

Archbishop of Dublin attends 1916 Commemoration

Archbishop Michael Jackson took part in the annual 1916 Commemoration Ceremony at Arbour Hill on Wednesday May 7.

This is the longest–running State ceremony to commemorate the 1916 Rising and 2025 marked the 101st State Commemoration at Arbour Hill.

The commemoration at Arbour Hill began in 1923, shortly after the end of the Civil War, and the first State commemoration event took place in 1924. It takes place at the Church of the Sacred Heart, the church for the Defence Forces, at the site of burial of the executed leaders of 1916 on the first Wednesday on or after May 3 each year.

The commemoration was hosted by the Tánaiste and Minister for Defence, and consisted of a Requiem Mass and a ceremony at the Grave for the 1916 Leaders. The President laid a wreath to commemorate those who died in 1916.

In addition to the President, the Taoiseach and the Tánaiste, attendance at the ceremony included members of the government; members of the Oireachtas; the Council of State; the Judiciary; relatives of the leaders and relatives of others who fought in 1916 as well as interfaith leaders.

Speaking after the event, Archbishop Jackson said it was always a pleasure to be invited to attend.

"It is an occasion to which I look forward because it draws together descendants of those most intimately associated with Independence and those who today carry responsibility for government and security," he commented. "The provision of music by a school annually and the inclusion of representatives of a wide range of Faiths together with a representative of The Humanist Association of Ireland is a delightful aspect of the inclusivity of this event."



Once an Augustinian...

On May 13, the feast of the Blessed Virgin Mary of Fatima, Pope Leo XIV made a private visit to the General Curia of the Order of Saint Augustine, where he lived for twelve years as Prior General.

In the chapel of the Curia, the Pontiff celebrated Mass with his Augustinian brothers and then shared lunch with them, as he did almost daily when he was a cardinal.

A familiar and simple gesture, a sign of the spirit of communion desired by Saint Augustine: "Have one soul and one heart stretched out toward God."

Hundreds of people awaited the Pope in the rain along Via Paolo VI, crowding the area next to Bernini's colonnade.

The Pope's greeting came around 3 p.m., at the end of his visit to the Augustinians.

New choristers in Derry

Huge Congratulations to Tom, Eoghan and Pascal All three boys were admitted as full Choristers to the St Columb's Cathedral Boys' Choir by the Reverend Canon John Merrick at morning service, after serving a period of six months as Probationers.

5 million stitches tell Bible stories at Ely Cathedral

A stunning exhibition ten years in the making is now captivating visitors at Ely Cathedral.

Threads through the Bible, a towering textile installation by artist Jacqui Parkinson, weaves together 44 large panels telling stories from Scripture using more than 25 million stitches.

At three metres high and stretching over 100 metres if laid out, the display is believed to be the largest of its kind made by a single artist, as reported by the Ely Standard.

Parkinson, who once taught drama and ran an arts centre, has spent the last decade sewing in her Devon studio using antique bedsheets, silk, gold leaf and hand-dyed fabrics.

She explained: "I start simply with antique bedsheets, which hold their own tales of life and death.

"Then I gradually build up my stories by quilting the sheets and painting them."

Parkinson added: "I hope the panels will add a sparkle to everyone's visit here."

A cathedral spokesperson praised the work as 'breath-taking, uplifting and absorbing... definitely not to be missed".

The exhibition runs until 29th June.

The death has taken place in Alberta, Canada, of Mrs Hazel Beacom whose late husband Canon Tom Beacom was a long-serving rector of St Katharine's Parish in Belfast, and an Hon Secretary of Connor Synod.

Born in Belfast on 28th February 1923, Hazel Beacom passed away peacefully at the age of 102 on 7th May 2025, at the Drayton Valley Hospital in Alberta. She had lived in Drayton Valley with her daughter Ros and son in law Mike and family for 32 years.

At the age of 22, Hazel served in the Auxiliary Territorial Service and was in London for the VE Day celebrations in May 1945—80 years to the day before her passing. She was a proud and resilient member of the generation that endured and achieved so much through times of great hardship and change.

Hazel was predeceased by her beloved husband, Canon Thomas Beacom. She was a shining light in the life of the parish, remembered for her dedication and service. From running the Mothers' Union, Ladies' Guild, and pram

services, to organizing flower shows and fashion parades, Mrs. Beacom was a tireless supporter of her husband's ministry and a beloved presence in the church community.



In Retrospect by

The world asks a great deal of the poppies, insists they carry the wounds of war and shoulder the weight of remembrance.

Such flimsy, wavering plants;

we painted their flowers the colour of blood and punched dark holes in their heads as if bullets had passed through, then trimmed them with green sprigs of hope.

And from deep in the seeds we concocted the essence of sleep and dreams and resting-in-peace.

Almost weightless even in full bloom we made them souls, the poppies, souls of those who we lost, and - let it be said -those who we killed.

Poppies - nursed in darkness, nourished by dirt.

But for all their spindly roots, frail stalks and papery petals - as easily smudged as a butterfly wing - they joggle into existence again and again, unearthing themselves in fallow fields and railway sidings, on roundabouts, verges and no man's land, from the brickwork of old chimneys and bridges and cracks in the pavement.

They nod and they nag, reminding us not to forget, flagging a red alert as their crumpled petals unfold.
So, rightly, the poppies ask a great deal of the world.
