unfulfilled".

It calls for a re-think in approaches to international development to move beyond "the polarity of 'us' and 'them" and recommends a "new path that moves on from growth-centred definitions of development and aid dependency to a vision of human flourishing that is just and sustainable and recognises people's interdependence".

Christian Aid's interim Chief Executive, Patrick Watt said: "In recent decades there has been remarkable progress to help those in need. But inequality, entrenched by the economic fallout of Covid-19, has slowed that progress and now the climate crisis and conflict threaten to throw it into reverse.

"Poverty is increasingly concentrated amongst people who face exclusion and discrimination.

"Eradicating poverty now requires fresh approaches that tackle inequality, strengthen people's voice and decision making and treat poverty as multi-dimensional."

The report has been endorsed by UN Special Envoy for Global Education and former British Prime Minister, Gordon Brown, who said leaders must be challenged "to face the scandal of global poverty afresh".

"As a result of the pandemic, we have a health crisis, an economic crisis, and an education crisis, but we also have a poverty crisis, a social emergency which, if not addressed, will cost countless lost lives," he said.

"It is this generation's moral obligation to overcome extreme poverty and address inequalities, and we need to find new ways to strengthen those whose voices are often not heard.

"Christian Aid's poverty report is a hopeful call for justice founded on the realisation that we are responsible for one another to live flourishing lives."

Mary Robinson, former President of Ireland and UN High Commissioner for Human Rights, said: "Christian Aid's report shows the gains that have been made in tackling extreme poverty in recent decades, but also the limits of progress to date.

"The pandemic has clearly exposed the deep, persistent inequalities that continue to blight our world, with women and girls in lower income countries being hit especially hard.

"No one can be left out of the fight against poverty. We must listen to and be led by the most marginalised, understanding their experiences and standing with them in claiming their rights."

Kiev's mayor invites Pope Francis to the capital to make peace call

The Vatican has revealed, the mayor of Kiev had issued a formal invitation for Pope Francis to visit Ukraine's capital earlier this month.

On Tuesday, a Vatican official said Vitaly Klitshko had written a letter to the Pontiff urging him to visit the city, as he believed his presence in Kiev would be "key for saving lives and paving the path to peace."

The Vatican confirmed the Pope had received the letter but made no mention of a future trip.

But in his letter, Klitshko said that if a trip was not possible, a live or recorded video conference would also be helpful.

"We kindly ask for a joint video conference, to be recorded or broadcast live. Efforts will be made to include President Zelenskyy in this call."

It continued: "We appeal to you, as a spiritual leader, to show your compassion, to stand with the Ukrainian people by jointly spreading the call for peace."

This is not the first time Kiev's mayor calls on religious leaders to take stance against Russia's actions. On March 5th, Klitshko published a video on Twitter urging religious leaders from around the world to come to Kiev.

"What is happening in the heart of Europe touches the hearts of all the inhabitants of our planet, who love justice and values of goodness, regardless of their region or religion. I expressly appeal to religious leaders to take a stand and assume the moral function that is incumbent upon them and to proudly assume the responsibility of their religions for peace," Klitshko said.



Pope Francis has so far avoided to publicly condemn Russia by name for its invasion. However, it has rejected Russia's statement that it is carrying out 'a special military operation' but called it a war that is causing 'rivers of blood and tears.'

The Pontiff has also said "the Holy sea is willing to do everything to put itself at the service of peace" and has sent two cardinals as papal envoys to Ukraine.

If there's a God, love is going to win - US Presiding Bishop

"Putin may overrun the country, but he will not defeat the people of Ukraine. He will not. Spirit will always win over flesh. It may not be in the forecast time, but it's real.

In 1853, Theodore Parker, an abolitionist, when it looked like slavery would never end in this country, said, and I quote, 'I do not pretend to understand the moral universe. The arc seems to be a long one, but from what I can see it bends toward justice.' Dr. King shortened it and said, 'The moral arc of the universe is long, but it is bent toward justice.'

Not because of some metaphysical magic, but because there is a God. And if there is a God, then there is hope. If there is a God, then there can be faith. And if there is a God, as my Bible says, who is love, then in the end, no matter what we have to go through now, in the end, love is going to win. If there's a God, love is going to win."

House of Lords throws out latest attempt to legalise assisted suicide

The House of Lords has rejected the latest attempt to legalise assisted suicide in England and Wales.

Peers voted by 179 votes to 145 against Lord Forsyth's amendment to the Health and Care Bill that would have forced the Government to bring forward assisted suicide legislation within a year.

It is the 12th time since 1997 that proposals for assisted suicide have not been thrown out by Parliament.

Ciarán Kelly of the Christian Institute said the vote had prevented "a real threat to the lives of vulnerable people".

"The proposal clearly breached the Sixth Commandment and denied the value of every person as an individual made in the image of God," he said.

"Recent scandals over blanket use of 'Do Not Resuscitate' orders showed that, sadly, some health professionals have lost sight of the value of human life.

"Weakening the law would have put vulnerable people under pressure to end their lives for fear of being a financial, emotional or care burden on others.

"Supporters of assisted suicide claim it can be introduced safely, but international evidence shows it is impossible to establish sufficient safeguards to protect vulnerable people once the law is liberalised. Keeping assisted suicide illegal is the only safeguard."

After the vote Baroness Campbell of Surbiton expressed her delight that the attempt to introduce assisted suicide "by the back door" had failed.

Speaking on behalf of disability campaign group Not Dead Yet, Lady Campbell said disabled people "want support to live, not support to die".

She was supported by Dr Gordon Macdonald, chief executive of Care Not Killing, who said peers had recognised "the dangers of ripping up laws that protect the terminally ill and disabled people from feeling like a burden".

Danny Kruger, Conservative MP for Devizes and chairman of the All Party Parliamentary Group for Dying Well, said: "The House of Lords has now unequivocally rejected the latest attempt to shoehorn radical assisted suicide laws onto the statute book.

"Given that supporters of assisted suicide have said that the House of Lords is more supportive than the Commons, this is ample evidence that assisted suicide enjoys neither momentum nor support," said Mr Kruger (pictured).

"Countless hours have been spent debating these proposals and given the pressures on Parliamentary time, this result ought to be an indicator that future time should not be given over to this issue again."

Dr Mark Pickering of the Christian Medical Fellowship, said: "I'm very relieved that the Lords rejected this inappropriate amendment. Baroness Meacher's Bill has already been fully debated recently in the Lords, and it was entirely wrong for

assisted suicide campaigners to breach protocol in this way by hijacking an already complex health bill. This has potentially taken valuable debate time away from other very important health issues that have not received sufficient parliamentary time.

"We should be focussing attention on improving patchy palliative care provision, as Baroness Finlay's amendment is already looking to do."

Nathan Stilwell of Humanists UK, which supported the amendment, said that he vote "robs those who need an assisted death of the choice, dignity, and autonomy as to when to end their lives".

He said: "Allowing people to choose the manner and moment of their own death is the hallmark of a compassionate society and should be a basic right."
