

Death of nun honoured for peace and reconciliation in Larne

Tributes have been paid to Cross and Passion nun Sister Olcan who passed away on Tuesday April 2.

Sr. Olcan, who was originally from Loughgiel, was one of the founders of the cross-community Tuesday Group at Drumalis Retreat and Conference Centre in Larne.

She was awarded the BEM (British Empire Medal) for services to peace and reconciliation by the Queen in June 2017.

The Tuesday Group, an inter-denominational group of local clergy and lay members, set up after the IRA ceasefire in 1994 and over the last quarter of a century has worked to bring people of all faiths and backgrounds together to help create a more inclusive and peaceful society.

Rev. Dr. Colin McClure, minister of First Larne Presbyterian Church, said: "Sr. Olcan was a quiet pioneer in developing relationships among Christians in the town and surrounding areas and led by her, her quiet powerful example at a time when it would have been difficult, she was working away just developing friendships and relationships with people."

Sister Olcan was also honorary president of Larne YMCA.

Joy Montgomery, general secretary, Larne YMCA, said: "It was sad to hear of her death. Sr. Olcan was someone who contributed so much to community relations in the Larne area."

YMCA board member Robert Alexander, who was also a founder member of the Tuesday Group, commented: "Sr. Olcan was a great friend. She was a wonderful example of true Christianity.

Complaint process begins into Bishop of Chester over response to sex abuse

A formal complaint of serious misconduct could be made against a Church of England bishop over his response to a case of child sex abuse involving a vicar.

The Church's interim safeguarding director has began a complaint process against Dr Peter Forster under the Clergy Discipline Measure (CDM).

Such procedures can usually only be filed within twelvemonths of alleged misconduct but it is understood Sir Roger Singleton is seeking an exception. The complaint has not yet been lodged.

The complaint would focus on Dr Peter's response to a letter sent to him in 2009 by Warrington vicar Charles Gordon Dickenson who, in the note, confessed to child abuse.

Despite the admission, Mr Dickenson was permitted to stay on as a retired clergy member and hold services for another five years.





admitting eight counts of sexual assault against a boy during the 1970s.

The Diocese of Chester subsequently issued <u>an</u> "unreserved apology" to Mr Dickenson's victim. Bosses accepted failing to act on information it had received concerning him.

It is unknown whether Dr Peter was personally aware of the letter.

The complaint will be overseen by the Archbishop of York. Dr John Sentamu is due to set out in 28 days whether it will be acted upon or dismissed.

He could insist the complaint be kept on file for up to five years or issue a penalty - which might include a rebuke to prohibition for life.

Premier News reported last month that the Diocese of Chester would be the subject of an independent review by the Church of England's National Safeguarding Team.

The review and the CDM complaint are separate. In light of the review, Dr Peter said he was <u>handing over</u> responsibilities for safeguarding in his diocese to the Bishop of Birkenhead. He said: "I have taken this decision in response to recent comment into my handling of the Gordon Dickenson case in 2009.

"An independent review will seek to identify where any failures in procedures arose, and what lessons can be learned and I look forward to contributing to the review and to giving a full account of my actions in relation to this matter.

"The Diocese of Chester takes seriously its safeguarding responsibilities at every level. Whilst an independent review into my actions takes place, I recognise that I should not continue to lead the safeguarding arrangements in the Diocese.

"I will continue in all other duties relating to my role of Bishop of Chester.

"I will not be making any further public comments in relation to this matter until the outcome of the independent review."

Scottish bishop: Eulogies belong at the funeral reception, not Mass

The funeral Mass is an important moment of prayer and faith after the death of a loved one – but it is not the appropriate time for eulogies, which are better suited for the funeral reception, said Bishop Joseph Toal of Motherwell, Scotland.

"The funeral liturgy in the Catholic Church brings great consolation and hope to those who have lost a loved one because we proclaim the Resurrection of the Lord and our

hope of eternal life," Toal said in a letter to priests and deacons.


"Its strength is in the faith of the Church and the words of the liturgy that express that faith. We need to accept therefore that it is what the Church offers us that counts most of all, rather than our own words." His April 3 letter on the celebration of funeral liturgies aimed to help clergy and lay faithful in arranging funerals.

"Since the liturgy has its own structure and rhythm, especially the Requiem Mass, it should not be interrupted to add in our extras," he said. The homily during the funeral Mass is "not a time therefore for anyone else to be getting up to talk about the deceased, whoever they may be."

The bishop suggested "a few words of tribute could be offered" before a funeral Mass or service begins. "These words though should be written down and shown to the celebrant beforehand and should not be prolonged," he added.

"Often what families want to hear and share can be offered in a more appropriate and less formal manner at the reception afterwards," Toal continued. "Those closest to the deceased gather for this part of the funeral and it may well be better to share there their happy memories about the deceased in this setting."

The Motherwell diocese has 66 parishes in Lanarkshire and parts of Glasgow. As of 2015, it served an estimated 162,000 Catholics, the diocese website reports.

"The important point though is the full celebration of the Catholic funeral rites and our intercession that the deceased's sins may be forgiven and that they will be

worthy to share in eternal life with God," he said. The homily is just one part of the Mass or funeral service, and its role is "reflecting on the Word of God which has been proclaimed and leading into the celebration of the mysteries in which we place our faith."

The bishop said that Church instruction for funerals clearly state that the priest or deacon who celebrates the funeral should "preach a homily as on other occasions on the Word of God, emphasizing at a funeral the hope of resurrection in Our Lord Jesus Christ."

"The instruction specifically says the homily should not be a eulogy," he added. "It is a homily therefore spoken by the priest or deacon."

It is also not appropriate to add a final tribute to the deceased before or during the close of the funeral Mass, known as the Final Commendation.

Bishop Toal said it is fitting for the preacher to integrate some details about the deceased person's life into the homily "so that it is personal and recognizes the family's wish to recall their loved one in a sensitive way." This requires some skill and "an effort to find out something about the deceased from their family."

"Clearly the homilist is not there to give a blow-by-blow account of the deceased's life but rather to use some of what he knows in a fitting manner through the course of the homily," he said, adding "whatever is said about the deceased should be accurate and prepared."

The bishop said the faithful should keep in mind that not all celebrants have the same ability to integrate the personal and the spiritual. He also offered guidance for family participation in the funeral liturgy.

While families sometimes want to do particular tasks during funerals, "it may be better to leave liturgical tasks to those who do them normally in the parish," Toal said.

Discussing in particular lectors and those who say the prayers of the faithful, the bishop noted, "It is an ordeal for people to come forward to read if they are not used to doing so, or perhaps are not even regular attenders in church." He encouraged family members of the deceased person to look to the priest or deacon for guidance, given their responsibility to decide on these roles.

Today in Christian history

April 5, 1524: Swiss reformer Ulrich Zwingli marries Anna Reinhart for the second time—this time in public. In 1522, Zwingli (and 10 other priests) appealed to the bishop of Constance for permission to marry. When the bishop refused the petition, Zwingli married secretly and, later that year, resigned from the priesthood.

April 5, 1649: John Winthrop, the first governor of Massachusetts Bay, dies. Profoundly religious, Winthrop, who left England because of its persecution of Puritans, believed New England to be "a city upon a hill" for the world to see and emulate.

April 5, 1811: Robert Raikes, founder of English Sunday schools in 1780, dies. Raikes built his Sunday schools not for respectable and well-mannered children of believers, but for (in one woman's description) "multitudes of wretches who, released on that day from employment, spend their day in noise and riot." In 4 years, 250,000 students were attending the schools, by Raikes's death, 500,000, and by 1831, 1.25 million.
