Participants were welcomed by Archbishop Michael Jackson and Rev Abigail Sines, followed by a keynote address by Rev Dr Stephen Skuce of the Methodist Church.

The concepts of Sanctuary and Hospitality are prominent in many different religions and expressions of faith.

When a faith community receives the Places of Sanctuary designation, it is an affirmation that the community is one in which hospitality and sanctuary are woven into their life and explicitly stated, so that those looking for a welcome will know where they can find one. Bangor Worldwide to host première of one-man play about the persecuted church

Bangor Worldwide has released details of its programmes planned for Convention week, from Friday 18th to Saturday 26th August, during its preview launch events. The highlight will be the Northern Ireland and Ireland première of If prison walls could speak a play run in partnership with Release International and performed by the Artless Theatre Company.

The one-man hybrid multimedia performance production will first be performed in Hamilton Road Presbyterian Church on Saturday 19th August, the base for the majority of the Convention events, and will tour during the week.

This is a play about the imprisonment of a Christian believer in a Sudanese jail and due to the nature of the content, is only suitable for children over 12. Tickets need to be purchased online (\pounds 5) from the website in advance and numbers are limited.



At the launch of the programme for Bangor Worldwide 2023 is Keith McIlwaine, BW committee member, Steph Devlin from New Irish Arts, Dr Sinclair Ferguson guest speaker, Lesley Stewart, BW Secretary and Ruth Manning, BW committee member.

Speaking at the launch events this week, Chairman Tom Clarke said, "Our theme for 2023 is Arise Shine - from Isaiah 60 verses 1 to 3 and referred to again in many places in the New Testament. This is clearly an important instruction which Christians must take seriously and hence the focus it is being given in this year's Convention.

"Each year, Bible teaching forms a core element of Bangor Worldwide and this year we are delighted that Dr Chris Wright will be leading the studies each morning from Monday to Friday, at 11.30am. These are preceded by the

daily prayer meetings which are led each time by one of our speakers.

"The majority of the events will be held at Hamilton Road Presbyterian Church but there are also events in the neighbouring Baptist Church as well as in Dublin, Drumreagh, Lurgan and Magherafelt. In addition, we are livestreaming some of our meetings to hubs across the country - an exciting extension of the reach of Worldwide during Convention week.

"Also for the first time we will have a presence at Bangor seafront during Convention week in the shape of the Gospel Truck, a ministry of Faith Mission. It is well worth a visit."

There are specific events for young adults on both Fridays as well as a special Equip Gathering on Saturday 19th in 1st Bangor Presbyterian Church. A ladies afternoon tea event will take place in Bangor Parish Church on Thursday 24th featuring Naomi Dudgeon from Faith Mission and Kate Namate from ShineHisLight in Kenya. St Saviour's Church in Dollingstown, Lurgan will host the play on Sunday 20th August at 6.30pm. Registration will be required for certain events such as seminars via the Bangor Worldwide website.

Irish bishops launch second annual Pray For Life Novena

The Council for Life of the Irish Catholic Bishops' Conference on Friday last launched a Pray For Life Novena which will run from Tuesday 23 May until Wednesday 31 May (Feast of the Visitation).

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The Pray For Life Novena and its associated website Pray For Life - Novena May 23rd - 31st will give people an opportunity be an active part of this initiative to pray for the protection of human life and to build a culture of life. The Council for Life is inviting people to sign up on prayforlife.ie to receive the daily prayers and actions that will focus on themes such as expectant Mothers and Fathers, unborn Children, for those who defend life and for an end to abortion.

Launching the Pray For Life Novena, Bishop Kevin Doran, chair of the Council for Life, said: "This year, the period of the Novena includes the great Feast of Pentecost when we celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit, the 'Lord and Giver of Life'. My prayer is that there will be a fresh outpouring of the gifts of the Holy Spirit on all of us who pray the Novena, and on our whole society. Gifts such as Wisdom, Right Judgement, Courage and Reverence, which are so relevant to our mission of building a better and more just society, where ever life and every person is respected."

Bishop Doran continued: "This is the second year in which the Council for Life has offered this Novena. This year we do so against the backdrop of the government's recent Review of the abortion legislation, which proposes changes in the law which would weaken the rights of the unborn, weaken still further the limited safeguards for women, and restrict the right of conscientious objection for pro-life healthcare professionals. We hope the Pray For Life Novena will help re-focus hearts and minds on the essential task ahead of us, which is to work for the repeal of the Health (Regulation of Termination of Pregnancy) Act 2018, and to replace it with public policies consistent with the right to life and the dignity Church News Ireland Page 13 of women. 'We should be comfortable talking about mental health': Justin Welby encourages churches to work alongside NHS

The Archbishop of Canterbury has encouraged church leaders to explore collaborative ways of tackling the UK's mental health crisis as recent research revealed that 50 per cent of Britons face mental health challenges at least once a week.

Speaking at a mental health conference organised by ChurchWorks Commission, Most Rev Justin Welby said church should be "a place where we're comfortable talking about mental health".

"We all know that being a Christian doesn't mean we're all sorts of happy all the time," he said. "Faith doesn't mean the absence of mental health challenges. But it does mean that there is comfort for us when we're experiencing hard times."

Several Christian organisations came together to provide "clear and simple next steps" for church leaders to take action in supporting "better mental health, better well-being, and better health outcomes" in churches and communities.

Speaking to Premier, News Jack Palmer-White, senior director of the Good Faith Partnership and one of the key organizers, said churches should work in tandem with the National Health Service (NHS) and other healthcare entities to provide effective care.

"We need to be well informed. We need to understand how to break down stigma, and how to approach these things in a way that is, is helpful that doesn't lose what is authentic about the church's role in this but it's also healthy in terms of ensuring that those who are coming into our churches seeking support are cared for with the best possible support," he said.

Recognising the local impact and reach that churches have in their communities, the conference explored several ways to establish support systems within congregations. These included contemporary chaplaincy, church courses on wellbeing, connecting with social prescribing, and collaborating with various organisations that support mental health.

Palmer-White further stated: "Social prescribing is all about supporting people who might turn up at a GP surgery or somewhere else in the health system but what they need they're seeking can actually be best found within the community. And churches run so many things that fit the bill for that.

"We want to help people think about how do they connect with social prescribing link workers in their local area."

Archbishop Justin concluded: "We need to be equipped to support people in church as well as working closely with mental health professionals. The pastoral and spiritual care of the church is not a substitute for the expertise of mental health professionals. But the gifts offered by spiritual and pastoral guidance, and just by the love of the church community, have a valuable role in our well being by bringing together cheer."
