Raphoe diocese pilgrims at Lourdes

In the evening, our pilgrims made the short procession from St. Joseph's Oratory to the Chapels of Light, crossing over the River Gave to light our Raphoe diocesan candle.

While a simple gesture, it represents the prayers and intentions of our diocese—left burning at the feet of Our Lady, even after we journey home.

The Chapels of Light, opposite the Grotto, welcomes thousands of pilgrims each year who come to entrust their hopes, sorrows, and thanksgiving to Mary through the light



of a candle. Our candle now joins theirs, a quiet symbol of shared faith.

Fr. ohnny Moore lit the candle on behalf of the diocese, offering the intentions of our pilgrims—those present in Lourdes and those who remained at home.

Danny McGroddy and Kieran Gallagher did a fantastic job carrying our diocesan banner throughout the week. Well done to both lads—it was no small task, and they carried it with real dedication.

London bishop to be next Archbishop of Melbourne

The Suffragan Bishop of Islington in the diocese of London, Dr Richard (Ric) Thorpe, is to be the next Archbishop of Melbourne in the Anglican Church of Australia.

He succeeds the Rt Revd Philip Freier, who retired in February.

Dr Thorpe was elected by Melbourne Diocesan Synod on Friday. He and three other candidates were proposed to the Synod by the Board of Nominators, made up of elected clergy and lay representatives.

The other candidates, all from Melbourne diocese, were eliminated in two rounds of voting. They were: the Executive Director of CMS Victoria, the Revd Dr Wei-Han Kuan; the Vicar St John's, Diamond Creek, the Ven. Dr Tim Johnson; and the Vicar at Deep Creek Anglican, the Ven. Megan Curlis-Gibson.

Dr Thorpe, who works primarily in church-planting across the Church of England, was decisively elected in the third ballot. He becomes the first overseas candidate to be elected to Melbourne since the election of the Rt Revd Frank Woods, a suffragan bishop in the diocese of Manchester, in 1957.

Dr Thorpe trained at Wycliffe Hall Oxford and was ordained priest in 1997. He served his title at Holy Trinity, Brompton

(HTB) until 2005 when he become priest-in-charge, then Rector, of St Paul's, Shadwell. He was priest-in-charge of All Hallows, Shadwell, until his consecration as Suffragan Bishop in 2015.

Posting on social media on Sunday, Dr Thorpe said that he was "humbled and deeply honoured" to have been elected. He and his wife Louise, with whom he has three children, were looking ahead "with faith and hope as we prepare for this next chapter to serve the people and parishes of the diocese of Melbourne".

The Bishop of London, the Rt Revd Sarah Mullally, posted her congratulations on Saturday. "For decades, Ric has been a driving force behind church growth in London," she said. "He will be missed here."

Dr Thorpe is expected to be enthroned as Archbishop of Melbourne later this year.

Inspired by Renaissance paintings, she spoke movingly about her creative process, especially her deep love for the image of the dove as a symbol of the Holy Spirit, which

takes pride of place on the cope's hood. Each feather on the wings of the dove and angels was shaped and stitched by hand to form a beautifully textured, three-dimensional effect.

If you missed this talk, don't worry—Carolyn will return to present the unveiling of the second of her creations, the Pentecost Cope.
