# Developments in Presbyterian residential care homes in North West

The Presbyterian Church in Ireland is to purchase the former Four Seasons care home in Garvagh, County Londonderry, creating a new

residential care home for older people, including those with dementia.

The £1.5 million redevelopment and refurbishment of the home will increase overall residential care for older people, with the creation of 50 en suite rooms. It will also involve the relocation of services from its Londonderry and Portrush residential care homes, Ard Cluan House and York House, which will be sold.

The Presbyterian Church in Ireland's (PCI) Council for Social Witness has overall management responsibility for the Church's six residential care homes for older people and its other services. Making the announcement, Council Secretary Lindsay Conway, said, "As the continued wellbeing of our residents is our priority, this development is an exciting opportunity for the future as we are committed to improving the standard of our residential care.

"Due to changing legislation, increasing standards and rising expectations of residents and their families, we review aspects of our service provision regularly. This ensures that our residents across all of our homes are provided with the best care. Unfortunately, Ard Cluan and York House, which were both built in 19th

Century, no longer provide the opportunities for improvement."

He explained that the envisaged relocation to the new site, which is only 20-years-old, would increase PCI's ability to provide much needed residential care for older people in the north west region, including services for those with dementia.

"There is huge potential in Garvagh to create a wonderful, modern and welcoming home with a Christian ethos that will be fit for purpose for many years to come. We do however, understand the complexities and issues associated with the move, which is why throughout the process we will keep our residents, their relatives and our staff informed of developments," Mr. Conway said.

As part of the relocation and refurbishment process, which should take between six and nine months to complete, staff and relatives will also be involved in the selection of furnishings for the new home and choosing its decoration.

"The whole process will be carefully managed and undertaken with minimal disruption. It will also take place in consultation with our colleagues in the Health and Social Care Trusts. While we give thanks for Ard Cluan and York House, which the Church has managed for nearly 50 years, we ask for your prayers at this time as we begin a fresh in the north west," Mr. Conway said.

In making the announcement he said that residents, their families, staff and the Trusts had been told of the plans. He also thanked the volunteers and local support committees, as they had made an important difference in the lives of many older people through their hard work over many years.

It is hoped that the new residential home in Garvagh will open in the spring of 2017.

# New Zealand synod debates Irish model of Anglican and Methodist unity

Moves towards the mutual recognition and acceptance of Anglican and Methodist ministers in New Zealand have been delayed by at least two years after the General Synod of the Anglican Church in Aotearoa, New Zealand and Polynesia heard that the Province's Council for Ecumenism had not considered a report from the Anglican-Methodist Dialogue Group.

The General Synod last considered the report in 2014, when it asked the Council to report back to this year's General Synod on the dialogue group's recommendations. The synod, when it met last week, had been asked to approve a motion confirming that it "formally affirms, accepts, and recognizes the validity of Methodist presidency and presbyteral ministries as effectively equivalent to Anglican episcopal and priestly ministries, such that interchange is possible without the requirement of reordination"

The motion would have authorised "the necessary enabling legislation" to permit "an act of reconciliation of episcopal ministries so enabling a full interchangeability of ordained ministries, in accord with the Irish Model."

But the motion was withdrawn when it emerged that the Council for Ecumenism had not considered the dialogue group's report.

The three primates of the Province, Archbishops Brown Turei, Winston Halapua and Philip Richardson have apologised to the Methodist Church of New Zealand and stressed that the withdrawal of the motion "did not reflect a change in Anglican commitment to dialogue or close and positive relations between the two churches."

Under the "Irish Model", the President and other senior clergy from the Methodist Church of Ireland take part in the consecration of Anglican bishops; and the two Anglican Archbishops of the Church of Ireland participate in the installation of the President of the Methodist Church.

In the case of the Methodist President, this first happened on 12 June 2014 when the Revd Peter Murray was elelcted and installed as President of the Methodist Church in Ireland at Christ Church Leeson Park, Dublin. The first consecration of an Anglican bishop under the new ecumenical agreement took place on 24 January 2015 when the Methodist President Peter Murray; and former Presidents the Revd Donald Ker and the Revd Winston Graham joined Church of Ireland bishops in the laying on of hands on the former secretary general of the Anglican Communion, the Rt Revd Kenneth Kearon, when he was consecrated as the Bishop of Limerick and Killaloe.

The proposals for the interchangeability of Methodist and Anglican ministers New Zealand will return to the General Synod of the Anglican Church in Aotearoa, New Zealand and Polynesia when it next meets in 2018.

## Anglican and Roman Catholic Canon Lawyers met in Dublin

and church membership, the constitutional organisation of parishes, parish officers, parish property, finance and trusts, and also the legal relationship of the parish with the wider church. The meetings took place at the Pro-Cathedral in Dublin.

Anglican participants were: Professor Norman Doe, Professor Mark Hill, QC, and Dr Paul

Colton, Bishop of Cork, all of the Centre for Law and Religion at the School of Law and Politics at Cardiff University. Roman Catholic participants were: Professor James J. Conn, S.J. (School of Theology and Ministry, Boston College), the Reverend Fintan Gavin (Archdiocese of Dublin) and the Reverend Andrew Cole (University of Nottingham).

### **Handling the Word**

Handling the Word is a two day course organised by Down Presbytery of the PCI, for church members who wish to learn how to prepare and deliver a talk from the Bible.

The organisers state - Handling the Word is a course for those who wish to learn how to deliver a biblical talk. It would be useful for anyone who gives talks to a youth fellowship, a Presbyterian Women meeting, a Men's Breakfast as well as those who have the opportunity to preach a Sunday sermon. The course is normally a pre-requisite for the Accredited Preacher course but there is no obligation to progress to that scheme. The only entry requirement is to be a communicant member of a Presbyterian Church in Ireland congregation.

Each day will include teaching sessions and practical workshops.

Topics covered: the Bible as the foundation, understanding and applying the Bible passage and considering your hearers.

This course is organised by Down Presbytery but is open to people from other Presbyteries. A charge of £25 will be made to cover the expenses involved in running the course. Lunch and tea/coffee at breaks will be supplied. Preregistration is required.

Note: Day one, Saturday, 18th June will be held at Killinchy Presbyterian Church. Day two, Saturday, 25th June will be held at Second Saintfield Presbyterian Church – both days run from 9am to 4pm.

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**Sky diving Limerick priest** - A Catholic priest based in the Diocese of Limerick will take a leap of faith this weekend when he jumps from the sky to raise funds for his local parochial house. Fr Tom Mangan, who is Parish Priest of Donaghmore, which is about 15 miles from Limerick City, will take part in a sky dive with 12 others this week at Abbeyshrule airfield in Co Longford. Fr Mangan said that he is "currently unable to live in the parochial house in Donaghmore due to its poor conditions – so I live in rented accommodation some miles away." The skydive on Sunday which is entitled 'Flying High for Fr Tom' will see Fr Mangan accelerate from 0 to 100 miles per hour in five seconds after jumping out of the plane. After free falling for 25 seconds the parachute will open at 5,000 feet and he will glide safely to the ground. Asked if he is bothered by the dive he jokingly, he responded "No, it will be grand." The skydive takes place in Abbeyshrule Co Longford on 22 May.

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
