

Secretary General of ACC: Gafcon intentionally "ignorant" of polity



The Secretary General of the Anglican Communion issued a rebuke to Gafcon in his address to the Anglican Consultative Council, John Chilton writes in Episcopal Cafe

The Rt. Rev. Dr. Josiah Idowu-Fearon delivered his report Monday at ACC17HongKong. He spoke especially of deliberate ignorance of the polity of the Anglican Communion, pointing out the Communion's polity is, in particular, different from the polity of the Roman Catholic Church.

Paul Handley of The Church Times reported that Dr Idowu-Fearon asked directly: "How should we respond to GAFCON?" — the Global Anglican Fellowship of conservative Provinces that has been acting increasingly independently in recent years, after a split over sexuality. "How do we handle this to prevent a schism in our Communion?"

He spoke of "deliberate ignorance": "When you see a Primate, when you see a bishop, who knows that this is what it means to be an Anglican Church . . . and he pretends that he doesn't, that's very frustrating."

There was a more general lack of understanding, too, since Anglicanism was not even taught in many theological colleges and seminaries around the world, he said. "Where it is taught, it is not Anglicanism: it is self-made Anglicanism.

"When you get to some of them you think — and pardon me if some people are offended by this — you would think we are a Roman Church, where decisions are taken and passed down.

"There are no debates, and, where you have debates, they are not well informed. This is a major problem."

He later clarified that he had not intended to denigrate the Roman Catholic Church, and had apologised to the Vatican representative at the ACC.

Dr Idowu-Fearon also spoke of the way in which some had snubbed the Archbishop of Canterbury, who invites all new Primates to stay at Lambeth Palace. "It is disheartening to hear a Primate give one excuse or other to avoid this hospitality."

For a solution, he cited the example of the Evangelical Fellowship in the Anglican Communion (EFAC), which, in the 1960s, had deliberated breaking away to form an independent Evangelical Church, but had been dissuaded by the late Revd Dr John Stott.

"If GAFCON would be just that kind of movement, it should be embraced."

He was happy to echo Archbishop Welby's response to the last GAFCON meeting in June 2018: "In as much as GAFCON is committed to renewal and growth, what is there

that could be criticised? If that is what GAFCON is about, then it is right for the Communion to welcome it as an influence for good and for the Kingdom.

"The difficulty arises when GAFCON involves itself in the structures of the Communion in a way that caused confusion and potential division."

The Anglican polity, he said, involved consultation between bishops, clergy, and laity. "But I'm sharing with you that, in a good number of our provinces and dioceses, particularly in the Global South, there are no debates.

As well as duplicate structures, Dr Idowu-Fearon "had difficulty" with calls to invite, as full participants to the Lambeth Conference, people "who are clearly not members of the Communion", and for calls to boycott the conference because of the disagreements with other Provinces.



The Moderator was in Craigavon earlier this week. He reported that he saw, "A growing Church considering building plans! Lachlan Webster is having an outstanding ministry in the place."

In another part of his address, Dr Idowu-Fearon also castigated Provinces that were able to contribute to the Communion's finances, but were being "financially irresponsible". Nearly two-thirds of the Communion's budget comes from just two Provinces: England (41 per cent), and the United States (22 per cent).

Dr Idowu-Fearon did not name any Provinces, and the published ACC budget does not distinguish between Provinces that are unable to pay, and those that are unwilling. No contribution, however, has been received, since 2014, from Congo, Nigeria, Pakistan, Tanzania, Uganda, and West Africa.

The secretary-general ended by affirming that exciting things were happening in the Communion, and spoke of seeing many converts in his travels. "The Spirit of the Lord is moving more because of our crisis — but I believe he will move the more if we can focus on discipleship."

ACNA, whose Archbishop is the current chair of Gafcon, has been invited by the Archbishop of Canterbury to attend Lambeth 2020.

\$500,000 allocation from Pope's charity for mexican migrants

Peter's Pence, a global charitable fund overseen by Pope Francis, will support migrants in limbo in Mexico, the charity has announced.

"Men and women, often with young children, flee poverty and violence, hoping for a better future in the United States," said the Peter's Pence website. "However, the U.S. border remains closed to them."

