Archbishop McDowell in group of five Anglican Primates to attend audience with Pope Leo XIV

The Most Revd John McDowell, Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of All Ireland, attended the inauguration of Pope Leo XIV. Archbishop McDowell was one of the five Anglican Primates of the Anglican Communion to have attended a later audience with Pope Leo XIV and heard his deep commitment to Church unity.

On the morning of the service, Archbishop McDowell said: "I'm delighted to be here. I think [it's](#) probably the first time the Church of Ireland primate has been at this sort of thing. And the relationship between Catholics and Anglicans in Ireland is very strong... And these occasions, in a way,

almost do more than the theological dialogues to cement the partnership and the gospel between the churches."

Making the point that theological dialogues involve relatively few people, he remarked that the attendance of groups at the inauguration is "... quite visible..." a "symbolic attendance at the inauguration mass... is of tremendous significance for Anglicans and for Catholics."

The meeting with the Five Anglican Primates was held at the Vatican in the Apostolic Palace, where Pope Leo XIV received in audience the representatives of other Churches and ecclesial communities, and of other religions, present in Rome for the Eucharistic Celebration for the beginning of his Petrine Ministry.

The five Anglican Primates were the Most Revd Leonard Dawea, Archbishop of the Anglican Church of Melanesia and a participant on IARCCUM (The International Anglican Roman Catholic Commission for Unity and Mission); the Most Revd and Rt Hon Stephen Cottrell, the Archbishop of York and Primate of England; the Most Revd John McDowell, the Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of All Ireland, the Most Revd Sean Rowe, the Presiding Bishop and Primate of The Episcopal Church and the Most Revd Dr Thabo Makgoba, Archbishop of Cape Town and Metropolitan of the Anglican Church of Southern Africa. They were accompanied by the Rt Revd Anthony Ball, Director for the Anglican Centre in Rome.

In an address given during the meeting, Pope Leo expressed a deep commitment to church unity and his intention to continue the emphasis of Pope Francis' on Church News Ireland

universal fraternity. His address stated: "My election has taken place during the year of the 1700th anniversary of the First Ecumenical Council of Nicaea. That Council represents a milestone in the formulation of the Creed shared by all Churches and Ecclesial Communities. While we are on the journey to re-establishing full communion among all Christians, we recognise that this unity can only be unity in faith. As Bishop of Rome, I consider one of my priorities to be that of seeking the re-establishment of full and visible communion among all those who profess the same faith in God the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit." Pope Leo's address also appealed for peace and justice, saying: "In a world wounded by violence and conflict, each of the communities represented here brings its own contribution of wisdom, compassion and commitment to the good of humanity and the preservation of our common home. I am convinced that if we are in agreement, and free from ideological and political conditioning, we can be effective in saying 'no' to war and 'yes' to peace, 'no' to the arms race and 'yes' to disarmament, 'no' to an economy that impoverishes peoples and the Earth and 'yes' to integral development."

Speaking about their meeting with Pope Leo, the Archbishop of York said:

"It is clear to me, that he longs for the unity of God's Church and sees working for that unity as one of his priorities, so that the world may believe. I look forward to continuing the work we have been doing to increase the co-operation and understanding between the Anglican and Roman Catholic Churches."

Archbishop McDowell meets President Higgins at Rome reception



Archbishop John McDowell, the Church of Ireland's Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of All Ireland, met with President Michael D Higgins on Sunday (18th May) at a reception hosted by the President to mark the 400th anniversary of St Isidore's, the Franciscan Church in Rome.

Archbishop McDowell was visiting Rome as part of a delegation from the Anglican Communion which attended the inauguration of Pope Leo XIV on Sunday morning.

Church of England sees worship numbers rise for fourth consecutive year

The Church of England has recorded its fourth consecutive year of growth in attendance, according to early figures from its latest Statistics for Mission report.

The number of regular worshippers rose to 1.02 million in 2024 – a 1.2 per cent increase from the previous year. Sunday attendance also climbed by 1.5 per cent to 582,000, continuing a steady post-pandemic recovery. Weekly in-person attendance across the week reached just over 701,000.

"The Church of England exists to share the good news of Jesus Christ and to love and serve our neighbours in every community in England," the Archbishop of York, Most Rev Stephen Cottrell said. "So it is encouraging to see further signs that more people are coming to faith in Jesus Christ and having their lives changed."

The rise was led by a return of adult worshippers, with Sunday attendance for over-16s up by 1.8 per cent. Although figures have not yet returned to pre-Covid levels, the church said trends are moving in a positive direction.

AChurchNearYou.com, the Church's online tool for finding local congregations, also saw a sharp rise in use, with page visits up 55 per cent to nearly 200 million.

Debbie Clinton, Director for Vision and Strategy, said the growth reflects "exciting stories" across diverse parishes, from coastal towns to city estates. "Each represents an individual who is part of a local church, serving their community across the country," she added.

At St John's Upper Norwood in south London, church attendance has surged through outreach to families. Events like 'Messy Church' and a Friday toddler group now attract hundreds, with over 2,000 people attending an Easter barbecue.

"We were a church in decline but we are not in decline any more," Fr John Pritchard said. "People are looking for a community and to feel valued, and the Gospel gives them this."

Further investment through national grants has supported staffing and youth initiatives at St John's, with plans to grow the music ministry among children and families.

The full Statistics for Mission report is expected later this year.
