# Service of Reception of the Stone of Destiny

A service to mark the arrival of the Stone of Destiny at Westminster Abbey was held on Saturday 29th April.



The stone, an ancient symbol of Scotland's monarchy, will play a central role in the Coronation of HM The King in the Abbey on 6th May.

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#### The Stone of Destiny

The Stone of Destiny was for centuries used in the inauguration of Scotland's kings. In 1296, King Edward I brought the stone to Westminster. He placed it within the Coronation Chair, the oak seat he commissioned in



1300-1301 and which has been the centrepiece of coronations for more than 700 years.

In 1996, the UK government announced that stone was to be returned to Scotland, but would come back to the Abbey for coronations. It has travelled from its home in the Crown Room at Edinburgh Castle where it is visited by millions of people each year.

#### About the service

The service was conducted by the Dean of Westminster, the Very Reverend Dr David Hoyle, who said in his Bidding: Today we meet in deep friendship and respect, confident in our different histories, here to acknowledge what unites us. We have a common calling under God which summons citizens of all kingdoms to find a home in the Kingdom of Christ, for he is our peace.



We meet to pray for Their Majesties King Charles and Queen Camilla, for the Royal Family and for God's blessing on all those who now work so hard on the preparations for the Coronation. We will pray for the government and people of Scotland and for our sisters and brothers in the churches of Scotland. With nations and with the Commonwealth we

look to the Coronation where, in worship and music, we will find a common voice and express a common hope.

#### Among those speaking at the service was the Right Honourable The Lord Lyon King of Arms, who said in his address:

The Stone was taken from its place in the Abbey of Scone to this Abbey Church in 1296 by command of King Edward I in an act of enmity. It was returned to Scotland in 1996 by command of Her late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II in an act of amity and now comes again to this place by command of King Charles III as an act of unity and a symbol of friendship.

#### The Very Reverend Professor David Fergusson, Dean of the Chapel Royal in Scotland and Regius Professor of Divinity, University of Cambridge, said:

Scripture recalls us to the bedrock of faith, the stones from which are hewn, the foundations upon which our lives must be built if we are to live well with one another – foundations made by God, our Creator and Sustainer. So as we mark the arrival of the Stone of Scone today, we thank God for our common purpose, for bonds of friendship, and for the rich heritage of faith.

The Reverend Canon David Stanton, the Abbey's Sub-Dean, read Ephesians 2: 13-22. Prayers were led by the Reverend Mark Birch, Minor Canon and Precentor. The service was sung by the Robin Chapel Choir, directed by Professor Herbert Kerrigan KC. The organ was played by Peter Holder, Sub-Organist.

# Armagh Service of Thanksgiving for the forthcoming Coronation

A Service of Thanksgiving for the forthcoming Coronation of King Charles III was held in St Patrick's Cathedral Armagh on the evening of Tuesday 2nd May 2023. The principal guest was His Majesty's Vice-Lord Lieutenant for County Armagh, Mr Richard Hamilton-Stubber DL

The congregation included The Lord Major of Armagh City, Banbridge and Craigavon Borough, Councillor Paul

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Greenfield together with various Aldermen & Councillors and the Council Chief Executive, Mr Roger Wilson. The Secretary of State for N. Ireland, Rt Hon Chris Heaton-Harris. US Consul-General Paul Narain, and Mr Mark Hanniffy, Irish Joint Secretary of the North/South Ministerial Council.

The cathedral choir sang a number of pieces of music performed at previous coronation services, including Handel's Zadok the Priest.

Archbishop Martin, the Head Girl of Armagh Royal School and representatives of youth organisations read the Bible passages.

Church of Ireland Archbishop John McDowell was the preacher. He told the congregation that the King has been described as a proven friend of Northern Ireland.



He elaborated stating that the King is "Indeed a friend of Ireland North and South – with a very detailed knowledge of our affairs, and more importantly, we have a place close to his heart."

The Archbishop said Charles has an advantage over many of his predecessors in his "incomparable experience of working with an enormous array of people from every nation under the sun", adding the familiarity that comes from working with people over a long period of time is "a priceless gift in terms of discipleship and a practical monarchy".

Archbishop McDowell will present the Sovereign's Orb during the coronation service at Westminster Abbey. This is the first time this part of the ceremony has been undertaken by anyone other than the Archbishop of Canterbury

The service concluded with the National Anthem and a collection was taken to support the work of Southern Area Hospice Services.

Speaking before the service, Archbishop Martin said he was pleased to attend to represent the Catholic community, and offer prayers and thoughts for the King on Saturday.

"I'm also very privileged to be able to attend the coronation myself, along with the other church leaders from the island of Ireland, it's a very special moment," he said.

"We were at the time of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth's funeral and so to return on Saturday on a much happier occasion is a wonderful privilege.

# Armenians in Ireland mark 108th anniversary of genocide

Armenians in Ireland gathered in Christ Church Cathedral, Dublin, on Sunday afternoon (April 30) to mark the 108th anniversary of the start of the Armenian Genocide.

Every year Armenians around the world mark the start of the genocide which began with the arrest of 250 Armenianintellectuals on April 24 1915. Over the years that followed 1.5 million Armenians died and a similar number of the Armenian population was scattered across the globe.

