

New rector for Donemana

The Parish of Donagheady (Donemana) is to get a new incumbent later this year. Rev Capt Richard Beadle has been appointed to succeed Rev Dr Robin Stockitt, who retired almost a year ago.

The news was shared this morning with worshippers at St James Church in Donemana and parishioners in the Manorhamilton Group of Parishes, in the Diocese of Kilmore, which Rev Beadle has been overseeing as Bishop's Curate since his ordination in September 2017.

Rev Beadle has been an active Church Army Officer since 1998 and before being commissioned had worked in the Employment Service in the UK. His work as a Church Army evangelist took him to parishes in Nelson, East Lancashire; St. Matthew's on Belfast's Woodvale Road; and the rural Swanlinbar-Kildallon Group of Parishes in the Diocese of Kilmore.

"I am excited that my family and I will be coming to Donemana," Rev Beadle says. "Exploring Donemana with the nominators has been a privilege and blessing, and we have clearly sensed God's hand. We pray God will use our gifts fully to make a lasting contribution as we seek to share the wonderful news of Christ. We greatly look forward to getting to know our new parish and diocese."

Moments such as this can be bitter-sweet for clergy. "After 14 years," Richard says, "leaving Kilmore, Elphin and Ardagh Diocese is not easy, yet we are enormously grateful for our time and friends there."

Richard, and his wife Pauline, will now be making preparations for their move to the Church of Ireland's northernmost diocese. Pauline is a midwife by profession. She loves cooking and her happy place could be any kitchen. The couple have three children: Ruth, who is at Lancaster University, and twins Alicia and Asher who are studying for A-levels in England.

When time allows, Rev Richard indulges his passions for tennis and nature photography – he was interviewed on BBC Radio Ulster recently about the plight of the curlew – and he describes himself as "a rare Crystal Palace fan".



Tributes paid as former MEP and IFA President Alan Gillis passes away

Warm tributes have been paid to former Fine Gael MEP and past President of the Irish Farmers Association Alan Gillis of Grangecon, who passed away on Friday.

There was a huge turnout for his funeral service held on Monday in St Mary's Church, Baltinglass, followed by his interment in St John's Churchyard, Stratford-on-Slaney.

Mr Gillis was President of the Irish Farmers' Association from 1990 to 1994, and was elected to the European Parliament at the 1994 European election for the Leinster constituency. He was a member of the Committee on



Agriculture and Rural Development in the European Parliament.

Mr Gillis is sadly missed by his children Nigel, Hazel, Barry and Anna. His wife, Irene, passed away in 2020, while he is also predeceased by his son Stephen, who passed in 2018.

An Tánaiste and Leader of Fine Gael, Leo Varadkar was among the first to offer their condolences to the Gillis family.

He said: "It was with deep sadness that I learned of the passing of Alan Gillis, he was a real gentleman and liked by all who met him. A dedicated public representative, Gillis was elected as an MEP for Fine Gael in the Leinster Constituency in 1994. While there, he served on the European Parliament's Committee on Agriculture and Rural **Church News Ireland**

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Development, putting Irish rural communities at the heart of Europe.

"A former President of the Irish Farmer's Association, Gillis was a passionate determined and considerate representative both at home and abroad. My condolences go to his children, Nigel, Hazel, Barry and Anna, and his extended family."

Senator Victor Boyhan said Mr Gillis was an engineer by profession, and always maintained he was a "Farmer by choice."

In the early 1960s, Mr Gillis bought a farm in Kill, County Kildare, and soon decided he wanted to pursue farming full-time but required more land to fulfil that ambition. He set his sights on magnificent 375-acre farm in Grange on and agreed a deal to purchase the farm at Ballyhoos, close to Senator Boyhan's own grandfathers farm in Grangecon.

"Alan Gillis will be missed by his many friends and his huge network of colleagues, he was a farmer, Churchman and politician. He advocated strongly for farm families, was faithful to and proud of his Church of Ireland roots and loved a good political argument," said Senator Boyhan.

"Alan maintained a strong interest in agriculture from European Common Agriculture Policy (CAP) to Dáil and Seanad debates on Agriculture, church matters and politics.

Rift over same-sex marriage in Anglican Church of Australia deepens after synod vote, threatening schism

The Anglican Church of Australia appears to be on the verge of schism over whether to allow same-sex marriage, with the powerful Diocese of Sydney and a majority of clergy and Church News Ireland Page 14

lay delegates to its General Synod in opposition and the House of Bishops narrowly in support.

On May 11, General Synod considered a resolution introduced by Sydney Archbishop Kanishka Raffel asserting that "the solemnization of a marriage between a same-sex couple is contrary to the teaching of Christ and the faith, ritual, ceremonial and/or discipline of this church."

Two of General Synod's three legislative bodies – the House of Laity and the House of Clergy – approved the statement, 63-47 and 70-39, respectively. The third body, the House of Bishops, voted 12-10 against the statement, causing the motion to fail.

"Today, the majority of the House affirmed the teaching of Jesus on the subject of marriage and its expression in historic Anglican rites. That is why I am deeply disappointed that a majority of bishops voted against making a clear statement," Raffel said in a statement after the vote.

