St Michan's Church crypt to reopen to the public following vandalism

The crypt housing the mummies at St Michan's Church, Church Street, Dublin 7, will reopen to the public on Tuesday next, July 9, at 11am.

The crypt has been closed since it was broken into over the weekend of February 23/24 2019. During the break in the head of the 800 year old mummy known as 'The Crusader' was stolen along with another skull.

During the break in coffins in the crypt were vandalised and other mummified remains, including those of a 400 year old nun, were desecrated. Some of the bones of The Crusader were scattered outside the coffin.

An investigation was launched by An Garda Síochána and, following information received, Gardaí from the Bridewell Station recovered both The Crusader's head and the skull on March 5.

Since then, in conjunction with the National Museum, the head of The Crusader has been undergoing restoration. It is being returned to the crypt. Nichols undertakers have generously provided new coffins and re–coffined the mummified remains. Increased security measures have been put in place at St Michan's.

The incident drew worldwide attention to the Dublin church and prompted outcry throughout Dublin city. Local people, for whom the mummies at St Michan's are particularly special, rallied to offer their support and sympathy.

Both archbishops of Dublin, Archbishop Michael Jackson and Archbishop Diarmuid Martin, visited the crypt in the wake of the break in and appealed to those responsible to examine their consciences.

President Michael D Higgins visited St Michan's on April 10. The crypt was reconsecrated by Archbishop Michael Jackson on April 11 with prayers so that those who had lain there for centuries could once again be at rest.

The crypt at St Michan's had been targeted by vandals previously in 1996.

Archbishop attends Government's structured dialogue meeting



Following the invitation of the Government to the Irish Catholic Bishops' Conference, Archbishop Diarmuid Martin, Archbishop of Dublin and Vice-President of the Bishops' Conference, on Thursday participated in the plenary meeting of representatives of Churches, faith communities and non-confessional organisations which was held in Dublin Castle.

Archbishop Martin attended with Ms Siobhan Hanley, Head of Trócaire in Northern Ireland. The meeting was chaired by the Taoiseach, Mr Leo Varadkar TD.

Thursday's discussion was based on topics that were previously submitted by participants which, for the bishops' delegation, were: conscience, care of the marginalised, and

support for parents who wish for a faith based education for their children.

The three-and-a-half hour meeting was structured under the following three themes: effective structured dialogue; inclusive and diverse communities; and, education.

Archbishop Martin welcomed the opportunity to discuss the role of faith in the context of modern society, as well as the broad range of views that were offered and facilitated by Thursday's gathering.

Dean Philip Knowles made music and created harmony

The Funeral Service of Dean Philip Knowles took place on Thursday (July 4) in St James's Church in Castledermot. Dean Knowles, who was priest in charge of the Narraghmore Group of Parishes (Glendalough) and former Dean of Cashel, died peacefully on Tuesday July 2.

His remains were received at St Mullin's Church, Timolin, on Wednesday evening and following his funeral service in Castledermot Dean Knowles made his final journey to the Cathedral Church of St John the Baptist and St Patrick's Rock, Cashel, for the Eucharist in Thanksgiving and Remembrance. Burial took place afterwards in the adjoining churchyard.

Preaching at the Funeral Service with Holy Communion in St James's Church, Castledermot, the Archbishop of Dublin, the Most Revd Dr Michael Jackson described Dean

Knowles as a person who combined carefulness about worship with carefulness about people in a way that is the hallmark of the parish priest in the Church of Ireland tradition.

"Everywhere Philip went, he sought to make music and to create harmony. This he did by having his finger on the pulse, by keeping his ears to the ground and by seemingly knowing everybody. His ministry brought him to serve right across Ireland and everywhere he went he built up relationships and established working partnerships. His heartbeat marched in time with the heartbeat of the people he met, the people whose situation he understood and the people who, in turn, responded to him openly, warmly and graciously," the Archbishop said.

He added: "Philip gave more than ever he took and he retained a strong and powerful sense that The Lord indeed would always provide. This stood him in very good stead when his illness struck and when he found himself in the confining and constraining circumstances of hospitals in Naas and in Tallaght, The Silverstream Residential Care Facility in Dunlavin and then in St Brigid's Hospice in The Curragh. Being in Kildare brought Philip peacefully right back to where his father had been a rector and where he and his siblings would have grown up in earlier times. Not all circles are vicious; this was a very benign circle and one for which Philip was grateful and of which he was appreciative".

Dean Tom Gordon preached at the service in Cashel.

Dean Knowles was educated in Trinity College Dublin and the Church of Ireland Theological College. He was ordained

in 1977 and served as a Curate in St Paul's, Lisburn (Connor). He was incumbent of Cloonclare with Killasnett and Lurganboy (K,E and A) from 1979–87 and of Gorey from 1987–95. He served as Dean of Cashel from 1995 until his retirement in 2013. He has been serving as Priest in Charge in Narraghamore since 2016.

