Leading figures and two former C of I Archbishops in favour of Yes

Rugby legend Brian O'Driscoll and one of the country's most high-profile nuns, Sr Stanislaus Kennedy, and two former Archbishops of Dublin, John Neill and Walton Empey, have 'teamed up'

to encourage a 'Yes' vote in the marriage referendum.

O'Driscoll, a father-of-two, took to Twitter over the weekend to encourage his followers to support the move for change, saying: "I'm supporting the Yes Equality campaign for a 'Yes' vote on May 22nd".

'Sr Stan' is well known for her charity work on behalf of the homeless and immigrants over many years.

A member of the Sisters of Charity, Sr Stan said: "I have thought a lot about this. I am going to vote 'Yes' in recognition of the gay community as full members of society.

"They should have an entitlement to marry. It is a civil right and a human right."

In separate letters to this week's Church of Ireland Gazette, both former Archbishops state they will be voting Yes. Archbishop Neill challenges the group of clergy who quoted Canon law. He states that viewpoint is not applicable. Archbishop Empey pays tribute to the integrity and stance taken by the Bishops of Cashel and Cork.

Knocknamuckley's answer to Father Trendy is quite dishy in the flesh. Quietly spoken and selfcontained, he looks like a fresher-faced version of The Strangler's front man Hugh Cornwell - studded ears and all.

Una Brankin in Belfast Telegraph - ...I stood with the well-travelled, close-shaven minister at the top of the aisle at St Matthias, as he watched the faithful gather for his evening service, a pleasant affair, with just a little bit of hands-aloft worship, but lots of loud American folksy singing. Dressed casually in a tweed jacket and dark blue jeans, Rev Kilpatrick was joined in the service by one of his two daughters - he also has two sons - who led the singing.

The contemporary style is not to the liking of one long-serving choir member I met in the vestibule, who claimed Rev Kilpatrick has curtailed the choir's role in services and wants to do away with it altogether.

"It's all about that modern type of singing now - it's like a rock concert in there most of the time," she said. "The problem is that he's been away in Africa and America and he doesn't know the Church of Ireland, nor is he interested."

The churchgoer claimed the rector told him one day, "this is not a Church of Ireland any more". She said: "I can't understand why Rev Kilpatrick wasn't brought in as a curate, so he could learn

about the church, instead of being made rector," added the choir member, who, like everyone else, didn't wish to be named.

"We haven't had an traditional evening communion service here for 18 months," she claimed. "And he never wears a collar. I think the jeans and the earrings show a lack of respect, and it's a bad example for the young ones."

Young Methodist Wins Mission to Mars

Amy Anderson, a member of Blackwatertown Methodist Church was announced as the winner of the United Space School Competition by Employment and Learning Minister Dr Stephen Farry at an event at the Armagh Planetarium.

Amy, who attends the Southern Regional College's Armagh campus was selected for an intensive two week placement to the United Space School in Houston.

Congratulating the winner of the United Space School competition, Employment and Learning Minister, Dr Stephen Farry said: "This programme underlines the importance of delivering the Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM) agenda and the value of



international partnerships between educational establishments, government and industry."

The placement which commences in July will see 40 students from 25 countries participate. The programme will include a variety of space and engineering projects including one entitled a "Mission to Mars" design. Students will also meet with astronauts, space doctors, spacesuit designers and geologists.

The objectives of the initiative are to establish links between Northern Ireland and the United Space School, part of the Foundation for International Space Education (FISE) to create a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for students and

to promote the space industry within Northern Ireland.

Sponsor organisations included the Department of Engineering at Queen's University Belfast and Northern Ireland based company European Space Propulsion, which is a wholly-owned subsidiary of Aerojet Rocketdyne (AR), a US based leader in space propulsion.

Archbishop of Canterbury becomes patron of Christians Against Poverty

The Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, has become the first patron of debt charity Christians Against Poverty.

The charity runs debt services through local churches with the aim of releasing people from the prison of debt. Around 60 of its 280 debt centres are based in Church of England churches.

In a video message the Archbishop said: "Most of us know people who've been in debt. Many of



us, probably most of us, have had moments when either we've been in debt or we've begun to wonder how on earth we're ever going to make ends meet.