"All these people were stranded, unable to enter the United States, without a home or livelihood," the announcement continued. "The Catholic Church hosts thousands of them in the hotels within dioceses or religious congregations, providing basic necessities, from housing to clothing."

A \$500,000 allocation will go to 27 projects in 16 dioceses and religious congregations who are seeking to provide housing, food and basic necessities to the migrants.

The Peter's Pence website said there were six migrant caravans, totaling 75,000 people, that entered Mexico, as did other groups. Most of these people came from Honduras, El Salvador and Guatemala.

Fleeing violence or poverty or seeking a better life, migrants are sometimes encouraged by human traffickers' false promises of jobs in the U.S. Some take out loans to pay for the trip, which then may lead to retaliation against families if unpaid. The trips can be dangerous, with sexual assault of women a common danger.

"Thanks to these projects, and thanks to Christian charity and solidarity, the Mexican Bishops hope to be able to continue helping our migrant brothers and sisters," the Peter's Pence website said.

According to Peter's Pence media coverage of the migrant emergency has been decreasing, leading to a decrease in aid to migrants by the government and private individuals.

The collection for the papal charity generally takes place June 29 or the Sunday closest to the Feast of Saints Peter and Paul.

Belfast parish to celebrate 100 years of worship and witness

St Bartholomew's Parish, Stranmillis, will be celebrating 100 years of worship and witness with a series of events over the weekend of May 10-12.

It was on April 27 1919, that St Bartholomew's District Church received full parochial status, becoming the Parish of St Bartholomew, Stranmillis.

The centenary celebrations begin with a *Parish Supper* on Friday May 10 in the Canon Lindsay Hall, named after the first rector of the Parish, the Rev Herbert O Lindsay, who served as rector until 1958. The supper takes place at 7.30pm, and booking is required.

The first rector of St Bartholomew's, Stranmills, was The Rev Herbert Lindsay. The late Bishop William McCappin also served as rector, as did the former Dean of Connor, Very Rev B Moller and Canon Hubert Gough. They also provided a chaplaincy service to Stranmillis Teacher Training College which was within the parish area.

The parish has a tradition of good Anglican Choral music.

On Saturday May 11 there will be a *Photographic and Artefact Exhibition* in Canon Lindsay Hall open from 11am until 5pm. Refreshments will be available.

On Sunday May 12 the rector, the Rev Canon Kevin Graham will preside over a Thanksgiving Eucharist at 10.30am, and at Choral Evensong at 3.30, the parish welcomes The Most Rev Dr Richard Clarke, Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of All Ireland, as guest preacher.



Until late in the 19th century, the Stranmillis Road was a country road stretching to the River Lagan and the first lock on its canal.

By the turn of the century there were many new streets. The area was within the parish of St. Thomas and in 1906 a lease was taken on a hall in which local church activities could then be held.

Later, a District Church was built and was dedicated by the Bishop of Down and Connor and Dromore, on Easter Day 1913.

In 1919 the new parish of St Bartholomew was created, incorporating areas from the parishes of St Thomas and Malone. The Rev Lindsay had been in charge of the new parish since its inception, having been curate since 1913.

In 1925 the lease of a two-acre site at Mount Pleasant was purchased. The foundation stone was laid on February 9 1929, and the Church was consecrated on September 13 1930.


The centenary celebrations will give thanks for all those who have given witness to Christ in this place for these many years and pray for God's blessings for the future.

Today in Christian history

April 1, 1548: Parliament orders the publication of the Book of Common Prayer (BCP). Though Thomas Cranmer is rightly credited with the final form of the BCP, he worked

with a committee of scholars, including Reformer Martin Bucer, to shape his famous liturgy.

April 1, 1745: David Brainerd begins his missionary work among the Native Americans of New Jersey, having previously worked in Massachusetts and Pennsylvania. The New Jersey natives showed more interest than most, but Brainerd died of tuberculosis only two years into his work there. Still, his diary, published by Jonathan Edwards, became a major force in promoting missions work, inspiring missionaries like William Carey, Henry Martyn, and Thomas Coke.
