Cork visit to Lichfield 2022



As part of the ongoing link between the Diocese of Lichfield, UK and the United Dioceses of Cork, Cloyne and Ross, a group of people from the Dioceses of Cork, Cloyne and Ross, travelled to Lichfield this week, to attend two services at Lichfield Cathedral at the invitation of the Right Rev. Michael Ipgrave, Bishop of Lichfield, and the Dean and

Chapter of the Cathedral of Saint Mary and Saint Chad, Lichfield.

On Monday afternoon, there was a Solemn Eucharist with the Consecration of an Shrine Altar for the Shrine of Saint Chad, Patron Saint of Lichfield Cathedral, and on Tuesday there was Ecumenical Vespers at which a relic of Saint Chad was translated by the Catholic Archdiocese of Birmingham into the new Shrine.

Representing Cork, Cloyne and Ross were the Rev. John Ardis, the Ven. Andrew Orr, the Rev. Canon Paul Willoughby, the Rev. Canon Elaine Murray and Diocesan Youth Officer Hilda Connolly. The intent was to further build on the link between the two dioceses.

FORGE Ministry Apprentices are commissioned in Down & Dromore

Bishop David McClay has commissioned the first cohort of FORGE Ministry Apprentices for a year of learning and service in the diocese.

Family, friends and supporters joined Oliver Newton and Grayce Turton at the T3 Conference Centre on Tuesday evening 8 November for a reception and a short informal service.

Ollie and Grayce have already begun their FORGE journey and are settling into their host churches – Moneyreagh Community Church for Ollie and Shankill Parish Lurgan for

Grayce. Staff and parishioners from both came along to cheer them on.



After worship led by Stephen Moore from Moneyreagh, Millie Bellew gave the address. Millie is the Children's Development Officer for Down and Dromore and has experienced volunteering for a year in one of the churches in the diocese.

Looking at the life of Daniel she pointed out that before he ever arrived in the lions' den, Daniel had prepared himself by always doing the right thing, by consistently choosing to honour God and shun earthly reward.

"Grayce and Ollie, this year is your chance to say 'it's not about me it's all about God'. It's a time of training and preparation for the task God has for you," she said.

She encouraged them to make sure their foundations and faith were firm and to 'find their flock' in Christian community.

Bishop David then commissioned Ollie and Grayce, anointing them with oil, sharing some encouragements and challenges from the Book of Acts and praying with the laying on of hands.

Meet Ministry Apprentice – Ollie

Hi I'm Oliver (Ollie) Newton and I come from Reading in England. I'm 21 and wanted to become a FORGE Ministry Apprentice to help me grow in my skills as a kids and youth worker as well as grow personally and spiritually. I also want to push myself outside of my comfort zone and I knew that this apprenticeship would help me do that.

I am working with Moneyreagh Community Church and helping out in their kids/youth work. I will also be taking on new experiences such as going to other churches, helping out with youth camps over holidays and taking part in training such as the OCN Youth Work course.

My hopes for the year are that I learn from my experiences and make more friends in other churches!

Meet Ministry Apprentice – Grayce

Hello, it's Grayce and I'm one of the FORGE Ministry Apprentices with the Down and Dromore Diocese. I live in Markethill, I'm nineteen years old and I'm placed with Shankill Parish Lurgan. FORGE really appealed to me because I wanted to serve God; the God whose goodness and faithfulness has always followed me through every season.

I want to acknowledge and develop the gifts God has given to me to help expand His Kingdom, so this year I will be learning and working a lot in Children and Youth Ministries. A verse I am greatly encouraged by is Galatians 2:20, "I have been crucified with Christ and I no longer live but Christ lives in me. The life I now live in the body, I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave Himself for me."

Through FORGE I ultimately want to deepen my relationship with Christ, grow in faith and inspire those around me to always believe and trust that God IS good all the time, and that all the time, God is good!

The FORGE programme

The FORGE programme is a new scheme to enable young Christians (18–25) to develop a strong and enduring faith and to explore Christian ministry. The scheme has been made possible by a very generous grant from Benefact Trust.

In the year ahead our Apprentices will have the opportunity to discover their gifts, learn new skills, and serve Jesus. Support from the diocese will include monthly training days, insight visits to Christian ministries, support to undertake accredited training in children's or youth ministry and an end of year celebration event.

As well as being fully involved in the life and witness of their host church, they will also contribute to diocese—wide ministry programmes with children and youth. It is our hope

and prayer that FORGE will raise up a new generation of ministry leaders.

Running rector already exceeds fundraising target for new prayer garden

A Church of Ireland rector has decided to take to road running to obtain sponsorship for a new learning resource at her local primary school. Church News Ireland Page 8

The Revd Rebecca Guildea, Rector of the parishes of Garrison, Slavin, Belleek and Kiltyclogher in Clogher Diocese, is running a four-mile distance, the same as the distance between her rectory and Belleek Primary School, 40 times over the three months from September to December.

The individual runs are being sponsored by parishioners. With a target to raise £500, she has already exceeded that amount already – almost doubling it to £950.

Rebecca's aim is that her churches will contribute to the cost of establishing a prayer garden at the school. A rundown activity area at the school will be transformed into an outdoor learning space and prayer garden where children can grow their own vegetables and flowers and also have reflective space.

Rebecca explained that the Church of Ireland Board of Education (Northern Ireland) has earmarked $\pounds1,000$ for the project with the remaining $\pounds1,000$ required to be raised locally.

As Rebecca sets out on several of her four-mile runs several times each week, she reflects on making the connection between church and school stronger.

"My real wish is how our church can be a blessing in our community and how to make useful connections within it," she said.

Rebecca and her husband Brendan have three children, Noah, Isaac and Moses with Noah already attending Belleek School.

Prayer app for young people

The Exalt prayer app was launched at the Summer Madness youth festival in June, and has seen over 250 young people downloading the app.

Exalt is designed to help 11-18 year olds, their peers and their youth group leaders to explore a weekly devotion together; this is



Justice, Forgiveness, Giving, Rejoicing and Mission.

designed to help young people seeking a faith in Jesus as well as those who have an active rhythm of faith.

The aim of the app is to make a creative and interactive way to help young people to pray as they explore six rotating themes over a year. During the year, young people will listen to reflections on Freedom, Justice, Forgiveness, Giving, Rejoicing and Mission. The hope is that as a generation listens to people reflect on Scripture and hear honest and

open testimony, we will see this generation growing in their knowledge and understanding of the Bible.

One of the new features allows users to share their experience of the Bible verse into their digital spaces, strengthening the young person's confidence in sharing the Christian faith and Scripture amongst their digital platforms.