"CAP deals in helping people to get free of the prison of debt and it's something I feel passionately about. And having seen them at work and having seen how effective they are, I wanted to be a patron and to support them in any way I could.

Speaking about the CAP approach, the Archbishop said: "First of all they tackle the issues where they really exist, they go to people's homes, they treat people as human beings, they keep them with their dignity, they're not trying to make money out of them, they're there to love them and to enable them to find their own way forward. It's not just about telling them what to do, it's about a sense of ownership and liberation for them.

"Secondly, they are linked to local churches. Over 20 per cent of CAP branches link in in some way to a Church of England church but all of them link in to Christian churches. That's really exciting because it means there's a community for those who want it. CAP don't force them into the church or anything like that but they offer them scope to find the support and love of a Christian community. That's wonderful."

Kirk says 'Tomorrow's Calling' in recruitment drive for new ministers

The Church of Scotland is launching a recruitment campaign for new ministers with a video championing their work in communities across the country. The Kirk's 'Tomorrow's Calling' campaign is reaching out to people capable of replacing the large number of parish ministers due to retire over the next 10 years. The specially commissioned video will be shared on social media from Sunday 17th May where it is intended to inspire a new generation of leaders in the church.

The 'Tomorrow's Calling' video captures the extraordinary commitment of parish ministers serving their communities in Scotland and beyond. The video challenges outdated stereotypes by featuring a selection of the Kirk's 800 ministers, like 26 year old Rev Michael Mair, who serves at St David's Broomhouse in Edinburgh.

He says: "Being a minister is a phenomenal role to play in the community. You get to journey with people through the highs and lows of life. There's nothing else like it."

Rev Tommy MacNeil has pioneered community outreach at Martins Memorial in Stornoway. "I would have done anything to be honest, other than be a minister, but over the course of a couple of years God made it very clear that's what he wanted from me. I knew it would be demanding. You're on call 24/7. Although it's challenging, the more you give to people the more you see the beauty and diversity of life. You never lose from that."

Rev Stella Campbell at Skene Church in Aberdeenshire is seen displaying her gift for connecting with people at a local care home. She says: "If you feel a sense of calling in your heart you can't run away from it. Every day there are moments you can look back and smile on, and see something happening that's a sign of God at work."

Their job has been described as one of the best in the world, but it's rarely been publicised at career fairs or on the recruitment pages. The 'Tomorrow's Calling' campaign will let women and men who feel called to serve the church know the many life and professional skills they bring with them are valued, whatever age they are. It will guide them through the process of becoming the next generation of parish ministers in the Kirk's 1400 congregations.

'Tomorrow's Calling' is being launched in front of 3000 Church members at the Heart and Soul festival in Princes St Gardens this Sunday May 17th. Ministers featured in the film will be joined on stage by the incoming Moderator, Rev Dr Angus Morrison.

"I'm very excited about 'Tomorrow's Calling,'" he says. "It's a bold step which is vital for the future of our national Church. We need leaders who will champion our work. Our 400,000 members are the backbone of their communities, providing millionsof hours of voluntary service in social clubs for young and old, helping runfoodbanks and innovative projects such as supporting those sufferingdementia. Our parish ministers bringimagination, creativity and the love of Christ to those who need it."

For the first time, the Church is using a social media campaign to promote parish ministry. The launch video will soon be accompanied with first-hand accounts from ministers, as well as trainees in the Church of Scotland's comprehensive ordained ministry programme. The intention is to engage and energise the many audiences the Church, it's congregations and its partners reach via the internet and to encourage them to share the 'Tomorrow's Calling' message far and wide.

Cuban bishops reveal dates for papal visit

The Cuban bishops' conference has announced that Pope Francis will visit the country from September 19 to 22

An advisory message posted on the bishops' conference Facebook page on Monday said the visit will begin in Havana. Other events under consideration include a visit to the city of Holguin, in eastern Cuba, as well as a visit to the Shrine of Our Lady of Charity of El Cobre, the patroness of Cuba, and the nearby city of Santiago de Cuba, the second-largest city on the island.

