Iconic Milford Church is 60-years-old



St Peter's Church in Milford, which was designed by the famous architect Liam McCormick, turns 60 years old today, Donegal News reports May 28.

Due to the pandemic the milestone will be marked with a simple mass led by Fr Stephen Gorman this morning with plans for a celebration next year. Fr Gorman told the Donegal News that the church itself is of national importance and said its 60-year anniversary is a great milestone for the local community.

"The church was blessed by the Most Reverend MacNeely, Bishop of Raphoe at the time. The architect was Liam McCormick of Corr and McCormick who were based in Derry. The Stations of the Cross were done by the famous

architect Imogen Stuart. We find that a lot of people come to look at the stations and pray in front of them. Many architecture students contact the parish because they are doing studies on the church itself.

"It is a great milestone for the local community.

Unfortunately we are not able to celebrate but we are hoping once the pandemic ceases that we will be able to and we hope to have the Bishop come and say mass next year."

Liam McCormick was regarded as the "father of modern church architecture in Ireland" and designed several churches in Donegal. Milford was his first in the county followed by Murlog (1964), Desertegney (1964), Burt (1967), Creeslough (1971), Glenties (1974) and Donoughmore Presbyterian Church (1977).

Most Rev. Dr MacNeely said at the time 'St Peter's is a type of church which will attract a good deal of attention and interest from people who know something about church architecture.' At the opening ceremony Archdeacon Hugh Canon Boyle also said: "In years to come, St Peter's will be pointed out as one of the gems of modern church architecture".

The erection of the church began in July 1959 and the construction work was undertaken by Mr Joseph McMenamin, Stranorlar. It was built and furnished at a cost of £28,000. An article in the Derry People dated June 3, 1961 noted that 'the contemporary design embodies many features new in church architecture. Built of steel reinforced concrete, the roof is supported on four tapered steel columns. The interior is finished in a restful buff-coloured rough-surfaced brick, and the floor is in grey-white mosaic. The design accentuating the importance of the altar allows for clear vision from any of the seated position." Report and photographs courtesy Donegal News

## Ireland participates in Iter Europaeum initiative

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The Iter European initiative, marking the 50th Anniversary of Diplomatic Relations between the European Union and the Holy See continues to bring new energy and ideas to many of Rome's churches.

The project, that aims to show and enhance the deep links between the European Union and its 27 Member States, and the Holy See was launched on 9 May, coinciding with Europe Day, and is scheduled to continue until 27 June.

During this period, each Sunday, liturgical celebrations, concerts and guided tours take place in churches or basilicas that are connected to one of the EU member states.

On Sunday, 31 May, EU Ambassadors visited the Irish National Church, of St Isidore, near Rome's Via Veneto.

Speaking to Vatican Radio's Mario Galgano, the Irish Ambassador to the Holy See, Derek Hannon highlighted the bonds the EU and the Holy See have in common:

From your point of view, how are diplomatic relations between the Holy See and the EU and how does your country collaborate with these relations? What common challenges are faced?

Relations between the Holy See and the EU are excellent as Commission president Ursula von der Leyen said after her recent meeting with Pope Francis. The EU sees the Holy See as a promoter of justice in the world and a defender of human rights. My sense is that the Holy See views the EU as a zone of stability and as a stabilising force in an increasingly fractured international landscap

Ireland has been a fully-committed member of the Union since we joined in 1973 and we are fully engaged across the spectrum of the Union's activities. Within the EU Ireland echoes the views of the Holy See on many issues including for example Migration which is so close to the concerns of Pope Francis and also on Nuclear Disarmament. We both agree that even the possession of nuclear weapons is unacceptable and have signed and ratified the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons.

How does the Irish community live in Rome?

The Irish have had a strong presence in Rome and in the Vatican going back a long, long time. Like many older communities, the Irish community in Rome is fully integrated into the life of the city. Rome remains a favourite place of pilgrimage for many Irish people and they arrive here in large numbers throughout the year, though obviously not in the past year.

#### How will you celebrate the Iter Europaeum in Rome?

On Sunday, EU Ambassadors will visit the Irish National Church, San Isidoro a Capo le Case, on Via degli Artisti near the Via Veneto and I will of course join them. St Isidore's was established as a Spanish church in the early 17th century but ran into financial difficulties and was taken over by the Irish Franciscan Luke Wadding who transformed into a thriving centre for the training of priests to minister in Ireland. We will be welcomed by the Guardian Fr Hugh



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McKenna and given a guided tour of this beautiful church which has been in Irish hands almost continuously for the past 400 years.

The Iter Europaeum is a great way of reminding us of the deep and abiding historic connections between EU member States, the Holy See and the wider Eternal City. initiative, marking the 50th Anniversary of Diplomatic Relations between the European Union and the Holy See continues to bring new energy and ideas to many of Rome's churches.

# **Covid 'lifted veil' on reality of Church in Ireland - Archbishop Martin**

The Primate of All Ireland has said the Covid pandemic "lifted the veil" on the reality of the position of the Church in Ireland, observing that it ranked low on the public's list of priorities, Sarah Mac Donald writes in The Tablet.

Speaking at the online launch of a new book, Maynooth College Reflects on Covid-19: New Realities in Uncertain Times, Archbishop Eamon Martin said that despite speaking to government about the importance of public worship ahead of reopening society, it had been "humbling" to realise that "spiritual health, the importance of going to Mass, the importance of being together in worship, didn't really figure as one of the major issues in the minds of a lot of people".