The following day, delegates also rejected a resolution that would have approved same-sex marriage. The issue of same-sex marriage, which was legalized in Australia in 2017, has been a flashpoint in the Anglican Church of Australia ever since, with the Sydney diocese vocally against it. The conservative, evangelical diocese, which includes over 400 churches and dozens of schools, is the largest of the church's dioceses.

It is associated with the GAFCON movement, a network of Anglicans around the world opposed to same-sex marriage.

GAFCON Australia's board of directors includes Raffel and the Rt. Rev. Richard Condie, bishop of Tasmania.

The Diocese of Sydney does not ordain women to the priesthood and has begun requiring new principals and directors of its school boards to sign a document stating that they believe marriage is between a man and a woman.

Before the General Synod vote, Raffel had warned that if the statement opposing same-sex marriage did not pass, then something was "fundamentally awry," and he discussed the possibility of dioceses leaving the church.

Mentioning other Anglican churches that had faced schisms over same-sex marriage, Raffel told General Synod, "it has proved to be the case that when statements like this one have failed ... then some Anglicans have found their conscience has not allowed them to continue fellowship."

In at least three Anglican Communion provinces – The Episcopal Church, the Anglican Church of Canada and the Anglican Episcopal Church of Brazil – parishes and dioceses have been upended by schism over same-sex marriage and women's ordination. Disputes over property ownership between Episcopal dioceses and the Anglican Church in North America, created by former Episcopalians, continue nearly 20 years after the rift broke open in response to The Episcopal Church's election and consecration of its first openly gay bishop, the Rt. Rev. Gene Robinson, who has since retired as bishop of the Diocese of New Hampshire.

GAFCON-affiliated parishes in New Zealand followed leaders and left the Anglican Church in Aotearoa, New Zealand and Polynesia in 2018 after that church's General Synod approved same-sex marriage. In all, 12 parishes seceded and formed their own GAFCON-affiliated church. GAFCON's Australia branch has threatened to do the same and has already set up a legal entity as a "lifeboat" for parishes or dioceses that decide to leave.

In a speech to synod after the House of Bishops' veto of the statement opposing same-sex marriage, Raffel said the church is now in a "perilous position" with no denomination-wide agreement on marriage.

"In that case, we ought to stop wasting each other's time by gathering this way and supporting these structures," he said.

Papal nuncio who played key role in NMH building transfer set to leave Ireland

One of the most influential if low-key papal nuncios to serve in Ireland will leave shortly for Prague following the Vatican

announcement of his appointment to the Czech Republic earlier this month.

Archbishop Jude Thaddeus Okolo (65) has been in Ireland for just five years but in that time has appointed 12 bishops, or almost half the current membership of the Irish Episcopal Conference.

He was central to preparations for the visit of Pope Francis to Ireland in 2018 and played a key role in securing Vatican permission for the Religious Sisters of Charity to transfer "the entire issued share capital of St Vincent's Healthcare group to St Vincent's Holdings for a nominal sum of € 1.00" in 2020.

In line with Catholic Church Canon Law provisions, formal approval for any decision to complete the transfer of extensive property to new ownership by a religious congregation has to be secured from Rome.

At the time a canon lawyer, who wished to remain anonymous, told The Irish Times that the Vatican decision meant "doctrines and teachings" of the Catholic Church would have "no authority or control" over either the new St Vincent's Hospital Holding CLG or the new National Maternity Hospital (NMH) and that there was no vehicle "by which such authority or control could be exercised".

Rome consulted the Catholic Primate, Archbishop Eamon Martin; then-archbishop of Dublin Diarmuid Martin, and Archbishop Okolo before making its decision.

Marks and Spencer boss: Brexit forced us to withdraw 600 lines from Irish stores

Marks and Spencer has had to withdraw about 600 lines of goods from its stores in the Republic of Ireland since Brexit, peers have been told.

Sacha Berendji, the retailer's Ireland and Northern Ireland director, also said that it had faced increased costs and wastage due to new rules and administration.

He was giving evidence to the House of Lords Protocol on Ireland/Northern Ireland sub committee

He told peers that the impact on their operations in Northern Ireland, where a number of grace periods to rules within the Northern Ireland Protocol apply, had been significantly less than in the Republic.

He said: "Pre-Brexit, our food supply chain worked in exactly the same way for all our stores in the United Kingdom and Ireland, once Brexit came in, and in preparation for it, we had to significantly adjust our supply chain.

"While our business is significant in Ireland, it isn't big enough to stand up its own supply chain in Ireland so the vast majority of our goods continue to to be shipped from GB over to Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland.

"In order to facilitate this we had to create a new export centre in Motherwell. All of our product for export to Northern Ireland and the Republic is now shipped into Motherwell; previously it was in our regular depots.

Sweden and Finland apply for Nato membership

Sweden and Finland have confirmed they will apply for Nato membership in a historic shift that comes as a result of Russia's invasion of Ukraine.

In Sweden, the governing Social Democrats said they backed joining the Western security alliance, paving the way for the country to apply.

The announcement came soon after Finland formally announced it too would apply to join the grouping.

Russia sees Nato as a security threat and has warned of "consequences".

Sweden stayed neutral in World War II and for more than two centuries has avoided joining military alliances.
