Diocese–wide mission in 2023 in Down & Dromore

Down & Dromore parishes will work in a partnership with SOMA (Sharing of Ministries Abroad) for a diocese–wide mission in the two weeks leading up to their Diocesan Synod in June 2023.

Bishop David McClay has invited SOMA to send 150 people to his diocese from the Anglican Church worldwide – from Singapore, South Africa, America and England – to help run mission and outreach with enough people for a team in every parish.

Mission teams will be available from Friday 2 June until the Diocesan Synod on Thursday 15 June and can be placed with parishes for a 3, 4, or 7–day mission. Each participant will be making their own way to the diocese, so host parishes need only provide accommodation and food.

The diocese says "Our guests are coming to share Christ, to speak at outreach events, and to be available for whatever mission activities a parish has planned".

Bishop David invites parishioners and clergy at this stage to pray, to begin to put together a programme and to identify the people in their parishes who could work alongside the SOMA team member(s).

He says, "It's an exciting opportunity and it's one that I'm asking all our parishes to grasp. These will be days of blessing and interaction with people from the worldwide church with every parish in our diocese."



Archbishop's tribute to Bethany Home campaigner Derek Linster

Derek Linster, who campaigned on behalf of survivors of the Bethany Home has died at the age of 81. Archbishop Michael Jackson has paid tribute to him:

"It is with sadness that we note the death of Derek Linster at his home in Rugby in England on Saturday November 19 2022.

"Derek was a man who stood firmly for his principles. In his role as chairperson of the Bethany Home Survivors' Group, he spoke for people whose voices needed to be articulated.



"The memorial which carries the names of the babies who died in the Bethany Home is a sobering and lasting legacy of the work Derek has done throughout his life. Those who

pass the memorial will see these children's names and will know of their existence due to his tireless work.

"As Archbishop of Dublin and Bishop of Glendalough, I want to extend my sympathies to Derek's family and friends."



The organisers state - the word "vocation" means calling. It is a dialogue in which God calls and we listen. Each of us is unique and God calls each one of us in a unique way. In the Church of Ireland ordained ministry is a particular calling to ministry, one which as a church we value highly.

For some the calling to

ordination is a moment of decision, for others it is a lengthy process, extending over months and years. We may hear a gentle voice inside us asking questions or we may be prompted by others asking questions of us. What is important is that we take time to listen to God's voice. One way in which we may allow God to speak to us about vocation is to attend a retreat where we can meet with others who have heard and responded to that call or to meet with those who are questioning their own sense of vocation.

As part of its commitment to develop ministry, and endorsed by the House of Bishops, the Commission on Ministry is organizing a series of events to encourage vocations to the ordained ministry within the Church of Ireland.

This retreat is for those who may just be beginning to ask whether God is calling them to the ordained ministry. It is also for those who may be further along the road. Wherever you are on the journey, coming to a retreat to hear others talk about their experiences, learning what that might mean for you personally and practically and, above all, allowing God to speak to you, may just clarify that decision for you. The retreat will be a mixture of informal talks, practical guidance, discussion and times of quiet, all held in the beautiful surroundings of Dromantine Retreat and Conference Centre, near Newry, Co. Down.

Guest Speaker: Bishop Jill Duff

Jill has been Bishop of Lancaster, a Suffragan Bishop in the Diocese of Blackburn, from June 2018. She is a sought-after conference speaker with a particular interest in enabling people to identify their calling and enter into the fullness of everything that God has for them. Prior to becoming Bishop, Jill served as Vocations Development Advisor in the Diocese of Liverpool and then as the first Director of St Mellitus College, North West.

Throughout the retreat there will be times of worship and times for silence and personal reflection. There will also be opportunity for informal chats with members of the clergy and members of the Commission on Ministry.

Cost: Participants are asked for a contribution towards costs of €75/£65. The retreat is financed through the Commission on Ministry.

Getting there: Dromantine is situated just outside Newry on the A1.



Archbishop Eamon Martin introduces the Irish Conference of Bishops online Advent Calendar



Now in its ninth year, this interactive digital Advent calendar retains a unique and popular online presence. Behind the 28 virtual doors, the calendar offers resources for schools, parishes and the home with short inspirational video messages, some seasonal crafts for children and prayers to help us keep Christ at the centre of our Christmas preparations.

Welcoming this year's Advent Calendar Archbishop Eamon Martin said, "Advent is often described as a journey. Over the next four weeks we will journey towards Christmas while reflecting on the big themes and the personalities of the Advent season. Some of the major themes of Advent are: waiting and preparation, darkness and light, and the promise of comfort and hope. During this season we meet big personalities such as John the Baptist, the Magi and, of course, Mary Our Blessed Mother who embraced God's will completely and made a special place for God in her life.

