Church of Ireland archbishops call for decisive action on Gaza

The following statement on the current situation in Gaza has been issued by Archbishop John McDowell and Archbishop Michael Jackson:

It is with outrage that we watch the desperation, dislocation, and defenceless resident population of Gaza who feel they have been abandoned by the world.

The international community must grasp reality and respond as never before. They can no longer stand by and watch the cruel starvation of innocent people, particularly the most vulnerable – children, older people and the ill – as well as the ongoing physical destruction of their lives and surroundings.

Amid the daily horror, the beacons of hope are the hospitals and the continuation of medical care, however rudimentary. This continues to point to the spirit of service at the heart of humanity.

In recent days we have seen another glimmer of hope from the resilient staff of Al Ahli Arab Hospital in Gaza City which is owned and run by the Anglican Diocese of Jerusalem. The hospital was bombed on Palm Sunday and has reopened, as its courageous staff pledged in the days after the attack. They are operating in a tent which was erected in place of their destroyed building and are treating the injured and sick as best they can, in what is by anyone's reckoning a living wasteland, with whatever resources they have.

We pledge our continuing support for the work of Al Ahli and support the Diocese of Jerusalem as it seeks to find a way forward for the hospital.

We repeat our call for an immediate ceasefire, the release of all hostages, and the influx of every kind of appropriate aid to alleviate starvation, injury and lack of shelter.

We acknowledge that many feel hopeless and powerless to change what is happening in Gaza. We pray that all those in positions of power globally will stand up and demand an end to this cruelty and seek the reinstitution of international law.

When Jesus speaks of parents offering their children bread and fish, he concludes as follows: "Always treat others as you would like them to treat you ..." (St Matthew 7.12). In that spirit, now is the moment for decisive action.

World Day for Social Communications: Bushops to host seminar on Communicating Christian Hope

On June 6 next the Communications Office of the Irish Catholic Bishops' Conference will host a seminar to celebrate year's theme for World Day for Social Communications: Communicating Christian Hope.

This was the last annual communications message written by the late Pope Francis, and it will formally be marked on Ascension Sunday, 1 June.

EWTN reporters – wife and husband Paola Arriaza and Colm Flynn – will be the main contributors on the day, along

with Primate of All Ireland Archbishop Eamon Martin who will address those in attendance in his capacity as chair of



the Bishops' Council for Communications. Individual speakers will also reflect on communicating hope in their respective fields: addiction, business, humanitarian work, priestly ministry, and from the young adult perspective.

The seminar will take place in Saint Patrick's College, Maynooth, and is the Communications Office's contribution to the universal Church's Jubilee Year of Hope, which is being celebrated by the faithful in Rome and throughout the world during 2025.

2025 also marks the fiftieth anniversary of the establishment of the CCO, which was originally set up by the late Bishop Edward Daly of Derry in his role as chair of the Bishops' Council for Communications.

The communications office was an initiative of the Bishops' Conference following groundbreaking 1963 publication by

Pope Paul VI of the decree Inter Mirifica (Among the wonderful) during the Second Vatican Council. The decree acknowledges the power of the media in impacting on people's minds, while encouraging its use to serve the common good, particularly in promoting the Gospel.

Pope Leo XIV's first US bishop appointment is a former refugee

In his first United States episcopal appointment, Pope Leo XIV named Michael Pham bishop of San Diego on Thursday (May 22).

May 29, 2025

Pham fled Vietnam as a refugee in 1980 and has spent over 25 years as a priest in San Diego. He is the first Vietnamese American bishop to lead a U.S. diocese.

Pham left Vietnam at age 13, after his family previously made several attempts to flee violence in the country. When he was about 8 years old, a barge they were trying to depart on crowded them alongside several dead bodies, the San Diego Union-Tribune reported. His family eventually made it to a refugee camp in Malaysia before being sponsored by a U.S. family in 1981, first settling in Blue Earth, Minnesota. In 1985, his family moved to San Diego.

He studied aeronautical engineering at San Diego State University and then studied to become a priest at the University of San Diego and St. Patrick's Seminary in Menlo Park, California.

He called San Diego "heaven on earth," according to the San Diego Union-Tribune.

"It's such great news for me as a bishop to be able to stay at (my) home diocese and to serve the diocese of San Diego," Pham said at a news conference after his appointment.

It's a promising sign when extra chairs have to be brought in to accommodate the interested parties at any

meeting and that was certainly true of a gathering of educationalists in Letterkenny's Mount Errigal Hotel for an evening celebrating the achievements of schools in Donegal run under Church of Ireland and Presbyterian Church patronage.

Appropriately, given its purpose, the meeting began with prayers led by the Moderator of the Derry and Donegal Presbytery, Rev Susan Moore (Two left photo above).

Principals, teachers and members of boards of management from throughout the Diocese of Raphoe were in attendance.

Dr Fennelly looked at the many challenges facing schools, classrooms and boards in the future including the "ICT revolution", the growth of AI (artificial intelligence), the role of teachers as educators, the developing role of boards of management, and the possible need for a new curriculum.



Mrs Ellis talked about the importance of school ethos in "shaping how we teach, govern and care in our schools" and of the need for good communication in tackling issues such as bullying and harassment.




