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## Dublin's third annual Ecumenical Bible Week

Ecumenical Bible Week is a week-long celebration of parish-based events around Dublin and surrounding areas focused on Scripture.

Now in its third year, Ecumenical Bible Week 2016 will run from Sunday 15 May to Sunday 22 May (Pentecost Sunday to Trinity Sunday).

The theme chosen this year is 'In the beginning God created...' (Gen 1:1) and this will explore Christian attitudes to the crisis of the environment and global warming.

EBW 2016 will feature 45 events, across 13 locations in Dublin, Kildare and Wicklow, with over 40 presenters. There'll be debate, talks, music and lots of participation the organisers have promised.

*Ecumenical Bible Week* started in 2014 as an experiment which flowed from the ecumenical dimension of the 50<sup>th</sup> International Eucharistic Congress. In an effort to tap into that collaboration, the Rev Ken Rue, a priest of the Church of Ireland, came up with the idea of an *Ecumenical Bible Week* – one week in the year when the different traditions would read, pray and celebrate the Bible together.

An executive drawn across the traditions was formed and a programme was devised. The cochairs are Dr Kieron O'Mahony on behalf of the Catholic Church and the Rev Ken Rue on behalf of the Church of Ireland. The faith groups involved are represented on a plenary group which acts as an umbrella for everyone from the Orthodox tradition to Quakers to Evangelical groups and some movements like the Mothers Union and other groups with a faith component.

The Scripture Union is also involved with schools through a programme called the 'Pentecost Project' which seeks to nurture and develop scripture through art and digital art.

I look forward to building on the significant work that has been done to date by the Irish Council of Churches and the Irish Inter-Church Meeting to respond to the many different needs in our local communities, united by a shared commitment to Gospel values.

## Derry schools and Churches project marks Easter Rising and the Battle of the Somme

Leaders of the four main churches in the North West joined students and teachers from a dozen schools at the Guildhall in Derry–Londonderry on Thursday afternoon to celebrate the success of the 'Journey Together' project, which has been marking the centenaries of the Easter Rising and the Battle of the Somme.

The project brought together more than 60 students – from across the community and from both sides of the border – to "explore this complex period in our history sensitively, imaginatively and collaboratively". Pupils made joint visits to the Somme Centre, near Belfast, and to historic sites in Dublin; they took part in an 'Ethical and Shared Remembering' workshop, facilitated by the Junction; and they participated in a series of workshops run by the Nerve Centre, which used animation and new technology to explore the historic events creatively.

Thursday afternoon's event show-cased some of the work done by students involved in the 'Journey Together' project. Three of the students - Oisin Bowyer from Carndonagh Community School, Tegan Nesbitt from Foyle College and Jack Long from St Columb's College – shared their reflections on the experience.

There was a photographic presentation by John Collins from Carndonagh CS. Carndonagh's traditional music group performed a number of pieces for the audience, and there was an organ recital by Darrell Smith from Lisneal College. All those who took part in the project received a certificate and a commemorative photograph, and presentations were made to the schools involved.

The event included a short religious service, in which the Methodist Church's District Superintendent, Rev Peter Murray, the Moderator of the Presbytery of Derry and Donegal, Rev Craig Wilson, Father Michael Canny (representing the Bishop of Derry, Donal McKeown) and the Bishop of Derry and Raphoe, Ken Good all took part. Prayers were said for "peace in a broken world" and for "commitment to reconciliation". Speaking on behalf of the church leaders, Bishop Good said they felt there could be a real value in facilitating and encouraging young people in our schools in facing and exploring 1916 together rather than separately. He acknowledged "the leadership, commitment and generosity" of school principals and history teachers who had supported the project.

Bishop Good said he believed Thursday's event did not mark the end of the project. "The project will be ongoing – informally at least. But it is a time to take stock, to share, to hear what's happened, to listen to reports, to give thanks to God and to individuals, and to commit ourselves to journeying together into the future." The Bishop said he, personally, felt very thankful for project. "I do believe this is a good news story. I think it is a good thing that will flow out and ripple out, and news of it will spread from this city – which is often the forerunner of good news stories."

The 'Journey Together' project was coordinated by the Churches' Trust, which was founded by local church leaders 30 years ago as a response to deprivation in the North West. The promotion of a more united, shared and cohesive society is central to the Trust's ethos. The Trust's Chief Executive, Fiona Fagan, paid tribute to all those who had helped the 'Journey Together' project, and who had had the "foresight to recognize the value of this project".

She acknowledged the support of funders who had made it possible: Derry City and Strabane District Council, The Nerve Centre through the Creative Centenaries Programme, The Honourable the Irish Society, the Enkalon Foundation, the Department of Foreign Affairs in Dublin and the church leaders.

Ms Fagan also thanked the principals and teachers of the twelve schools which took part: Lisneal College, Foyle and Londonderry College, St Mary's College, St Cecilia's College, St Joseph's Boys' School, Thornhill College, Lumen Christi College, Carndonagh Community School, Moville Community College, Scoil Mhuire (Buncrana), Royal and Prior Comprehensive School and St Columb's College.

# Director appeals for more support for music ministry

An authority on liturgical music has appealed for more quality music at liturgies but maintains that this must come "from the top down".

