King's carriage for Nuncio

The new Papal Nuncio, Archbishop Miguel Maury Buendía, getting into his carriage (or rather the King's) at Archbishop's House, Westminster last week, bound for Buckingham Palace, waved off by Cardinal Vincent Nichols, the Archbishop of Westminster.

At a special Mass to welcome the new Apostolic Nuncio to Great Britain, Cardinal Vincent Nichols described the Catholics of England and Wales as "a faithful people" with a "depth of faith in our history and in our hearts."

Just hours after presenting his credentials to the newly crowned King Charles III, His Excellency Archbishop Miguel Maury Buendía attended a Westminster Cathedral Mass of welcome on the solemnity of The Ascension of the Lord, 18 May.

The Apostolic Nuncio is the personal representative of Pope Francis to the Court of St James's - the royal court for the Sovereign of the UK. His role is equivalent to that of an ambassador, representing the Holy See to the UK Government.

Cardinal Nichols said a new nuncio is a "gift" to us all and "a way of strengthening our communion with Peter and of us taking our place in the Catholic Church throughout the world." See News Report page 14

Celebrating 150 Years of St Jude's, Belfast

The Bishop of Down & Dromore, the Right Reverend David McClay has rededicated St Jude's Church, Belfast, 150 years after its foundation.

The occasion was a Sesquicentennial Service of Thanksgiving and Rededication on Saturday evening 20 May. It was attended by parishioners past and present and members of the congregation of Knockbreda Parish.



The evening was happy celebration of past ministry and anticipation of what's to come. Former rector, Canon

Norman Jardine and his wife Heather attended, along with Mrs Marlene Moore who represented her late husband and former rector Revd Billy Moore. Norman and Marlene read the lessons and several generations of parishioners led the prayers.



The church was planted by neighbouring Knockbreda Parish Church which had the vision to build a new church on the Ormeau Road within their growing parish. It was completed in 1873 and was the first Church of Ireland church to be built after disestablishment. Canon Bill Press (photo above) who is the current rector of Knockbreda, preached on Psalm 100, the Jubilate.


After the service, as people enjoyed looking at the historical exhibition around the church, refreshments were served along with generous slices of the anniversary cake.




Ascension Day Custom at St John's College

New Diocesan Secretary of Cork, Cloyne and Ross

John de Montfort has been appointed Diocesan Secretary, as successor to Billy Skuse, who will retire on 31st August. John will commence his work in the Diocese on 1st August in order to facilitate induction and transition of roles.

John de Montfort was born in Sri Lanka, where his father, Henry, was in the tea trade. His family lived there until 1977, when his father moved to Kenya to set up a Tea Broking company. He went to Canford School in Dorset, UK and then on to Reading University, where he graduated in History. After graduation, John spent two years in the antiques trade, particularly in porcelain, before starting training as a Chartered Management Accountant while working for Abbey National Bank. While in London he participated in amateur dramatics, appearing in 'Midsummer Night's Dream' and Goldoni's 'Servant of Two Masters'.

After qualifying, John served as Financial Controller for Rupert Cavendish Antiques, which specialised in Swedish furniture and Design. A chance meeting some years earlier

led to John joining the international mine clearance charity, the HALO Trust, in 1998 and he lived in Dumfriesshire, Scotland to serve as Finance Officer for the organisation. His duties involved control visits to the various countries that HALO operated in, including Afghanistan, Cambodia, Mozambique and Angola.

John is married to Emily, from Celbridge, County Kildare. They met in London and moved to Ireland in 2000 where John worked as Financial Controller of Bubble Brothers, a wine retailer in Cork City. New Papal Nuncio presents credentials to King Charles III

The new Apostolic Nuncio to Great Britain last week presented his diplomatic credentials to King Charles III.

Archbishop Miguel Maury Buendía, a Spaniard who speaks six languages, then left Buckingham Palace to formally read out his mandate during a Mass at Westminster Cathedral, London, which was celebrated by Cardinal Vincent Nichols, the president of the Bishops' Conference of England and Wales.

The Apostolic Nuncio is the personal representative of Pope Francis to the Court of St James's – the royal court for the Sovereign of the UK. His role is equivalent to that of an ambassador, representing the Holy See to the UK Government.

At a special Mass to welcome the new Apostolic Nuncio to Great Britain, Cardinal Vincent Nichols said - "The bonds between the Bishop of Rome, our Holy Father, and the Catholics of this country have always been strong. They continue to be so. We are a faithful people.

"There are many in our history who have given their lives, their wealth, their health, to maintain this fidelity and witness to it. One lies here in the Cathedral, our own martyr, Saint

John Southworth, whom we venerate and honour with great love.

"It is, then, with this depth of faith – in our history and in our hearts – that this evening we welcome our new Apostolic Nuncio, His Excellency Archbishop Miguel Maury Buendía, sent among us as the personal representative of Pope Francis. Your Excellency, dear Archbishop, you are most welcome and we assure you of our prayers for you, now and throughout your years of service to the Apostolic See.

Madrid-born Archbishop Maury Buendía replaces Archbishop Claudio Gugerotti, an Italian who was named by the Holy Father as prefect of the Dicastery for the Eastern Churches in November 2022.

A career diplomat, Archbishop Maury Buendía has previously served as Apostolic Nuncio to Romania, Moldova, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan and Tajikistan.

Among the most pressing business he will face as "Apostolic Nuncio to the Court of St James" will be to find a successor to Cardinal Nichols because the Archbishop of Westminster is now aged 77 and two years over the mandatory age of retirement.

The new nuncio must also find a new bishop for the Diocese of Hexham and Newcastle, which has been in turmoil following the sudden and premature retirement of Bishop Robert Byrne, 66, in December amid serious "errors of judgement".

Archbishop Maury Buendía, 67, was born into an Andalusian family and studied under the Jesuits at Malaga before attending university in Madrid.

He studied philosophy and theology at the Conciliar Seminary of Madrid and was ordained a priest for the archdiocese in June 1980.

He went on to gain a degree in dogmatic theology at the Pontifical University of Salamanca in 1985 and then a doctorate in canon law from the Angelicum university in Rome in 1987.

He entered the Holy See's diplomatic service in July 1987, serving in diplomatic missions in several countries such as Rwanda, Uganda, Morocco, Egypt, Slovenia and Ireland. He was also a professor at the National Seminary of Nicaragua.

In 2004, he was called to the Section for Relations with States within the Secretariat of State of the Holy See with responsibility for south east Europe.

Four years later, in 2008, he was appointed titular Archbishop of Italica and Apostolic Nuncio to Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan and Tajikistan.

Pope Francis appointed him Apostolic Nuncio to Romania in 2015, and to the Republic of Moldova in January 2016.

Besides Spanish, Archbishop Maury Buendía speaks or has good knowledge of English, Italian, French, Russian and Slovene.
