The annual BCM Christmas Eve street collection raised a grand total of £7,526.35 for the life changing work of Belfast Central Mission's projects across Northern Ireland. This significant amount represents an increase of 27% on the 2017 total and was raised by 70 volunteer bucket shakers across south and east Belfast, including staff, supporters and stakeholders.

Providing vital funds for the ongoing delivery of services for all facets of local communities from Belfast to Dungannon, the Christmas Eve collection has been taking place for more than one hundred years.

Celebrating its 130 anniversary in 2019, BCM manages and operates a wide range of social care projects and community services throughout Northern Ireland. These include housing support for both young and old, the 'Leading Independent Day Nursery in the UK', and a residential care home in east Belfast with a new £5 million facility being built outside Millisle, Co. Down.

Nicky Conway, Chief Executive of BCM, said: "We rely on the generosity of the public both at Christmas and throughout the year, and on the support of our dedicated team of volunteers.

"On behalf of all involved across our projects, I would like to extend a heartfelt thanks to those who support the work of BCM and a huge congratulations to our Christmas Eve collectors for raising such a fantastic amount of money."

Armagh memorial to honour county's fallen nears completion

An ambitious project to honour more than 300 members of the security forces who were killed in Co Armagh, or who came from the county but murdered elsewhere, is nearing completion, the News Letter reports.

Funded entirely by public donations, the 90ft long memorial wall in the grounds of Armagh city's St Mark's Church will be fitted with a number of marble tablets listing the names of 346 men and women who died as a direct result of terrorist activity.

All members of the police, regular Army, Ulster Defence Regiment and NI Prison Service who made the supreme sacrifice between the creation of Northern Ireland in 1921 and 2001 will be honoured.

The organisation behind the lasting monument – the County Armagh Phoenix Group (CAPG) – said around one third of all police officers murdered during the Troubles, and almost a quarter of all military casualties, were in Co Armagh.

CAPG is appealing for assistance in identifying relatives of all those whose names will appear on the wall. The official unveiling is on track to take place in June this year.

A spokesman for the group said they had been “humbled by the generosity” of those who made donations towards the cost, and said some fundraising events will be held

periodically to cover the cost of maintaining the memorial wall.

“The memorial will assure the families of those who made the ultimate sacrifice for peace that their loved ones have not, and will not, be forgotten – and that includes those widows and families on mainland UK who might not have any other commemorative memorial,” the group said when launching the project in 2016.

“The wall at St Mark’s will be somewhere that people can come to remember and reflect.”

Death of former Dean of Connor

The Very Reverend Frederick John Rusk passed away peacefully at his home surrounded by his family on February 8. He was 91 years of age.

Dean Rusk spent his entire ordained ministry in the Diocese of Connor. He was a Canon of the Chapter of St Saviour's, Connor, before his appointment as Dean of Connor. He retired into Down and Dromore in 1998.

Dean Rusk was ordained in 1953 and served curacies in Ballymoney and St Nicholas, Belfast. He was incumbent of Broomhedge (1959–65); St Simon and St Philip, Belfast (1965–78); Ballymena (1978–88) and St Nicholas, Belfast (1988–98).

Bishop Harold Miller said, "I had the privilege of being with Fred on the night before he died. He was wonderfully cared for by his wife and family, and the room in which he died was filled with the assurance of faith. We thank God for his life and ministry."

The funeral service will be in Shankill Parish Church Lurgan tomorrow Tuesday 12 February at 12.30 pm followed by committal in Broomhedge Parish Churchyard.

Unique installation of NZ bishop outside his earthquake damaged cathedral

The new bishop of Christchurch in New Zealand, Dr Peter Carrell, was consecrated and installed on Saturday as efforts to reconstruct the earthquake damaged cathedral are finally underway.

Dr Carrell was consecrated at the Christchurch Boys High School Auditorium; ahead of an installation service in the Cathedral Square, outside the cathedral. The cathedral was all-but destroyed in the June 2011 earthquake. Years of dispute and legal wrangling over its future came to an end in September 2017 when the diocese agreed to rebuild the cathedral, with funding support from national and local government.

“Christchurch began with a special relationship to Anglicanism, with our founding forebears bringing their faith-based approach to life with them when building the city”, the Dean of Christchurch, Lawrence Kimberley, said. “This unique event will be a joyful combination of different aspects of Anglicanism. Its inclusiveness demonstrates love for friends and neighbours including welcoming those who are hard to love. It extends to work colleagues, visitors from far and near, and our tūrangawaewae, the places we are connected to and belong.”

Bishop-elect Peter Carrell described his new role as “a privilege and an honour”, adding: “I am grateful for all the support, prayer and aroha I have been receiving and that no doubt will continue. I am excited and yearn for the Diocese to move forward and thrive.”

Work on the cathedral’s re-instatement is gathering place. Last month, giant cranes removed the steel frame which has supported the west end of the cathedral and its large rose window for most of this decade. Stonemasons have removed what was left of the window and have begun gathering and recoding historic glass and carvings from the rubble. Workers have recovered large pieces of the rose

window about the size of car engines, along with smaller pieces the size of a can of beans, [the *Stuff* news website reports](#).

The work taking place now will enable further explorations to take place so that an effective plan for its reinstatement can be drawn up. The restoration, once it gets underway, is expected to last 10 years. Government sources estimate the cost at \$105 million NZD (approximately £54.7 million GBP), although the exact cost is not yet known.

It will be partly funded by the \$42 million insurance payout received by the diocese's property trustees, a \$10m Christchurch City Council grant, a \$10m Crown cash

contribution, and a \$15m Government loan that will not have to be paid back if certain conditions are met.

The cathedral congregation have been meeting in a transitional “cardboard” cathedral a short distance from the historic site.