"There are some very fine choirs and musicians in our churches and for the most part people are doing the best that they can. We are blessed with some excellent choirs however some parishes struggle and they need help," Ian Callanan Director of Music Ministry Together (MMT) told CatholicIreland.net. But he added, "priests and bishops need to put more resources into choirs and music,"

Music Ministry Together runs workshops during the year to train members of choirs and

according to its director, often hears choir members wishing that their priests might come to these courses too.

He sees people providing music as being involved in a real ministry. "Music is central to what is happening at mass. Members of choirs think of themselves as 'just being in a choir'. But it is a ministry."

Mr Callanan says some choirs sing at four main spaces of the liturgy (beginning, end, offertory and communion), instead of music being integral to the Mass, with parts like the Lord have mercy, Holy, holy, Great Amen and Lamb of God being sung.

Asked why there was still quite a preponderance of music which is fifty years old or older in some Irish churches, Mr Callanan said "It comes down to resources. Some do not have the resources available to them to adapt or they are scared of the unknown."

He appealed to priests to attend music liturgy workshops (like those provided by MMT). "If they could get enthused about music in liturgy, they could encourage the choir directors to be enthusiastic. Liturgy should be joyful." Music from pre Vatican II which is still popular in Ireland often has 'old theology'.

By contrast there is some fine liturgical music coming from the post Vatican II tradition.

As an example of this Mr Callanan praised the work of the St Louis Jesuits whose songs (eg Here I am Lord), reinforce scripture, and the work of other writers like David Hass (You are mine), Marty Haugen (Shepherd me oh God) and Fr Liam Lawton (Cloud's Veil).

Music Ministry Together's summer school runs from Tuesday 16 to Sunday 21 August 2016 at the Cistercian College Roscrea with the theme 'Make Your Home in Me'. The full cost is €300.

"During the summer school, we will gather together as music ministers. We will have various sessions to teach and learn church music together. Choir leaders will experience being choir members and hopefully, some choir members will have a go at being choir leaders," comments Ian Callanan.

The school (for singers, directors and those playing musical instruments) will explore various styles of liturgy, have moments of catechesis and time to relax and have fun with organised activities and entertainment through the week.

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As part of the annual sinking of the Lusitania commemoration a headstone to Margaret MacKenzie EU was unveiled at St. Multose Church in Kinsale. The Lusitania was the world's largest passenger ship when it was launched in 1906. Of the 1,962 passengers onboard the ship, it is thought that 1,191 lost their lives including 128 American citizens which proved a significant factor in the US declaring war on Germany two year later. The boat had been on its way from New York to Liverpool when it was torpedoed. The Rector of Kinsale is the Rev. Peter Rutherford.

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The Revd Simon Genoe, currently Vicar in Lisburn Cathedral in the Diocese of Connor, has been appointed incumbent of the Parish of Magheralin in Dromore Diocese. The date of the service of institution will be announced in due course.

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Election of Dean of National Cathedral - In St Patrick's Cathedral Dublin this afternoon (Monday ) the cathedral chapter will meet to

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elect a successor as dean to the Very Revd Victor Stacey who has retired from the stipendiary ministry. The chapter consists of twenty-four canons and must elect from among their own number.

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The Dublin & Glendalough Retired Clergy Fellowship will hold its AGM in Glenageary Church Centre next Tuesday. Following the meeting the Revd Robert Kingston, Chaplain to the Mageough Home in Dublin, will talk on 'Ministry in Town and Country'.

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On Friday morning the **Church of Ireland Council for Mission** will host a General Synod Mission Breakfast at 8am in Christ Church Parochial Hall, Park Road, at which the speaker will be Ms Lydia Monds, Education Advisor to the Bishops' Appeal.

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The Diocese of Down and Connor Annual Diocesan Liturgy Seminar, entitled 'The Liturgical Service of God's Mercy' was held on Saturday 7th May in St Brigid's Parish Hall, Derryvolgie Avenue, Belfast. It was presented by Brother Pat Mullins O.Carm. The Seminar was open to all.

On Saturday 14 May the 200th anniversary of the Claremont Institution for the Deaf will be celebrated. ## **Cathedral and choral**

Last Wednesday, Mrs Heather Grindle visited the Dean and the Master of Choristers and the

Organist at **Belfast Cathedral** to make the very special donation to St Anne's of **Dr Harry Grindle's unpublished chants.** The cathedral already uses some of Harry's chants, as do other choirs, but there are more that are at the moment inaccessible. These will now be digitised (probably over the course of the Summer) and made available through the cathedral for free access. It is Heather's particular request that there be no restriction on their use.

Heather has already presented a number of Harry's books that are currently in the cathedral archive. However, **St Anne's is also receiving Donald Davison's music books**, the gift of Mrs Rosemary Davison, who also came to the cathedral, with Debbie her daughter, as the gathering of old friends gradually grew to include Catherine Harper. The Grindle/Davison collection of music related books is ultimately to be treated as one, and have a special place in the cathedral library, where again they may be consulted by anyone.

A further gift is that of Donald Davison's organ music. This too will be catalogued and made available to organists and especially those learning the organ. A system for this to work effectively has yet to be devised, but the intent is

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that the music may be borrowed by organ scholars for extended periods of time.
