

PCI works with Access NI to develop new online system

The current application form for leaders (TCF2/14) will no longer be accepted after 24th April and there are now two new application forms for each applicant to complete – a PCI Application form for leaders which can be downloaded from www.presbyterianireland.org/takingcare and an online Access NI form which can be completed on the NI Direct website: www.nidirect.gov.uk

Deborah Webster, PCI's Taking Care Coordinator said, "We are delighted to have been able to collaborate with Access NI on developing and improving the system for Child Protection application.

"In order to explain how the new application process will work, Taking Care, the Presbyterian Church in Ireland's Child Protection Policy and Programme Service are hosting five Access NI Information Seminars that look at how the new system will work and answer any questions individuals may have. These seminars will take place this month in locations throughout Northern Ireland."

Deborah also explained that the Access NI form has to be completed online, while the PCI form needs to be downloaded and filled in, as the Designated Person needs to check I.D; approval from Kirk Session is also required.

Speaking about the new process, Tom Clarke, Manager of Access NI said, "Access NI is continually improving and modernising the service it provides. As part of this, from 1st April, applicants can make their application online, rather than having to complete a paper form. This will reduce the time taken to issue a certificate, improve the accuracy of applications, enable applicants and organisations to track the progress of applications and reduce costs.

"Access NI is grateful to the Presbyterian Church for the work they have undertaken alongside us to develop this system and for the enthusiastic way it has embraced and adopted the on-line service. We look forward to continue to work with the church to improve all aspects of our service in the future."

Mervyn Jamison retired from his full-time job at the end of January and is excited and looking forward to what God has ahead for Moneyreagh Community Church (MCC) which is a church plant supported by Down diocese of C of I.

"At time of writing, we in MCC are feeling really blessed. Sunday services have around 50 regular attenders of all ages, however for some reason on our Bacon Buttie Sundays this increases to nearly 70!

"But it's not all about numbers and I believe that God is at work transforming lives in our fledgling church. Recently a family joined us who I would describe as 'de-churched' and a number of our churchnewsireland@gmail.com
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worshippers fall into that category. One man who now comes with his wife and never misses a service hadn't been to church in over 30 years.

"Our Friday night youth club is thriving, but the children's club on a Sunday afternoon didn't really catch on. After more prayer and research we have decided to launch an exciting Kids Club on Wednesday evenings. There is a real hunger for more time to explore the scriptures and our mid—week Bible/prayer meeting is growing with around 25% of the congregation coming along regularly. I'm grateful to John Beattie for his significant input.

"Our Honesty Box Friday Cafe began on 27 March, which in turn will lead to a Rural Pharmacy program. The local councillor has also pledged to have a drop—in clinic for social needs at this time. So we are excited. This new community and fellowship of believers would really appreciate your continued prayers and support."

Cork Diocesan Secretary Retires After 42 Years Service

Wilfred Baker, Diocesan Secretary of the United Dioceses of Cork, Cloyne and Ross has retired

on 31st March, after 42 years service to the Diocese.

People from around the Diocese gathered at St Luke's Church, Douglas, Cork for Evensong during which Wilfred gave the address. The Service was conducted by the rector of the Parish, Archdeacon Adrian Wilkinson.

Afterwards the Bishop, the Rt Revd Dr Paul Colton, thanked Wilfred for his service to the Diocese, drawing on the Diocesan Reports, the Journals of the General Synod, and the Diocesan Magazine, to give some 'then and now' perspectives on Wilfred's time in office.

On behalf of the Diocese (clergy, parishes, people and former bishops and clergy who served in the Diocese in Wilfred's time in office) the Bishop presented Wilfred with an especially commissioned Cork solid silver Strawberry Dish from a typical 18th Century Cork design made by local silversmith, Sean Carroll. The dish, uniquely, has been emblazoned in gold leaf with the coat of arms of the Diocese, and engraved with a tribute to Wilfred as a mark of everyone's affection, gratitude and esteem. The Dean of Cork presented Wilfred with his second present: an aerial photograph of the Cathedral which, as the Bishop said 'is to be hung in your Waterford

house to remind you that your home is now in Cork!'

C of E Pastoral Letter for the General Election: study guide issued

A study guide designed to promote discussion about the House of Bishops' Pastoral Letter for the General Election has been issued by the Church of England.

The online document, aimed at individual and group study, includes a short summary of each section of the Pastoral Letter and offers questions for consideration and conversation.

The guide also suggest passages from the Bible for study included in the Letter and prayers for the General Election.

Who is My Neighbour? was issued at the start of Lent and is addressed to the People and Parishes of the Church of England.

New counselling service for clergy in Wales

Clergy are often turned to when people need help but now a new counselling service will support clergy when they face difficulties themselves.

From money worries to family crises or addictions – the new Cynnal Churches' Counselling Service was launched yesterdayday (April 1) to provide a free confidential counselling service available throughout Wales for all members of the Clergy and their families who might be facing challenging times in their personal lives.

