



Donegal flash mob – Catholic style – goes viral

An impromptu 'flash mob' rendition of the popular hymn 'How Great Thou Art' at a wedding in Donegal has become an internet sensation.

Patricia Doogan, niece of Daniel O'Donnell, married her fiancé last Friday, 3 February 2017 at St Mary's Church in Kincasslagh in west Donegal. The celebrant was Fr Pat Ward.

After the wedding ceremony, as Fr Pat began to sing the song 'How Great Thou Art', a group of well-known Irish singers, men and women, stood up one by one in the congregation to sing a line or two of the beautiful hymn.

As they sang the first chorus, a group of seven men walked to the front of the church and took their places by the priest, facing the bride and groom.

Then the women singers began singing the second verse before they too walked to the altar. Finally, the bride's uncle, Daniel O'Donnell, took his place to the left of the priest and sang the final line.

The bride, dabbing tears from her eyes, was clearly moved by the serenade, at the end of which Fr Pat Ward was heard to say to the standing and applauding congregation: "Flash mob Catholic style!"

The singers included Shawn Cuddy, Tony Allen of Foster and Allen, Derek Ryan, Tony Kenny and, of course, the bride's uncle, Daniel O'Donnell.

Daniel's wife, Majella O'Donnell, posted that the newlyweds were completely surprised by the gesture. "Featuring Fr Pat Ward, Shawn Cuddy, Derek Ryan, Fergal Flaherty, John McNichol, Chris O'Donnell, Tony Allen, Tony Kenny, Vicki Kenny, myself, Trionagh Allan and Annette Griffin, Gavin Boyle and Daniel O'Donnell, that's some line-up. It completely stunned the whole congregation," she wrote. "What a fantastic memory to have."

The bride and groom learned afterwards that the performers had not rehearsed beforehand and only planned how they would perform the song as they arrived for the wedding.

Three days later, the video had been viewed over 1.5 million times.

Afterwards, the new Mrs Swan spoke of her astonishment. "It was a total surprise. The only two people who knew were my friend Gavin who was one of the singers and my sister Fiona who

was bridesmaid. It was a huge surprise to everyone else at the church," she told the Irish Independent.

"Apparently there wasn't an actual rehearsal, just a gathering in the church before the Mass began to discuss it. We had the best day ever and absolutely everybody said that the church was their favourite part of the day," she said.

The World meeting of Families 2018 offers free 'gift vouchers' to help you make a gift of yourself and enrich your love on Saint Valentine's Day (14 February).


In his document on The Joy of Love (*Amoris Laetitia*), Pope Francis refers directly to Saint

Valentine's Day as an opportunity for couples to celebrate the importance of romantic love by gifting their time and attention to one another rather than simply relying on the more commercial approaches to the saint's day.

Taking this as a starting point, the World Meeting of Families 2018 is offering Saint Valentine's Day Gift Tokens with a difference. These vouchers commit the giver to performing a simple act of love for the other person, to celebrate their love and help it grow.

Vouchers are free and available from cathedrals across Ireland, the Knock Shrine, Veritas, and Accord Marriage Care centres. They may also be downloaded on the World Meeting of Families 2018 website: www.worldmeeting2018.ie/stvalentinesday.

The vouchers, marked 'A token of my affection', are good for things such as 'Loads of tender hugs' and 'A journey down memory lane: take time to remember how we met and have grown together'. Mothers may particularly appreciate getting the voucher for 'A special dinner cooked by me!' from their husbands, whereas their husbands may like to receive 'A technology-free evening to do an activity of your choice'.

But the voucher comes with 'terms and conditions': "This is a special *Joy of Love* gift token to celebrate our love and to help it grow. You can redeem this token over the next couple of days and I, on my part, will do my best to fulfil it."

Available too from the World Meeting of Families 2018 (WMOF2018) website is a two page flyer, which might help couples with another of the

voucher pledges: 'Set aside time for prayer together as a couple', which includes a short prayer service, a reflection from Pope Francis on the secret to a successful relationship, and a prayer for those seeking a spouse.

Dublin, which is hosting the World Meeting of Families in August 2018, is the city where the reliquary containing the remains of Saint Valentine is located. WMOF2018 is inviting people to visit the shrine in Whitefriar Street Church and to pray through Saint Valentine's intercession to find a partner for life, or grow in the love they have already found.

The World Meeting of Families, with the theme, 'The Gospel of the Family: Joy for the World', will take place in Dublin from 22 to 26 August 2018. At its heart the festival will have three main moments.

Firstly, from the 22 to 24 August, there will be a three-day Congress for all with workshops, talks and discussions centred around its theme as well as a parallel programme for children and young people.

On Saturday 25 August, there will be the Festival of Families – a special concert-style event where families from all over the world will share their stories of faith.


Finally, on Sunday 26 August, WMOF2018 will close with a solemn Eucharistic Celebration, which will gather thousands of people from Ireland and all over the world. The event will include exhibitions, cultural events and musical performances, events around the city, gestures of solidarity with those in need, and celebrations.

