


British-Irish relations focus of Corrymeela Sunday resources



Corrymeela has produced resources

For decades, Corrymeela has been a place of dialogue about British-Irish relations.

A spokesperson for the Community said, "We have been supported by the generosity and stories of people from

across these islands. Such sharing is difficult: it requires us to reflect on the dynamics of our past - those dynamics that echo our pain, and those dynamics that echo our shame.

"As we approach Corrymeela Sunday (St. Patrick's Day, March 17, 2019), we have produced resources to reflect on the lectionary texts, as well as the narratives of British Irish relations in this time.

"We offer these with love, as well as with hope that the practices that led to the monumental agreements of peace between Britain and Ireland can continue to nurture, guide and support our civic and personal relations as peoples who share territories." See - www.corrymeela.org/sunday2019

BBC defends controversial Songs of Praise lunchtime slot

The BBC has defended moving Songs of Praise to an earlier regular slot on Sundays after the Corporation was accused on marginalising the faith-based programme.

A member of the Church of England's governing body claimed bringing the programme forward to 1.15pm meant it was missing peak-time evening audiences. The show, which first aired during the early 1960s, previously took early-evening slots.

But a BBC spokesman said: "Songs of Praise has moved to a new time on Sunday's to ensure consistency in scheduling, make it easier to find for viewers and to avoid the programme being displaced by sporting events which can often overrun."

Addressing fellow members of General Synod, Chris Angus from the Diocese of Carlisle was quoted by The Times as asking if leaders "had questioned why the only

regular religious television programme previously to be broadcast in peak time has these past few months been marginalised to a slot early on Sunday afternoons."

In a written response, Archbishop of York Dr John Sentamu said he had been informed by the BBC that the schedule change meant Songs of Praise episodes were accessible on BBC iPlayer for longer during Sundays.

Last March, it was announced that independent companies would take over production of Songs of Praise from the BBC.

Aware will be one of the partners in this venture, as will Bishops' Appeal, which will focus on mental health issues affecting refugees and those in our Direct Provision centres.

Death of Father Phelim McKeown, Caledon

Archbishop Eamon Martin was saddened to learn of the sudden death of Father Phelim McKeown, Priest in Residence, Caledon, Co Tyrone, on Saturday, 16 February 2019.

Father Phelim was ordained on 7 July 1996 in Mullaghbawn and served in parishes both North and South of the border including Saint Patrick's Parish, Dundalk, Saint Peter's Parish, Drogheda and Bessbrook. He became Parish Priest of Kilsaran in August 2014 but unfortunately had to take leave due to ill health from 2016.

In recent months, Father Phelim had begun a gradual return to his pastoral duties, all the more reason why his death has come as such a shock to all of us.

Father Phelim will be remembered as a very caring and pastoral priest who had a particular empathy for those who were suffering and struggling in anyway. He was very fondly thought of within his wide family circle and by those in the parishes where he ministered.

I extend my sympathies to his brother, John, his extended family, his brother priests, and all who knew and loved him.

Father Phelim's funeral will take place in his home parish of Mullaghbawn at 12.00 noon on Wednesday, 20 February 2019.



Critical of the "Christianity of this land," which accepted (or at least tolerated) slavery, he considered himself a devotee of "the pure, peaceable, and impartial Christianity of Christ"