"The Advent calendar invites each of us to make space for God in our lives every day over the next four weeks. Despite the hectic rushing around, getting the decorations and tree up, visiting and shopping, we are encouraged to

travel on the Advent journey, pausing each day for a few moments to pray, reflect, and take some practical steps to enrich our experience of Christmas.

"2022 has been a tough year for many – the people of Ukraine are going into Christmas with the continued threats to life, of violence and the destruction of war. At home, many are struggling with the pressures of the increased cost of living and energy crisis. Perhaps this year, more than ever, we need an Advent journey filled with hope, promise and peace and, of course, the message of the Christmas angels: do not be afraid!

"I thank all the content contributors to the 2022 Advent calendar. This year's theme of Synodality nicely complements our Advent journey as the word 'synod' conjures up the image of walking or journeying together as a Church.

"This Advent I encourage all to set out, as the Magi did, and grow closer and closer to that moment when we experience the joy of beholding Christ our Saviour, born for us on Christmas Day. During this season we also journey inwards to prepare in our hearts, as Mary did, for the light of Christ.

Archbishop Eamon concluded, "The Synodal journey, and the Advent journey, remind us that we are all pilgrims on a lifelong pathway. So, over the next four weeks, let us walk together with family, friends and community so that everyone can experience the good news of this forthcoming celebration, and in particular those less fortunate than ourselves."

Dean Mervyn Wilson

A Service of Thanksgiving for the life of Dean Mervyn Wilson was held in Christ Church Parish Church, Lisburn, on November 23.

Dean Wilson, who was 100, joined Christ Church Parish in 1992 along with his wife Betty after he retired from ministry, all of which had been served within the Diocese of Down and Dromore.

The service was led by Archdeacon Paul Dundas, rector of Christ Church, who preached. Archdeacon Roderic West represented the Bishop of Down and Dromore, and the Rev Church News Ireland Page 16

John Pickering and the Rev Derek Harrington led the prayers of thanksgiving and intercessions.

Mervyn was born 1922 in East Belfast. The family church was St Brendan's. He attended Everton Elementary and Sullivan Upper before joining the Belfast City Treasury Finance Department

He was a keen sportsman, continuing his love of rugby, football, cricket and hockey with Sullivan Old Boys. He always had an interest in youth work, serving the Boys' Brigade.

In the late 1940s, Mervyn felt a strong calling to serve God, and left Belfast to study at Bible Churchman's College, Bristol, with an idea of missionary work in India. Instead he returned to Belfast having been encouraged to consider the role of parish minister.

Once ordained, Mervyn was curate at St Patrick's, Ballymacarrett, from 1952-56, where he met Betty, a member of the church choir. He moved to Donaghcloney/ Waringstown as curate from 1956-59, marrying Betty in 1957. Their daughter Pauline was born in 1958, and Mervyn did a third curacy at St Mark's, Newtownards, from 1959-61, when son Geoffrey was born.

Mervyn's first appointment as rector was to Ballyphillip and Ardquin Parishes in Portaferry from 1961-70. He moved to the Parish of St Patrick, Newry, where he served for 22 years from 1970-1992. During this time, he and Betty had a third child, Andrea.

Mervyn taught religious education at Newry High School, where he is fondly remembered by past pupils.

He was given further diocesan responsibilities as Rural Dean in 1977 and was appointed a canon of Dromore Cathedral in 1983 and then a canon of St Anne's Cathedral, Belfast, in 1985. In 1990, Mervyn was appointed Dean of Dromore, a reflection, Archdeacon Dundas said, of his dedication in ministry.

After retirement, he and Betty moved to Old Manor House and Christ Church, Lisburn, where he assisted Canon Sam McComb. He was a dedicated and enthusiastic visitor in the parish, leading worship and preaching the Gospel.

"He fitted in so well to being part of the staff team and parish with that humble nature shining through, but he always walked at pace," Archdeacon Dundas told mourners.

Mervyn continued to play a role in church services until a macular eyesight condition, coupled later with the onset of dementia, meant he wasn't able deliver his usual quality of ministry.

In all this time, Betty was a faithful member of the choir and Mothers' Union.

In 2022, Mervyn and Betty celebrated their 65th wedding anniversary, Mervyn the 70th year of his ordination, and his 100th Birthday.

"Mervyn loved his work in Christ and had a great faith and trust in God. He loved life, loved people, and took a genuine Church News Ireland Page 18

interest in them, loved comedy, loved sport, and made dedicated time for his family. He loved and served the Good Shepherd," Archdeacon Dundas said.

Sympathy is extended to Betty, Pauline, Geoff and Andrea, their spouses and partners Farooq, Perm and John and the wider family circle.