But the Archbishop of Armagh noted that surveys have shown that being able to worship and be together has a



positive impact on people's mental, emotional and spiritual wellbeing and consequently on the common good.

The new book is a response to Archbishop Martin's call to explore what the Covid crisis is saying about the Church and about prayer and faith, as well as exploring the possible lasting effects of the pandemic on church life. It offers a variety of reflections from the perspectives of theology, Scripture, philosophy, ethics, liturgy, pastoral and canon law.

"So much of what we take for granted as Church was cruelly disrupted and interrupted by this pandemic," said the archbishop, and he acknowledged how difficult it was to be a leader in the Church at this time and to have the kind of decisiveness that people were sometimes expecting. It was only natural that people would start to ask: "Where is God, where is Church, where is Eucharist?"

To the question: where was the Church during this time, for him it was not inside empty churches, "but out in the daily lives of so many good people, nurses, carers, others – who, motivated by their faith, were going the extra mile to reach out in helping others".

Professor Salvador Ryan, one of the editors of the new book, said that because of the pandemic a number of issues that have needed to be addressed by the Church in Ireland were now "really being seen in high relief in a way that they haven't been seen or that we weren't prepared to see or didn't want to see or didn't have time to see" before Covid. He said the pandemic offered the Church "the opportunity to recalibrate, to take stock, and hopefully work towards renewal".



#### Christ Church, Dublin, re-opens for public worship

Yesterday on Trinity Sunday, the Cathedral of the Holy Trinity, commonly called Christ Church, Dublin celebrated its patronal festival by re—opening for public worship. The preacher at the 11am Patronal Festival Eucharist was the Revd Dr Sahr Yambasu, President Designate of the Methodist Church in Ireland.

From 2 June onwards, the cathedral's doors will be opened 30 minutes prior to the services on a 'first come, first seated' basis, with a maximum of 46 persons in the congregation. The normal pattern of choral services for the month of June will be 6pm Choral Evensong (doors open at 5.30 pm) on



Thursdays and on Sundays 11am Sung Eucharist (doors open at 10.30) and 3.30pm Choral Evensong (doors open at 15.00).

#### **Clergy move from Dungannon to Omagh**

Dungannon curate-assistant, Rev Graham Hare, has been appointed Rector of the Parishes of Drumragh with Mountfield in County Tyrone, succeeding Rev Ian Linton who moved to Rathfriland and Ballyward in February last year.

The news was broken yesterday morning to the Rector Elect's current parishioners in Drumglass (Dungannon) and shared with his new congregations about 30 miles away in Omagh and Mountfield Parish Churches.

Rev Hare, who is 38, is married to wife Hannah and the couple have three young children, Bethany-Joy, Anna-Grace and Lois-Faith. His appointment marks a return of sorts to the Diocese of Derry where, from 2005 to 2008, he was an RE teacher in Lisneal College in Londonderry. He also worked for a number of years as general manager of the independent Christian charity Love for Life, which provides relationship training in schools.

The move to Omagh provides the new incumbent with an opportunity to renew acquaintances with an 'old boss'. After being priested in 2018, Graham served as Bishop Andrew Forster's curate-assistant in Dungannon.

The Rector designate said he was looking forward to this next phase in his ministry. "I'm leaving Dungannon with a heavy heart," he said. "Drumglass is a special place, with great people, but I'm convinced that the move to Omagh is of the Lord and I'm trusting in His sovereign grace. Hannah and I have spent time in Omagh over the last few weeks, getting the feel of the place, and we've enjoyed the warmth of the welcome we've received. I'm really looking forward to meeting and getting to know people, and seeing them come to faith."

Rev Hare will be instituted into his new parishes at a Service in St Columba's Church in Omagh on Friday 2nd July.

### **Speaking to the Soul**

"We all hear these people speaking in our own languages about the wonderful things God has done!" They stood there amazed and perplexed. "What can this mean?" they asked each other. But others in the crowd ridiculed them, saying, "They're just drunk, that's all!" Acts 2:11-13 NLT

I love the carefulness of Dr Luke's account of the day of Pentecost. He is giving us only a very brief summary of what actually happened on that amazing day, but he doesn't miss out the fact that many people struggled to work out what on earth was going on! For us it is absolutely clear what a significant day it was, but for many people at the time it was thoroughly perplexing. Some asked genuine questions, and Peter is just about to give them a very full explanation. But other people concluded that the bizarre events could only be explained by alcohol.

When God works in your life in a big way there will always be a variety of responses. Perhaps you have felt led to be confirmed or baptised, or to change your job in obedience to the Lord, or to work for him in another country. Some people will have questions and we should always be delighted by this. I remember the time when an uncle of mine became a minister. He had a well-paid job in the oil industry and lived

in a beautiful home in the suburbs. As a minister he lived in much smaller house in a far less attractive area and saw his income reduced enormously. There were inevitably many questions! Such moments give us, like Peter, a superb opportunity for explaining to people what our faith means to us.

But, be warned, there will always be people who will laugh off our experiences. It must have been very hurtful for the apostles to hear that some people thought that they were intoxicated. They had completely missed the point. We should never be surprised by such responses, but patient and gracious as we explain what's going on. It is hardest of all when such reactions are from people in our own families, and we will need special grace to keep our cool and to respond wisely and graciously.