The World Meeting of Families takes place every three years. The most recent meeting was in Philadelphia in September 2015. In the coming months, as a preparation for the international gathering, a programme of pre-catechesis will be offered to parishes and families based largely on the Apostolic Exhortation *Amoris Laetitia* (The Joy of Love) to encourage reflection on different aspects of being family in the Church and in the world today.

St Willibrord was from England and is the Patron Saint of Luxembourg.

An annual procession is held in his honour in Echternach, Luxembourg each year and has received UNESCO World Heritage Status.

It occurs on Whit Tuesday each year.

Echternach has developed a strong tourism industry centred on this procession, which draws many thousands of tourists and <u>pilgrims</u> from around the world.

A Big Breakfast & Craft Fair was held at St Columba's, Derryvolgie Parish, Lisburn on Saturday February 4.


Organised by the parish Events Committee, the day was aimed at raising funds for the church as

Election of new Bishop of Llandaff



The doors of Llandaff Cathedral will be locked for up to three days this month as a new bishop is elected for Wales' most populated diocese.

An electoral college of 47 people drawn from all over Wales, including all the Welsh bishops, will meet inside to nominate and vote on a confidential list of candidates for the next Bishop of Llandaff.

The election follows the retirement at the end of January of Dr Barry Morgan, who served as Bishop of Llandaff, as well as Archbishop of Wales. The new bishop will be the 72nd Bishop of Llandaff, a diocese which serves nearly half the population of Wales as it includes most of Cardiff, the South Wales Valleys and the Vale of Glamorgan.

The Electoral College is made up of representatives from all six Welsh dioceses. The "home" diocese is represented by six lay people and six clergy, and the other five dioceses by three lay people and three clergy each, plus the five remaining Bishops.

Its discussions are confidential. Candidates for election are nominated at the meeting, discussed and voted on by ballot. Any candidate receiving two-thirds of the votes of those present is declared Bishop-Elect. Otherwise, the College returns to the nomination stage and the cycle starts afresh. Once a decision is made, the Cathedral is unlocked and an announcement made at the west door.

The College may meet for up to three consecutive days in order to reach a decision; if it is unable to do so within this deadline the decision passes to the Bench of Bishops. Once a bishop is elected, he or she will have up to 28 days to accept the position. If he or she accepts, the election will be formally confirmed in April.

The Electoral College meeting will begin on February 21 with a celebration of the Holy Eucharist to which anyone is welcome. Following that college members will meet in private and the Cathedral will be locked.

Most Europeans want to stop migration from Muslim countries, study finds

'Sobering' new figures reveal that more than half of Europeans favour banning <u>immigration</u> from predominately Muslim countries, reports Dave Burke, Mailonline

A survey carried out by <u>London</u>-based think-tank The Royal Institute of International Affairs found that 55 per cent of Europeans across 10 countries think further immigration from mostly-Muslim countries should stop.

The research by the institute, based at Chatham House, was carried out before <u>Donald Trump</u> introduced his controversial immigration ban in the US.

Trump signed an executive order immediately banning migrants arriving from seven nations – Iran, Iraq, Libya, Somalia, Sudan, Syria and Yemen – for 90 days.

The move sparked widespread protests across the world.



Researchers quizzed more than 10,000 people from 10 European states, asking them if they agree with the statement: 'All further migration from mainly Muslim countries should be stopped.'

Opposition to future migration is largest in Poland, where 71 per cent said they oppose more migrants arriving from mostly Muslim countries. In Austria this number was 65 per cent, in Germany it was 53 per cent and nearly half of Britons, 47 per cent, said they were in favour of a ban.

'Build bridges not walls': Pope Francis reiterates message on migrants

Pope Francis repeated his appeal for people to build bridges of understanding at his weekly audience at the Vatican.

The Pope also commented that Wednesday marked both the Church's day of reflection for young victims of human trafficking and coincidentally the feast day of St Josephine Bakhita, a Sudanese immigrant.

She was a 19th-century Sudanese slave who, after migrating to Europe, became a nun.

"In the social and civil context as well, I appeal not to create walls but to build bridges," he said. "To not respond to evil with evil. To defeat evil with good, the offence with forgiveness. A Christian would never say 'you will pay for that.' Never

"That is not a Christian gesture. An offence you overcome with forgiveness. To live in peace with everyone."

Pope Francis has frequently invoked the "bridge not walls" appeal in urging countries to welcome migrants, including when he returned from a visit last year to the US-Mexico border. On that occasion, he was asked about Donald Trump's campaign pledge to build a border wall and said anyone who wants to build a wall is "not Christian." In his remarks Wednesday, Pope Francis also appealed for prayers for members of Myanmar's Muslim Rohingya ethnic minority, who face official and social discrimination in Buddhist-majority Myanmar, also known as Burma.

"These are good people, peaceful people," Francis said. "They're not Christians, but they're good, our brothers and sisters. And they have been suffering for years. They've been tortured and killed, simply because they are continuing their traditions, their Muslim faith. Let us pray for them," he said.

Most of the estimated 1 million Rohingya do not have citizenship and are regarded as illegal immigrants from Bangladesh, even when their families have lived in Myanmar for generations. Communal violence in 2012 forced many to flee their homes, and more than 100,000 still live in squalid refugee camps.
