Insights on Methodist Covenant at C of I Synod

The 21st Anniversary of the Church of Ireland and Methodist Covenant was marked at General Synod

The Covenant between the Church of Ireland and the Methodist Church in Ireland is soon to celebrate its 21st birthday, members of Synod heard. Proposing the report of the Covenant Council, Canon Dr Maurice Elliott said that Church News Ireland Covenant continued to celebrate a shared understanding in many aspects of faith, worship, heritage, ministry and governance.

The text of the Covenant mapped out ten different areas in which the two Churches were keen to explore further common life and mission, he said. Amongst others, these included prayer for each other, mutual welcome of sacramental ministry, shared resources, joint programmes in training, participation in governance and fuller sharing of ministries.

Dr Elliott said that over the years much work had been invested into trying to put substance on to this framework, and one prospective task now identified by the Council is that it may be timely to re—work the original document, not by altering the heads of agreement, but with a common declaration of newly identified priorities for ongoing convergence. He hoped that could be drafted in time for next year's Synod.

He highlighted the Bill on occasional interchangeability of ministry which was agreed by the Synod.

Looking ahead, he said that future aspects of the Council's work would involve deeper exploration of liturgical rites, the need for updated regulations under charities legislation for Local Covenant Partnerships (it is hoped that these can go to the Standing Committee with a view to bringing another Bill next year), and revision of the booklet, Guidelines for the Journey, first published in 2008.

"In an overall sense, one of the principles which urgently needs to become more firmly established is that, by virtue of the Covenant, the relationship between our two Churches begins to move beyond simple ecumenism. The Council is determined to see the Covenant go forward with renewed vitality. We would respectfully suggest that, twenty–one years in, it ought to be becoming second–nature for us to think 'covenant' at every opportunity, and that we should be much more intentional about finding ways of substantiating the shared approach which we have come to enjoy," Dr Elliott stated.

Speaking to the report, the Revd David Nixon, President of the Methodist Church, said that that that while we should be thinking Covenant we should also think mission, think brother and sister. He said that there were many aspects of mission which could be done better together as brothers and sisters.

Church Army and Mental Health Awareness Week

This week is an opportunity to normalise conversations around mental health and provide recognition to those affected.

Church Army engages with issues of mental health every day - its Evangelists and Key Projects are working to help individuals and groups with a whole range of mental health problems, to show love and bring the hope of the gospel to their lives.

In Gloucester, Emma Wilson is leading a café that enables anyone in the community who is lonely, struggling or feeling isolated to come, eat, and do some life together. Emma's hope is to enable them to grow in their self worth by breaking the dependency culture; through slow-cooker classes, a pay-as-you-can café, and employment opportunities.

In Selby, Amy Hayes hosts a group of women at her house for pancakes and coffee. They sit round, eat and catch up providing a safe space for members to be accepted as they are. They share deep conversations about faith and life, and this gathering has become 'the thing to look forward to each week'. The positive impact on mental health through something so simple is profound.

In Wrexham, Jack Wright serves in a community where mental health issues are a prominent problem among young people. Jack runs a young men's hiking group, which gives them an opportunity to enjoy the outdoors and improved mental clarity. Jack also offers 1-to-1 mentoring sessions for those who need it, where he provides a safe and judgement-free space.

These are just little snapshots of how Church Army is reaching out to countless individuals struggling with mental health issues - and it does so because love and hope is at the forefront of its caring and compassionate faith. This week, Church Army asks you to join us in prayer for all who are experiencing mental health issues.

Catholic, Evangelical and Baptist churches among more than 120 destroyed in India violence

Evangelical, Baptist, Roman Catholic and Presbyterian churches are among more than 120 Christian places of worship which have been completely destroyed or burnt in a wave of violence across the Manipur district of India.

Responsible Christian news sources have a list confirming the number of churches - including those which have been demolished since the violence began on May 3rd. It's believed the total number of churches destroyed may be much higher.

The violence broke out in the northeastern state of Manipur during a protest march. Thousands of Christian tribal people were opposing a demand by the majority Hindu non-tribal group for the constitutionally defined status of a scheduled tribe, which can bring with it access to jobs and education.

Give peas a chance - Archbishop of Wales supports pea-growing effort for Christian Aid Week

Christian Aid week began on Sunday with the focus on providing farmers with hardier crops.



The charity says countries such as Malawi are paying the price for global crises with food, fuel and fertiliser doubling in price in the last 12 months.

Farmers are also seeing their harvests fail as climate

change brings increasingly erratic weather.

The Archbishop of Wales is among those urging people to take part in the week with prayers and donations to support people in Malawi.

Most Rev Andrew John said, "This Christian Aid Week is our chance to focus on our sisters and brothers in Malawi who are battling desperate poverty. I urge you to support their work in your donations and your prayers so their lives can be transformed. Please give generously to the Christian Aid appeal." **Church News Ireland**

The interim head of Christian Aid Wales, the Revd Andrew Sully, will be addressing the congregations of Llandaff Cathedral about the charity's work. He said :

"I'm looking forward to these services and meeting our supporters. Christian Aid Week is a time of great joy and hope when we stand together with our global neighbours in a very focused way to tackle poverty.

"Farming is hugely symbolic because it helps us remember small things done together can grow to make bigger differences. We are hugely grateful to all our supporters for their amazing efforts; we couldn't do it without them."

Christian Aid says more hardy crops include the superresilient pigeon pea which enriches the soil for future harvests. Supporters of the week which runs until 20th May, are being invited to hold pea-themed events to raise money.

Ukraine's President exchanges gifts with Pope

Ukraine's President Zelensky has had an audience with the Pope during his visit to Rome.

Pope Francis gave the President a bronze sculpture representing an olive branch - Zelensky gave the Pope a work of art crafted from a bulletproof plate and a painting entitled "Loss" reflecting the deaths of children in the conflict.



During the meeting at the Apostolic Palace, they agreed on the requirement to continue providing humanitarian aid to Ukraine.

The Pope also highlighted the need for "gestures of humanity" towards the most fragile victims of the conflict.

Pope Francis assured the President of his constant prayers and President Zelensky said the visit was a 'great honour.'

A communique released by the Holy See press office said that following his meeting with the Pope, President Zelensky met Archbishop Paul Richard Gallagher, Secretary for Relations with States and International Organizations of the Secretariat of State :

"During the cordial talks with H.E. Archbishop Gallagher, the focus was first of all on the current war in Ukraine and the urgent concerns associated with it, particularly those of humanitarian nature, as well as on the need to continue Church News Ireland Page 17

efforts to achieve peace. The occasion was also propitious to discuss a number of bilateral issues, especially concerning the life of the Catholic Church in the country."
