

The parish welcomed 60 asylum seekers from Eritrea, Syria, Iran, Yemen, Nigeria, Uganda, Somalia and Sudan to the church hall, along with people from the different churches in Carrickfergus who are also working with asylum seekers.

A great selection of food was prepared by people from Syria, Iran, Yemen, Uganda and Nigeria, and following the meal, some of the ladies from the African nations gave a dance demonstration.

Next up were the Kurdish men, then the Syrians, Iranians, Eritreans and Yemenis.

The rector, the Rev Nigel Kirkpatrick, said: "Pretty soon everyone was on the floor trying in their own unique way to emulate the dancing. All in all, it was a wonderful evening of

food, fellowship and encounter. Everyone had a great time, and friendships were renewed and built."

The costs of hosting the event were covered by a grant from the Belfast Cathedral Black Santa Appeal.

Community groups get £50k grant funding to help celebrate the King's Coronation

Lisburn & Castlereagh City Council
More than £50,000 in grant funding has been awarded to
over 100 community groups in the Lisburn Castlereagh area
to help them mark the King's Coronation in May.

In January, Lisburn & Castlereagh City Council announced a calendar of events to celebrate this special occasion and invited eligible groups to apply to its first community initiative - the King's Coronation Small Grants Programme.

Having now reviewed all the applications received, the council has announced that £52,495 will be awarded to 105 groups. Among the successful recipients each receiving a grant up to £500, are community associations, church and history groups, young people's organisations and women's associations.

Catholic leader agrees with TUV criticism of St Patrick's Day parade in Armagh

A Catholic community leader has agreed with TUV criticism of the St Patrick's Day parade in Armagh for its "highly political and partisan nature", Graeme Cousins reports in the News Letter

TUV's Keith Ratcliffe questioned the cross community credentials of parade in Armagh on Friday after the procession includes three republican bands, no unionist bands and the Union flag omitted from display of world flags during the procession.

Paddy Monaghan, secretary of the Evangelical Catholic Initiative, was also disappointed with the parade.

He contacted the News Letter to say: "As a leader in the Catholic community I want to agree with the TUV's Keith Ratcliffe that St Patrick's Parade in Armagh should be non-political.

It should represent the real St Patrick, who was prereformation and thus could be a potentially uniting figure for

Christians in Armagh and Northern Ireland. This is especially so in Armagh as the ecclesiastical capital of Ireland is home to two cathedrals – one Anglican and one Roman Catholic, both called St Patrick's.

"[During the St Patrick's Day parade] in Armagh I personally challenged a number of participants in one Republican band at the end of the parade, who had marched under the Tricolour. I reminded them that the colours of the Tricolour stand for peace and reconciliation between the Orange and the Green. I challenged them to consider in future walking under both the Tricolour and the Union Jack. I wasn't the only one that challenged them. Some of the spectators were surprised that this band was allowed to take part."

Mr Monaghan said that the parade was not the only celebration of St Patrick in Armagh: "A number of other celebrations were held and were genuinely cross-community. Both the Church of Ireland and Catholic Archbishops organised an Ecumenical Walk between both cathedrals on the March 16 at 9pm.

"I led a cross-denominational and international team of 32 folk who, in spite of the rain, took part in the walk and we, with permission, gave out St Patrick's Testimony pamphlets in the RC Cathedral at the end of the walk.

"We also took part in a cross-community event in the Market Place Theatre, which was packed out and both archbishops shared what St Patrick meant to them. This was organised by the Armagh City, Banbridge and Craigavon Borough Council and the Deputy Mayor Tim McClelland (DUP) gave a good introduction to it.

Mr Monaghan said the Evangelical Catholic Initiative is committed to renewal in the Catholic Church and building relationships with Protestant and Pentecostal Christians. He said: "In conjunction with Wild Goose Publishing, a Pentecostal ministry, we produced this modern version of St Patrick's Testimony. In researching this we discovered that Patrick quoted 70 different Scripture verses/passages in his relatively short Confession, which is actually his Testimony.

"This modern version of St Patrick's Testimony Pamphlet has been endorsed by leaders from RC, Protestant and Pentecostal Churches from north and south including Archbishops Eamon Martin and John McDowell, the Moderator of the Presbyterian Church, President of the Methodist Church, Evangelical Alliance and a large range of Pentecostal Churches.

"Maybe next year the Council would fund the St Patrick Testimony pamphlets as his wonderful testimony transcends all denominations. If so, I cant wait for Patrick's Day in 2024 to happen."

The music of salvation and eternity - Houston McKelvey

During all of my ordained ministry I have had the God - given good fortune to be associated with church communities which enjoyed good music, psalm and hymn singing.

I have been privileged also to have spent periods in residence in cathedrals and colleges where christian music is prioritised.

My faith and my understanding of Christianity has been informed and directed by such music shaped worship.

In Holy Week leading to the principal feast of Easter we affirm in the best known of hymns the centralities of our Christian faith. Most Christians whom I know have their own particular hymn or set of hymns which are key to their understanding of their faith.

When it comes to Holy Week I can draw on such a rich seam. The experience which dominates however is not from my nurture in Ireland or Britain, nor from within an anglican church building.

Rather, it is from Methodism, and black America. I had been invited to conduct a series of seminars at an Episcopal seminary at Evanston near Chicago. When I mentioned this to an Irish Methodist colleague he revealed he was

undertaking a program of study at a Methodist seminary across the road from the one I was going to and would I collect some books for him!

I met Linda the professor of Christian Education at that Methodist seminary. We talked the same language. I joined my Irish Methodist colleague on this program of professional development. It was a tough program and fitting in the journeys for the residential periods was not for the fainthearted. Linda's husband Dwight was the Dean of Chapel and taught liturgy in the seminary.

Eventually graduation came round. The graduands were those like myself who had completed doctorate of ministry programs and those who had completed Masters of Divinity degrees and were about to be ordained.

Before the graduation at a communion service in the chapel one of the Masters students sang a solo. Dwight had chosen well. The hairs on the backs of my arm rose, and indeed are doing so as I type this.

She was a young black woman and she sang informed by her faith, race and American experience. She sang "Were you there when they crucified my Lord...Were you there when they nailed him to the tree..."

Naturally I knew the words but this lady was singing from her faith and culture within the environs of a part of the United States which had known racial conflict. She was not giving a performance, she was singing her testimony to her faith and vocation.

May we stand with her and all fellow believers at the foot of the Cross once again this coming week. May we hear the music of salvation and eternity.
