More dialogue between state & faiths urges head of RC church in England

The head of the Roman Catholic Church in England and Wales, Cardinal Vincent Nichols, has called for a broadening of a constructive dialogue between secular authorities and communities of faith to meet today's challenges.

At a symposium on St Thomas a Becket at Lambeth Palace on Friday, the Cardinal said only such a dialogue could enable our multiple and complex identities and loyalties be brought together, rather than separated out, to meet the challenges we face.

The Cardinal rejected the narrowing of a perspective towards a single test of loyalty that would serve only to betray the complexity of our human nature and impoverish the richness of the fabric of our society.

Looking back to Pope Benedict's address at Westminster Hall in 2010, he affirmed that "religion is not a problem for legislators to solve, but a vital contributor to national conversation," and for all of us "to defend those arenas of life in which true religion flourishes, open to the



challenges of its' day yet confident that its' insights and gifts are so rooted in human reality as to possess qualities that truly endure".

The aim of the symposium is to explore the importance of Thomas Becket, historically and today, in the week that one of his relics is being brought back to the UK from Hungary, where it had been kept at Esztergom since his martyrdom in 1170.

Following services at both Westminster Cathedral and Westminster Abbey, the relics will be taken to Canterbury, the site of his murder.

St Thomas Becket is patron saint of both English and Hungarian parochial clergy and a reminder in his martyrdom to all Christians of their dedication to Christ rather than the prevailing powers of the state, helping us "to remember and focus on this fruitfulness of courage and faith which is always the seed of the Church".

Cardinal Nichols recognised that the relationship between Church and state is never an easy one and is always a point of tension, but "St Thomas' martyrdom reminds us what can happen when the state seeks to dominate religious belief and reshape it to its own ends, to its own selection of values. When observance of those particular values becomes absolute requirements then we are on a path of confrontation."

In the words of Pope Benedict, "Each generation, as it seeks to advance the common good, must ask anew: what are the requirements that governments may reasonably impose upon citizens, and how far do they extend? By appeal to what authorities can moral dilemmas be resolved."

Growing Dublin C of I primary school extended

There will be great celebrations at Whitechurch National School on Thursday June 9 as the new extension is dedicated and officially opened.

Whitechurch National School is a Church of Ireland managed primary school in Rathfarnham, located near the back of Marlay Park bordered by The Grange Golf Club, Marlay Park, and Edmondstown Golf Club. The Chairperson of the Board of Management is Canon Horace McKinley and the Principal is Ms. Sarah

Richards. The school was first opened in 1823 in the grounds of the local Parish church. However it closed down in the 60s due to dwindling numbers. The school reopened on new grounds in the 80s and has steadily increased in size since then. There are now 17 members of staff and 183 pupils.

The school has seen a particularly large increase in numbers of pupils applying in recent years. This has lead to the growth of the school from a 6 class school to an 8 class school. The school received funding from the Department of Education and Skills to build an extension comprising of 2 additional classrooms, a new reception area and offices, and Special Education rooms. The parking area, heating system and sewerage systems for the whole school were also upgraded.

The architect for the project was Mr. Louis Burke and the builder was Hugh Keogh. The project started in August 2015 and was completed during the Easter holidays this year. 1st and 3rd Class are delighted with their new classrooms and are enjoying the bright and spacious rooms.

The extension will be officially opened on Thursday 9th June by the Archbishop of Dublin and Glendalough, Dr. Michael Jackson, and longstanding Board member and original Trustee of the school, Mr. Stewart Paul. There will be a thanksgiving service in the church followed by the official opening and blessing of the new extension with refreshments served in the school hall afterwards by the PTA.

Cathedral, choral and musical

In **St Patrick's cathedral, Armagh**, on Wednesday evening there will be a service to mark the **centenary of the Royal College of Nursing in Northern Ireland**. The address will be given by Professor Michael Wheeler.

Parents who have lost a child, either during pregnancy, at birth or in infancy, have the opportunity to remember that child at the Mariposa Trust's **Saying Goodbye service in St Anne's Cathedral, Belfast**. on Sunday June 5. In the past four years, 66 Saying Goodbye services have been held across England, Wales, Northern Ireland, Scotland, France and the US. The service, which begins at 3.30pm on June 5, will be the third annual service in St Anne's. The preacher will be the Rev Mark Niblock, Dean's Vicar, who will speak on the theme of 'Hope.' There will be opportunities during the service for families to mark their losses if they choose to. Poignant features of this service include special music, candles and bells. A collection will be made towards the work of St Anne's Cathedral and the Mariposa Trust. Saying Goodbye can offer support and befrienders for anyone who has gone through the loss of a baby and anyone who might find this helpful can speak to the team on the day of the service.

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St Mary's cathedral, Limerick, the cathedral community hosted its first **Heritage and History Weekend Festival** this past weekend. On Saturday there we're guided tours of the cathedral, flower displays and an artefact exhibition. At 5pm the Cathedral Choirs of Kilkenny, Waterford and Limerick gave a concert which included Schubert's Mass in G and Parry's 'I was glad'. Fr. Martin Browne OSB from Glenstal Abbey was the preacher at Festival Eucharist. In the afternoon a free concert was given by the Limerick Wind Ensemble who performed Mozart's Gran Partita K 361. A Festal Evensong brought the weekend's programme to a finale.

Hungarian dignitaries plan to walk with it for a mile and a half from a church on the outskirts of the city. The event ends a week long pilgrimage from Hungary to London and Kent. There will be a short service at the Cathedral, before the relic goes on display in the crypt on Sunday.