From Santiago, the Pope is expected to take off for his September 22 to 27 visit to the United States.

The Pope's trip to Cuba will mark the third time a Pope has visited the island. St John Paul II visited Cuba in 1998 and Benedict XVI visited in 2012.

On May 10, the Pope met Cuban President Raul Castro at the Vatican, where Castro thanked him for the "active role he played in improving relations between Cuba and the United States of America," said Jesuit Father Federico Lombardi, Vatican spokesman.

President Raúl Castro this week thanked Pope Francis for the Vatican's role in the secret negotiations between Cuba and the US last year, quipping he might be moved to return to the bosom of the Church himself - despite being a communist. See -

Christian Aid effort to get relief supplies through to Nepal area hit by second major quake

Christian Aid emergency workers in Nepal are trying with partner organisations to get relief through yesterday morning to the area worst hit by the second major earthquake.

The earthquake struck at about 13:00 local time. The US Geological Survey said it measured 7.4 on the Richter scale, compared to the April 26 earthquake, which had a magnitude of 7.8.

The epicentre of today's earthquake was the town of Namche Bazaar in eastern Nepal, the last major settlement before Everest basecamp.

Christian Aid emergency programme officer Yeeshu Shukla, already in Nepal to help coordinate relief efforts after the first earthquake, was in the Sindhupalchowk region some 40 miles away when the building he was in began shaking.

"For a moment, I felt that the building I was in would come down. We rushed out. Everyone was out on the street, some of them panicking, with mothers screaming, looking for their children. There were four or five severe aftershocks and some buildings collapsed.

"Travelling later towards Kathmandu the roads were lined with people too scared to re-enter buildings, with heaps of rubble where some had structures had collapsed.

"Now the race is to get relief through to the worst hit areas – clothing and other essentials. There is a shortage of drivers, however, many of whom have returned to their homes to be with their families."

Nick Guttmann, Christian Aid's Head of Humanitarian had just arrived in the country to monitor the progress of Christian Aid's initial relief efforts. He was visiting a partner agency in Kathmandu before visiting a distribution point when a slight tremor ran through the building. Everyone stood up, and then everything began moving. "Outside, the ground looked like it was rippling," he said. "We didn't know where to go and stayed under some corrugated iron."

An hour after the earthquake, he said, "people were walking round the streets, not knowing what to do, I heard one woman ask 'What is happening to Nepal'."

Since the first earthquake struck, Christian Aid has worked through partner organisations in Nepal distributing blankets, tarpaulins, food, water purification equipment and water purification tablets to communities struggling to rebuild their lives.

The Disasters Emergency Committee, of which Christian Aid is a member, yesterday announced its appeal for Nepal earthquake victims had raised more than £50m. At the same time, Christian Aid's own appeal for Nepal has raised more than £1.2million.

Scottish threshers for Malawi

A chance meeting at St John's Church Dumfries between a Malawi rice farmer and a member of the congregation has led to the development of a project which could make significant change for the better for farmers in that part of Africa. The Balmore Trust, which has close associations with a number of Episcopal congregations, has just been awarded a £60,000 grant by the Scottish Government to introduce pedal-driven threshing machines into Malawi.

The project is the brain-child of Paul Tofield from Dumfries. Two years ago he met Howard Msukwa, one the farmers whose rice is sold by Just Trading Scotland (JTS), the Balmore Trust's fair trade arm. Paul was deeply impressed by Howard's determination and the sheer amount of work which his rice farming involved. When Howard told him that farmers thresh their rice by beating it against a log, Paul told him about the pedal-driven threshing machines they used to have in Orkney. That summer Paul went to Orkney and found an old machine. That was the basis for the three machines which have just reached Malawi.

The grant will help to get the machines manufactured in-country, providing jobs for Malawians. It will make low-cost machines available to farmers' clubs, freeing them from the

huge burden of threshing, and allowing them more time to develop their farms.

Humza Yousaf, Minster for Europe and International Development said: "These threshing machines will make a huge difference to farmers and communities in Malawi by improving crop production. It's exciting to think that machinery built in Scotland is being used thousands of miles away to help farmers in other nations".
