

The service conducted by the Rector, the Revd John McClenaghan was attended by the Bishop of Clogher, the Right Revd Dr. Ian Ellis, who was the preacher; His Majesty's Lord Lieutenant, Viscount Brookeborough and Lady Brookeborough as well as members of the RUC GC Association in East Tyrone and Fermanagh.

The service also celebrated the service and sacrifice of the RUC and RUC Reserve.

Bishop Ellis, in his address, said an occasion such as this, of the laying up and dedication of the Fivemiletown RUC station crest, gave everyone an opportunity to consider and be thankful for the work for the police in our community.

"It will also cause us to reflect on the cost of that service over the period of our troubles in NI in the lives lost and hearts and homes broken."

Lawyer and priest to serve as Diocesan Chancellor



The Archbishop of Armagh has appointed the Reverend Terence Dunlop, a Church of Ireland priest and practising lawyer in the Lady Chief Justice's Office, as Diocesan Chancellor.

The Archbishop said, 'I was delighted when the Reverend Terence Dunlop accepted my offer to become Chancellor of the Diocese of Armagh, in succession to Sir Paul

Girvan PC. I have known the new Chancellor since we studied together for Orders nearly thirty years ago, and look

forward to working with him as my principal Diocesan Legal Adviser, particularly in matters relating to the Constitution and Canons of the Church of Ireland'.

The Reverend Terence Dunlop commented, 'I am very honoured to have been invited by the Archbishop to take on this role and I look forward to being of whatever use I can to assist him in ensuring the maintenance of proper ecclesiastical order and good governance within the diocese in furtherance of the church's mission and calling.'



The Reverend Terence Dunlop was ordained priest in 1998. He is currently a lawyer in the Lady Chief Justice's Office and Secretary to the Judicial Studies Board for Northern Ireland. The new Diocesan Chancellor has a Master of Laws degree (LLM 2003) in Canon Law from Cardiff University and is a member of the Ecclesiastical law Society.

The Archbishop of Armagh, the Most Rev'd John McDowell has appointed the Rev'd Canon Peter Thompson to be the Archdeacon of Armagh, following the retirement of the Venerable Terry Scott. The appointment will take immediate effect.

Commenting on the appointment the Archbishop said "I am delighted that Canon Thompson has accepted my invitation to become Archdeacon of Armagh and to work alongside Archdeacon Elizabeth Cairns as my executive officers in the Diocese.

Canon Thompson has been a very busy and effective Rural Dean and his involvement in the musical life of St Patrick's Cathedral, Armagh has enriched the life of the cathedral and the Diocese. My prayers will be with Peter and his family as he takes up this senior role."

Canon Thompson said "I am both humbled and honoured at the opportunity to serve the diocese and Church in this new way. I am grateful to the Archbishop for his confidence and trust, and conscious of the diligent pastoral care and leadership provided by former Archdeacons. The challenges and opportunities of mission and ministry in a post-pandemic society are greater than ever before, and I look forward to being involved in the leadership of the diocese as we rebuild our parish life and refocus our vision for the future."

New Diocesan Director of Ordinands for Cork, Cloyne and Ross



Events and services at York Minster for World Autism Acceptance Week

An exciting programme of events for World Autism Acceptance Week will take place at York Minster from Wednesday 29 March until Sunday 2 April. The theme for this year's activities is 'Spectrum Colour'.

Activities and events at the cathedral will focus on the needs of people living with neurodiverse and sensory conditions. Capacity inside the cathedral will be reduced at key times during the week to create a 'Mindful Minster' - a peaceful and calm visiting environment for people with these conditions.

York Minster's five day programme includes creative art workshops, storytelling, dance, drama, singing and mindfulness sessions. The medieval Chapter House will be the venue for a sound installation on Saturday 1 April where visitors will be able to experience the waves of a sound bath. The cathedral will also trial British Sign Language Interpretation at two services of Choral Evensong during the week.

Hannah Parker, Head of Visitor Experience and Chair of York Minster's Inclusivity and Accessibility committee, said: "York Minster is pleased to be participating in World Autism

Acceptance Week for the first time. We have worked with local partners to design an inclusive and accessible programme of activities and events for people living with neurodiverse conditions. To make this happen, we will reduce visitor numbers so there will be fewer people in the cathedral to create 'relaxed hours' – quiet times when noise in the Minster will be minimised to avoid sensory overload which can be disturbing and overwhelming for people living with these conditions.

"A big part of our mission at York Minster is to include, engage and inspire the people we welcome. By participating in Autism Acceptance Week we hope to provide a welcoming and inclusive space in the city and York Minster is proud to support that vision."


Newtownards 'book-eating' bus inspires readers

Inside the UK's Mormon missionary bootcamp

BBC News - Harvey Day writes - Every year, thousands of young Mormons go on missions to try to recruit others into the religion. The BBC was given access to their UK boot camp, where they learn how to teach Mormon beliefs and use social media to reach potential converts.

When 19-year-old Rebekah Cooper started her mission, she had to give up her first name, stop making phone calls to her friends and surrender any time to be on her own, other than to use the toilet or shower.



Known only as Sister Cooper during her religious mission, she also began a strictly-planned dailyschedule - of prayer, study, exercise, volunteering in the community and seeking out potential converts - starting at 06:30 every morning and ending with a nightly curfew.

Along with general Mormon rules based on religious scriptures like a ban on premarital sex and drinking tea and coffee, missionaries aren't allowed to stay out late or watch TV or movies. Typical Gen Z pastimes like gaming and TikTok are also forbidden.

Rebekah is one of tens of thousands of young Mormons around the world who volunteer to take part in missions every year, with the goal of recruiting others to join the religious group. More at -
