


The sounds of music in churches

No continuing need, role or justification for paramilitary organisations East Belfast church leaders



A group of church leaders in east Belfast has called for the UVF & UDA 'to civilianise' - 'we contend that there is no longer any need, role or justification for paramilitary organisations'

The following statement was made by East Belfast Church Leaders on 12 February 2019.

"The events of the past 3 weeks have highlighted the violence, intimidation and criminality that still persist in East Belfast, much of it associated with paramilitary groups. As pastors and ministers passionately concerned for the people of this community and city we want to express our heartfelt sympathy and condolences to the family of Ian Ogle.

"Ongoing paramilitary activity is part of the legacy of the past. It is almost 25 years since the ceasefires and over 20 years since the Good Friday Agreement. As church leaders in this community we contend that there is no longer any continuing need, role or justification for paramilitary organisations. We call on the leaders of the UVF and UDA to take immediate steps to civilianise their organisations, bringing all paramilitary activity, drug dealing and other anti– social behaviour to an end.

"We call upon the Loyalist Communities Council to play their part in facilitating this and in challenging criminality/ We give our full support to the PSNI in rigorously pursuing the organised criminal gangs that operate in East Belfast and we commit and make ourselves available to work with others to disentangle our communities from these coercive influences in order that the community may thrive."

Pope approves miracle needed for British cardinal's sainthood

Pope Francis on Tuesday cleared the way for the sainthood of renowned English Cardinal John Henry Newman and an

Indian nun, and brought six others a step closer to canonization.

The Pope received in audience Cardinal Angelo Becciu, the Prefect of the Vatican Congregation for the Causes of Saints and authorized him to promulgated two decrees on miracles for sainthood, a decree on martyrdom and 5 on heroic virtues.

Cardinal Newman

A miracle attributed to the intercession of Cardinal Newman has been recognized clearing him for canonization.



Born in London on 21 February 1801 and died in Edgbaston on 11 August 1890, the noted theologian and poet was first an Anglican priest and later a Catholic priest and cardinal, who was an important figure in the religious history of England of his time.

He was one of the leading figures of the Oxford Movement that originated at Oxford University in 1833, that sought to link the Anglican Church more closely to the Roman Catholic Church.

He is revered by both the Catholic as well as the Anglican Churches.

As a Catholic priest, he founded the Oratory of St. Philip Neri in Edgbaston, England.

Pope Benedict XVI beatified Cardinal Newman on 19 September 2010, in Birmingham, England.

Perhaps the hymn and poem that Card. Newman is best known for is, "Lead kindly light."

Sister Mariam Thresia

Pope Francis also recognized another miracle, clearing the way for the canonization of Indian nun, Blessed Mariam Thresia Chiramel Mankidiyan, the foundress of the Congregation of the Holy Family (CHF).

The nun belonging to the Syro-Malabar Catholic Church was born in Puthenchira on 26 April 1876 and died in Kuzhikkattussery on 8 June 1926.

She is known for her extraordinary charity, especially a preferential love for the poorest of the poor.

She was declared venerable on 28 June 1999 and was beatified on 9 April 2000 by Pope St. John Paul II in Rome.

The Episcopal Church's only openly gay and married bishop currently leading a diocese. He is married to the Rev. Thomas Mousin, who is currently the rector of St. John's Episcopal Church in Charlestown, a neighborhood of Boston. Brown, 48, was elected at a special convention in Bangor. One of five nominees. Brown was chosen by clergy and lay delegates on the third ballot. He received 57 votes in the clergy order and 84 votes in the lay



order. Fifty clergy votes and 82 lay votes were needed on that ballot for an election. Brown is currently the rector of the <u>Episcopal Parish of the Epiphany</u> in Winchester, Massachusetts.

+++Bishop new moves to restrict advertisements for gambling-related products - The Church of England's Bishop of St Albans, Dr Alan Smith, has welcomed new moves to restrict advertisements for gambling-related products and services; but has warned that they do not go far enough. The new rules, drawn up by the Committee on Advertising Practice (CAP) will be enforced by the Advertising Standards Authority throughout the UK. They prohibit online ads for gambling products being targeted at

groups of individuals who are likely to be under 18; ban types of advertising content, including the use of animated characters and licensed characters from movies or television, and sportspeople and celebrities that are likely to be of particular appeal to children and youth culture; and prohibit the use in gambling ads of sportspersons, celebrities or other characters who are or appear to be under 25.

February 14 in Christian history

February 14, 270: According to tradition, Valentine, a priest in Rome during the reign of Claudius II, is beheaded along the Flaminian Way. One explanation for Valentine's subsequent relationship to the romantic holiday is this: Claudius, seeking to more easily recruit soldiers, removed family ties by forbidding marriage. Valentine ignored the order and performed secret marriages—an act that led to his arrest and execution.

February 14, 869: Cyril, "apostle to the Slavs," dies. Creator of the Cyrillic alphabet (still used in Russia, Ukraine, Belarus, and elsewhere), translator of the Scriptures into Slavonic, and bishop, he worked with his brother, Methodius, who carried on the missionary work for another 15 years.

February 14, 1760: Richard Allen, founder of the African Methodist Episcopal Church, is born. The first African-American ordained by the Methodist church, Allen also a cofounded the Free African Society, America's first organization founded by blacks for blacks.
