

## Northern Clergy victims of 29 reported violent offences

The Police Service of Northern Ireland received twenty-nine reports of violent crimes perpetrated against members of the clergy and 'religious' over the past three years.

Priests, Nuns, Ministers, Vicars, Vergers and a Missionary worker were all reported to have been victims of a range of violent offences between January 2011 and December 2013.

Londonderry Sentinel - For example, police officers received three reports of sexual offences having been perpetrated against members of the clergy over the three years. Two Priests were the reported victims in 2011 and one Nun was the reported victim in 2012. There were twelve reports of assaults

against Ministers, Church officers and Priests, some of which involved injury to the victim.

There were four instances of robbery, three against Priests and one against a Missionary worker.

There were also several instances of clergy having suffered harassment, the police record reveals.

A Verger, Minister and Vicar were reported to have been harassed in 2011; a Minister was reported to have been harassed in 2012; and two Priests were reported to have been harassed in 2013. The last reported instance of harassment - against a Priest - occurred as recently as December 20, 2013.

There were also several reports of individuals threatening to kill members of the clergy.

In February 2011, the life of a Church officer was reportedly threatened; a Priest's life was threatened in August 2011; and there was another report of a Church officer having been threatened in September 2011.

One member of the clergy also suffered serious injury in early 2013. Police received a report in January of last year of an individual having caused 'death or serious injury' to a Priest through 'careless of inconsiderate driving.'

The PSNI released the details of the twenty-nine reported assaults in response to a Freedom of Information request.

The information released includes all reported instances of offences of violence against the person, sexual offences and robbery against members of the clergy.

The PSNI Statistics Branch released the details of crimes where the victim's occupation was listed as 'religious.'

In the police records this includes Bishops, Church officers, Deacons, Evangelists, Imams, Ministers, Missionary workers, Monks, Nuns, Preachers, Priests, Salvation Army officers, Vergers and Vicars, but only the categories listed above were victims.

Meanwhile, providing further proof that nothing's sacred anymore there were an incredible 106 instances of grave stones having been stolen between 2009 and 2013 across Northern Ireland.

Headstone thefts spiked in 2010 at thirty five. There were 19 reports in 2009; 20 in 2011; 17 in 2012; and 15 in 2013.

## **Council farewell to Bishop Williams**

The business of Limerick and Killaloe diocese took a back seat for a

It is not Bishop Trevor's final appearance in the diocese, there are several matters to attend to first, not least the institution of a new Rector of Adare and the ordination of a priest. The diocese will "say a proper farewell" to him on Sunday 22nd of June at 4:00 p.m. in St. Mary's Cathedral, Limerick. There will be a service of Choral Evensong followed by an opportunity to mingle and say farewell. There might even be cake.

# **Building a Discipling Culture Seminar**

### 'Building a Discipling Culture' will be the theme of a day long seminar which will take place in Christ Church Cathedral on Wednesday June 4 from 9.30 am to 4.30 pm.

The event is being organised by the Dublin and Glendalough Diocesan Growth Team and will be addressed by church leaders from Sheffield, some of whom are making a return visit to the cathedral after a successful event in January.

The seminar is aimed at everyone, including clergy and members of the laity who are leading or facilitating ministry and mission in the parish. It will build on the Missional Discipleship Day which took place in January. There will be two streams so that those attending in January and the new arrivals can benefit equally. Topics to be addressed will include creating a culture of discipleship, discipleship that leads to mission, contextualising to a local setting and practical approaches.

The speakers on the day will include Canon Paul Maconochie, leader of Network Church Sheffield and its European Network; Rich Robinson, director of 3dm UK; and Nick and Marjorie Allan, leaders of St Thomas Church, Philadelphia in Sheffield. Archbishop Jackson will open the event.

The standard cost for the day will be €35 per person including lunch. However, thanks to a contribution from Diocesan Glebes and Finance funds, members of the clergy and laity of the United Dioceses of Dublin and Glendalough will be able to avail of a special reduced fee of just €10.

## Field trip finale for Christian Studies course

On Saturday last the Certificate in Christian Studies completed its second cycle in the diocese of Cashel, Ferns and Ossory with a history field trip directed by Canon Adrian Empey.

The six–module programme is run in conjunction with St Patrick's College Maynooth and includes adult learners from across the diocese and also participants from the neighbouring dioceses. The programme is one of two courses recognised by the House of Bishops for Lay Reader training and is directed by the Very Revd Tom Gordon, diocesan Director of Adult Education and CME.

## **Tudor Evensong at Ascension**

Thursday is Ascension Day which will be celebrated in St Mary's church, Athlone with a Tudor service of Evening Prayer.

The preacher will be Professor Stephen Ellis from NUI Galway, who is a specialist in the early modern period.

Both the Church of England and the Roman Catholic Church are pathologically predisposed to bouts of Europhilia, sometimes verging on Eurotica."Let us by all means continue to pray for peace in Europe, but the EU's "ever closer union" is fast becoming a grievous cause of civil unrest and rising fascism."