The commemoration took place in the context of Choral Evensong which was sung by the Cathedral Choir. Armenian poetry was recited by the children of St Hripsime Armenian Sunday School. The service began and concluded with music played by pianist Varazdat Khachatryan. The hymn of the martyrs of Armenian genocide was sung by Aydah Arshagian.

Welcoming the large congregation to the cathedral, Archbishop Michael Jackson noted that in both the Eastern and Western Churches, the commemoration this year took place in the Season of Easter. He pointed to the last words of Jesus on the Cross from St John's Gospel: "it is finished".

"The earthly life of Jesus Christ is finished. But memory is not finished," the Archbishop said. "It is memory that gathers us together today to commemorate The Armenian Genocide in all its stark remembering and its wilful forgetting over a century of historical life beginning as it did on April 24th 1915. Memory gives destruction and displacement, pain and horror, individual death and community genocide. Memory gives hope and colour, perspective and resonance, music and laughter. Memory gives the voice of life ended along with the open pasture of life beginning in a very specific way Church News Ireland Page 16

in the Christian picture of birth and healing, suffering and resurrection that marks out the person of Jesus Christ as our pattern and our king, as the hymnwriter expresses it."

Honorary Armenian Consul, Ohan Yergainharsian, highlighted the magnitude of what happened to the Armenian people and said that the terms 'genocide' and 'crime against humanity' were first used in reference to what happened to them in Ottoman Turkey. He hoped that the recognition of the Armenian Genocide would continue throughout the world, including in Ireland, and said that Armenians continued to suffer oppression today. Mr Yergainharsian thanked those who worked to have the Khachkar (Armenian stone cross) located in the cathedral grounds to remember the victims of the Armenian Genocide.

Bishop Hovakim Manukyan, Primate of the Diocese of the Armenian Church of the United Kingdom and Ireland, thanked the Archbishop, Christ Church Cathedral and the Church of Ireland for their ecumenical hospitality in embracing the Armenian community in Ireland. He said that the Armenian Genocide was commemorated annually on April 24 as that was the date in 1915 when the Turkish Ottoman government started arresting Armenians. He said that the decision to conduct the mass killing of Armenians did not happen over night but rather was the result of many years of anti–Armenian sentiment. Despite the contributions of Armenians to Turkish life, he stated, they were considered second class citizens. He said that this mindset contributed to genocide.

The service concluded with prayers and laying of wreaths at the Khachkar memorial. Church News Ireland Page 17

### Hannon's new song inspired by late father

Divine Comedy frontman Neil Hannon has revealed how a new composition was partly inspired by the memory of his late father, Alf McCreary writes in the Belfast Telegraph

Hannon, whose work includes the theme tunes for Father Ted and the IT Crowd, was commissioned by the Ulster Orchestra to write a new work titled As The Sun Brightens, the Shadows Deepen.

It will be given its premiere on Friday by the Ulster Orchestra.

Hannon said the piece has been influenced by memories of his father, Church of Ireland Bishop Brian Hannon, who died in January 2022 after a long illness.

He told the Belfast Telegraph: "At the reception after my dear father's funeral early last year, the conversation turned to a film he was rumoured to have narrated in the 1960s, and which had something to do with John Hume and Derry, where I was born.

"By the following day a resourceful niece of mine had found the film titled A City Solitary, which was based on John Hume's research for his thesis on Derry, in 1963.

"It was indeed narrated by my dad and it was lovely to hear his voice as a young man, with a commentary in a Pathe news-style and spoken with his soft Ulster lilt.

"I'd just been commissioned to write something for the Ulster Orchestra and this seemed like a great jumping-off point.

"A film about the history of the city of my birth, based on John Hume's research and narrated by my dad. Perfect."

On the 25th anniversary of the Good Friday Agreement, the film's portrait of Derry on the cusp of all that was to come afterwards is a fascinating moment in time.

It is personalised by Hannon's new work, in which he draws from other composers as widespread as Adams, Elgar, and Copland, with some light orchestral music of the 1950s.

Hannon added: "By interweaving the music and the speech, I hope that I have created something that is greater than the sum of its parts. What that something is, I am not all together sure. I hope to find out this Friday."

## Worship resources to mark centenary of the end of the civil war in Ireland

The Liturgical Advisory Committee (LAC) of the Church of Ireland has this week published a set of resources for use in parishes where the centenary of the end of the Civil War in Ireland will be marked.

The resources include a complete order for a Service of the Word, as well as additional material for use at Eucharistic Services. It is intended that the material may also be adapted for use in conjunction with other services provided in the Book of Common Prayer or at local commemorative events.

Speaking about the publication, the Very Revd Nigel Dunne (Dean of Cork and Honorary Secretary to the LAC), said: "The LAC is pleased to respond to the request by the Historic Centenaries Working Group for material to mark this last significant commemoration in the centenary series.

"Our thanks also to Professor Marie Coleman for writing a most informative Introduction to the material. As with previous material in this series, we hope that this liturgical resource will be of the same benefit to those involved in local, diocesan or national services or other commemorative events marking the end of the Civil War in Ireland."
