

Church leaders write prayers and hold vigils ahead of Tuesday's Brexit vote

The Archbishop of York and the Dean of Southwark have written prayers for people to follow as they pray for the future of the UK.

The House of Commons is due to vote on Theresa May's withdrawal agreement on Tuesday. It will be a significant symbol of how much support the Prime Minister has lost

among her own party over Brexit and will play a big part in what type of deal the country may try to get next.

The Archbishop of York has inivited people to join him in a round the clock prayer vigil as MPs prepare to cast their votes on the Government's Brexit deal.

The prayer vigil started at 6am on Sunday and is runnig until midnight on Tuesday, with Archbishop John Sentamu praying on the hour every hour over the course of the three days.

York Minster will be opening its doors during the vigil for people to come in and pray for the outcome of the key vote, which takes place on Tuesday.

'At this time of uncertainty I have been asked by many people to call for prayer. Please may I encourage you to join me in this prayer vigil as we work for peace and unity at this time,' he said.

The Archbishop has previously expressed support for the deal negotiated by Theresa May, writing in the Yorkshire Post that he would be in the 'content lobby' if it passes.

He also warned that a second referendum could lead to a 'draining away of trust' in Britain's political institutions and put society at risk of 'civil unrest and violence'.

To coincide with the run up to the vote Lichfield Cathedral will host a special time of guided prayer from 1:10–1:30pm on Tuesday and is urging other churches and cathedrals to join them.

The Dean of Lichfield, the Very Revd Adrian Dorber said: "It seems right therefore to invite people to come and pray in the cathedral, to remember the heavy responsibility on our parlia -mentarians. and to ask God for wisdom and integrity in our national life."

The Dean of Southwark, the Very Revd Andrew Nunn has written a special prayer for people to use if they wish and the Chair of the Association of English Cathedrals.

The Dean of Lichfield, the Very Revd Adrian Dorber, has urged people to remember their cathedrals were always open for prayer or just to take a moment of stillness and quiet reflection. December 10, 2018 Bear Grylls to release Christian devotional book

The adventurer and television presenter who has his roots in North Down is releasing a daily devotional book for Christians.

Bear Grylls is a Christian and ambassador for the alpha course and is best known for presenting shows about surviving in the wilderness.

He will release his book 'Soul Fuel' in July next year, which will be published by Hodder Faith.

Bear Grylls has been open about his faith, telling the Radio Times in 2015: "I try to start every day by kneeling down and saying, 'Lord Jesus, I ain't got it all right, and I'm nervous about today.

"I will give it my all, but will you help me? It's never more complicated than that. I probably don't go to church enough, but my faith is a quiet, strong backbone in my life, and the glue to our family."

Grylls was also a contributor to the recent Harper Collins publication In This Light: Thoughts for Christmas, a collection of musings by the Archbishop of Canterbury from people across the faith world, public life and people with remarkable stories.

According to Christian publishers Zondervan, who are publishing the book in America, the 'Soul Fuel' will "share some of his most exciting exploits and the spiritual insights

he gained along the way in his first faith-focused book, a unique 365-day devotional.

"Each section explores a theme Bear has lived, including purpose, courage, freedom, and risk."

Writing in his own autobiography Mud, Sweat and Tears, Grylls spoke of how he found his faith again and about his journey since then: "To me, my Christian faith is all about being held, comforted, forgiven, strengthened, and loved yet somehow that message gets lost on most of us, and we tend only to remember the religious nutters or the God of endless school assemblies.

"This is no one's fault, it is just life. Our job is to stay open and gentle, so we can hear the knocking on the door of our heart when it comes. The irony is that I never meet anyone who doesn't want to be loved or held or forgiven. Yet I meet a lot of folk who hate religion. And I so sympathise. But so did Jesus. In fact, He didn't just sympathise, He went much further. It seems more like this Jesus came to destroy religion and to bring life."

Monsignor Lawrence Duffy to be Bishop of Clogher

Pope Francis has appointed Monsignor Lawrence (Larry) Duffy as the new Bishop of Clogher. Since 2013 Bishopelect Larry Duffy has been Parish Priest of Carrickmacross, Co Monaghan.



He is a native of the neighbouring parish of Magheracloone where he was bornin November 1951. Bishop-elect Duffy's parents were the late Thomas and Elizabeth Duffy. He has three surviving siblings, his sister Anna and brothers Patrick and Peter. Their other brother Brendan died two years ago. Having completed his studies for the priesthood at Saint Patrick's College, Carlow, he was ordained in Saint Macartan's Cathedral, Monaghan, in 1976.

Since then Bishop-elect Duffy has served in various parishes of the Diocese of Clogher including Enniskillen, Castleblayney, Monaghan & Rackwallace, Ederney, Clones and Carrickmacross. In addition, he spent four years ministering in the Diocese of Kitui in Kenya. While in Africa he led the building of a new church in Mwingi in the diocese. Bishop-elect Duffy was also a keen supporter of religious communities in their setting up of schools in the Diocese of Kitui.

Bishop-elect Duffy was Vicar General of the Diocese of Clogher from 2013 until the retirement of Bishop MacDaid in 2016. A former player with Magheracloone Mitchells GAA, Bishop-elect Duffy is also an avid GAA fan and a keen golfer.

The Episcopal Ordination of Bishop-elect Duffy will take place on Sunday 10 February 2019 in Saint Macartan's Cathedral, Monaghan.


