and it runs until Trinity Sunday (May 22). The theme this year looks at the Christian attitude to the environmental crisis and global warming: "In the beginning God created.. Gen 1:1 The Gospel and Care of our Common Home". Ecumenical Bible Week (EBW) is now in its third year. It includes parish based events in Dublin and surrounding areas. There are 45 events, across 13 locations in Dublin, Kildare and Wicklow, with over 40 presenters. There are debate, talks, music and lots of participation.

Thinking Allowed – with Church Leaders in St. Paul's Church, Arran Quay, Dublin, on Thursday May 19 from 7.30 pm to 9.00 pm. The discussion topic will be: What Bible passages inform and challenge my response to climate change? Speakers will be: Rachel Bewley–Bateman (Society of Friends), Archbishop Michael Jackson (Church of Ireland), Gillian Kingston (Methodist Church), Archbishop Diarmuid Martin (Roman Catholic Church), Rev Katherine Meyer (Presbyterian Church) and Pastor Nick Park (Evangelical Alliance). The forum will be chaired by Philip McKinley.

Theological Symposium 2016 takes place on Thursday May 19 from 2.00 pm to 5.30 pm in St Paul's Church, Arran Quay. It will be on the subject of *Climate change: what can we as Christians do?* The Symposium will consist of a series of simultaneous directed workshops covering the following topics: Science, Biblical Resources, Orthodox Teaching and Theology. Open-air Psalms Service marks 350 years of Presbyterian worship in Garvagh

To mark 375 years since its foundation, First Garvagh Presbyterian congregation held a weekend of special events with the theme of 'Lord for the Years'. The Moderator, Rt Rev Dr. Ian McNie was welcomed to Garvagh on the Sunday morning to join the congregation for an open-air Psalms Service at the site of the old Session House, before leading the Sunday morning service in the current church. In the evening, a thanksgiving praise service, with The Route Singers and Rt. Rev. Dr. Godfrey Brown was held, in which Dr. Brown reflected on church life over the 375 years.

Commenting on First Garvagh having reached 375 years since its foundation, Dr. McNie said, "It was a privilege and an honour to join with the congregation and participate as they celebrated this considerable milestone in their history."

"Over the special open-air Psalms service, traditional morning service and then the fellowship lunch, I wanted to take the opportunity to encourage the congregation as they continue to worship God, grow His church and share and spread His love. 'Lord for the Years' has been the theme for the weekend, and

it is clear that serving our Lord Jesus Christ down through the years has been at the heart and purpose of all that they do – and will continue to be."

Rev. Mark Donald, minister of First Garvagh, highlighted the importance of remembering the humble beginnings of the congregation.

"The congregation's forefathers had assembled for worship in the open-air for many decades before they had a meeting house and we wanted to reflect this in our church anniversary celebrations and for many people this was very poignant with some suggesting that the service should be a yearly feature," he said. "We also wanted to mark the significance of the occasion with a more permanent reminder, so during the morning service everyone in the congregation received a commemorative Communion token specially made with the date 1641, marking the founding of the congregation," Rev. Donald continued.

Besides the special Sunday services, also taking place over the weekend was a concert on the Saturday evening with the Band, Pipes and Drums of the Royal Irish Regiment, where a 'Roll of Honour' plaque to those who served from the congregation during the First World War was

unveiled. Then from the Friday through to the Sunday, a Historical Exhibition, illustrated with flowers and a classic vehicle display, was viewed by the many who visited. Alongside this, a booklet on the history of the congregation has been produced and is available from the church website.