Called Cynnal, the accredited service will be available to clergy of all church denominations and delivered by the charity CAIS (Cyngor Alcohol Information Service) through its subsidiary Living Room Cardiff. It will take over from the current Church Counselling Service which was set up 20 years ago.

Cynnal will be overseen by an advisory panel which will include representatives of church denominations and will meet twice a year. All the counsellors are qualified and trained and clergy will be able to refer themselves for help.

Clive Wolfendale, chief executive of CAIS, said the growth of the Living Room Cardiff as a centre for counselling made it a natural home for the new service for clergy.

He said, "Both CAIS and Living Room Cardiff have their roots in Welsh faith communities so it makes sense for us to assimilate the work of the Churches Counselling Service for Wales. Together we can ensure that ministers are supported across the country."

Wynford Ellis Owen, chief executive of Living Room Cardiff, said, "Clergy are perceived as people who don't have problems – they are the ones we go to when we have problems. But they are human like the rest of us and sometimes, under pressure, their problems – and those they are helping others with – can come to the fore. That can be particularly difficult for them because they work across the community.

"We can provide them and their families with a safe environment where they can seek help and support in confidence."

The Archbishop of Wales, Dr Barry Morgan, said, "The Church in Wales welcomes this new service for the care and welfare of our clergy and is keen to support it. We wish CAIS and Living Room Cardiff every success with the launch of Cynnal and we look forward to working together in the future."

US Southern Baptists confront the past, look to the future

The Southern Baptist Convention (SBC) discussed its racist past during the Ethics & Religious Liberty Commission's Gospel and Racial Reconciliation summit last week.

The two-day summit was held in Nashville, and included frank admissions of wrongdoing.

"Our heritage comes to us through a trail of blood, but not all of it is Christ's blood, and some of it cries out from the ground right now," the Commission's president, Russell Moore said.

"Racial reconciliation is going to take the courage of knowing who you are in Christ," he

continued. "We are not the state church of the Confederate States of America."

The denomination was formed in 1845 in support of slave owners, and during the Civil Rights Movement, Southern Baptist leaders were largely silent, or supported segregation. In recent years, the church repented for condoning racism, apologised to African-Americans, and announced efforts to attract minorities to their flock.

Although the denomination elected their first black president in 2012, SBC pastor Rev. Dwight McKissic pointed out that all other top executives and seminary presidents are white. In 2012, 20 per cent of the church's 51,000 congregations were nonwhite, but less than one per cent were multi-ethnic

At last week's summit, less than 30 of the nearly 550 attendees were black, according to the Religion News Service. Still, many felt the summit was a step in the right direction.

"I am thrilled to hear a white man, Russell Moore, stand up and preach the message he just preached," Missouri youth pastor Carlos Smith exclaimed.

"We need some of our white brothers and sisters saying that it isn't just race-baiters and people with a victimised mentality who believe these things. (Racism) is a real problem."

Missouri Presbyterian churches receive threats over acceptance of same sex marriage and ministers

At least four Presbyterian churches in the state of Missouri have received threats in response to the Presbyterian Church (USA)'s decision to embrace same-sex marriages.

Over 170 churches affiliated with the Presbyterian Church (USA), voted last month to change the wording of the denomination's constitution to allow same-sex marriages.

The new constitution now defines marriages as a commitment "between two people, traditionally a man and a woman."

The amendment will take effect this summer. According to the St. Louis Post-Dispatch, the First Presbyterian Church and the Westminster Presbyterian Church in Cape Girardeau, First Presbyterian Church in Jackson and First Presbyterian Church in Perryville

received anonymous letters that threatened their congregations in response to the Presbyterian Church (USA)'s decision.

The Dispatch said that the anonymous letters cite Scripture, prophesised that the churches would burn, and that pastors would be fired because of the change.

One Presbyterian leader expressed concern for the four churches, and condemned the threats as inconsistent with the teachings of Christianity.

"I was grieved and fearful for our pastors and churches," Anita Hendrix, leader of the Giddings-Lovejoy Presbytery told the Dispatch.

"I think this is not the way to deal with disagreement ... It's obviously someone who is not acting in a way that is consistent with what I would see as Christian values."

Hendrix asked for prayers for the safety of the four churces, as well as prayers for the anonymous author of the threatening letters.

"I just ask for people to pray for our churches and pray for the person who sent these letters that God might work in his or her life," Hendrix said.

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Media digest

Mail - Report that the Church of England yesterday published a prayer for the General Election that called on its congregations to vote for 'policies' that sustain the poor'. It was published in a 'study guide' to the 'pastoral letter' on the election produced by bishops in February. It also says the new study guide from the Church's Mission and Public Affairs Division underlined the call for consideration of 'relationships among the nations of Europe who share a long history moulded by the Christian faith'. It says the guide was likely to plunge its relations with Tory leaders to a new low.