He is sadly missed by his sister Heather, brothers Herbert and David, sisters—in—law Anne and Jenny, nieces, nephews, good friends Con and Eileen Doyle, his fellow clergy, choir "In Cantorum", extended family, neighbours and friends.

Christian Aid launches emergency ebola appeal

Christian Aid has launched the appeal as the Ebola outbreak continues to escalate, spreading disease, death and further devastation amidst ongoing armed conflict.

The epidemic in eastern DRC – the country's 10th Ebola outbreak – began in August 2018. To date it has infected more than 2,200 people and claimed more than 1,400 lives, making it the second largest in history.

The affected regions – North Kivu and Ituri – are also battling high levels of insecurity and armed conflict, which together have caused a protracted and complex humanitarian crisis that has displaced millions.

With concerns that the Ebola crisis could escalate at any moment, Christian Aid is appealing for extra funds to scale up its emergency work in high-risk parts of North Kivu.

12 million need humanitarian aid

Christian Aid's acting country manager for the DRC, Esperant Mulumba, said:

"This is a crisis of grave proportions, and time is running out. The Ebola virus has overwhelmed our fragile health infrastructure, in a country where more than 12 million people already desperately need humanitarian aid. To make matters worse, the epidemic has hit a region blighted by instability, armed violence, widespread displacement and food shortages.

"For a range of reasons, there has been denial about the existence of Ebola among some communities, leading to widespread mistrust in the health system and resistance to health workers – even attacks, in some cases. This has made it incredibly difficult for agencies, including our own Ministry of

Health, to run an effective Ebola operation. All these factors have seriously undermined efforts to curb the outbreak.

"That is why the response to this epidemic cannot be limited to health work. It is critical that we work alongside communities – and through trusted local figureheads like faith leaders and traditional leaders – to combat widespread fear and distrust about the disease and its causes."

Displaced people stretching host communities

"The Ebola virus is having an impact far beyond the medical realm, Mr Mulumba continued.

"For instance, people fleeing the outbreak are adding to the already high numbers of internally displaced populations, who need aid to survive. This displacement, as well as the epidemic itself, has interrupted agricultural activity, making food insecurity a growing concern.

"During 2018, more than 1.8 million people were newly displaced across the DRC, many of them in North Kivu. In June this year, UNHCR (the UN Refugee Agency) reported that an additional 300,000 people had been forced from their homes in the northeastern provinces of Ituri, North Kivu, and South Kivu.

"These people have staggering needs, both those displaced and the already stretched communities hosting them.

"Agencies like Christian Aid and our trusted local partners are doing what we can to slow the spread of the virus and alleviate the suffering of people whose lives are at risk. However, the need is incredibly vast: with more resources, we could do more.

"That's why we are appealing to the public for more funds, so that we can help those caught up in this terrible situation."

Clean water, latrines and mental health help

Using a €282,000 grant from Irish Aid, Christian Aid's local partner Bureau Œcuménique d'Appui au Développement (BOAD) has mounted an emergency operation in the Lubero territory of North Kivu, where people are at high risk of infection.

This work focuses on building latrine blocks and water sources, running hygiene promotion campaigns, offering therapy to help people manage the psychological impacts of the epidemic, and engaging with communities to build trust and dispel myths about the epidemic. These are all areas highlighted by the World Health Organization as current gaps in the Ebola response.

Throughout North Kivu, Christian Aid's partners currently provide humanitarian aid to nearly 100,000 people, including those displaced by conflict, former refugees returning from neighbouring countries and vulnerable locals.

Christian Aid's partner Communauté Baptiste au Centre de l'Afrique (CBCA) is also responding in North Kivu, focusing on community engagement, including through faith leaders, as well as water and sanitation. Christian Aid has been working in DRC for several years. In addition to North Kivu, it also works in the provinces of South Kivu, Maniema, and Kasai.

+++ On the move in Raphoe - The Archdeacon of Raphoe, Ven. David Huss, led morning worship on Day 3 of 'On the Move 19' in Stranorlar on Friday. On Saturday afternoon they'll enjoy a community fun day and a barbecue.

+++ Carrickmacross mission team building homes in Malawi - A mission team led by Revd Colin McConaghie, Rector of the Carrickmacross Group of Churches in Clogher Diocese and one of his parishioners, Lorna Doran, have already begun work with the charity, Habitat for Humanity, to

build homes for orphaned families in Malawi. The 16 people of Carrickmacross Team Malawi 2019 left Dublin Airport on Sunday last and this week began their house-building programme. The team members had taken part in a Service of Celebration and Commissioning in St. Finbarr's Church, Carrickmacross on Sunday, 23 June attended by Jenny Williams, Chief Executive of Habitat for Humanity Ireland. The team members are mostly from the Carrickmacross Group of Church of Ireland Parishes of Carrickmacross, Magheracloone and Ardragh and include several members of St. Joseph's Roman Catholic Church in the town.
